These two nurses are to remain here permanently and will spend their full time in this county in the public health work. Dr. Belt of Newport, who is to complete the unit, is expected to arrive today. This physician will also give his full time to this county. Mrs. Grandy reports that in the inspection which she has made so far she finds that there is a number of contagions throughout the county, including some cases of scarlet fever, whooping cough, measles and other diseases. New reports are coming in daily from various sections of the county and no time will be wasted in starting the health work.

TAX PLANS DISCUSSED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The government would suffer a loss of \$247,981,491 in revenue with a reduction of taxes as suggested by the democrats against a loss of \$287,814,261 under the Mellon plan. Secretary Mellon informed Representative Garner, author of the democratic scheme, without comment in estimates submitted today.

CHRISTIE GOES TO PORTLAND

OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 1.—Archbishop Alexander Christie left for Portland last night. Archbishop Christie has been suffering with pneumonia poisoning for the last two weeks, and for a time his condition was considered by his physicians as critical.

VENIZELOS TO RE-TAIN PREMIERSHIP

ATHENS, Feb. 1.—Meeting at the bedside of Premier Venizelos, the cabinet has accepted his promise to retain the premiership until he has received the verdict of the heart specialist who is hurrying from Paris to examine him. It is hinted that should the republicans in the absence of the premier from the assembly succeed in winning over enough Venizelist deputies to pass their bill declaring the Gluckasky dynasty abolished, that Venizelos might be tempted if his physicians permit, to renounce his intention of resigning.

POWER RATE HEARING AT MEDFORD IS SET

SALEM, Feb. 1.—Hearing of the application of the Home Telephone and Telegraph company of southern Oregon for an increase in rates for February 28 at Medford.

These rates were recently suspended by the public service commission pending an investigation.

On February 19, also at Medford the commission will hear the application of the California Oregon Power Company which recently requested increases in rates for electrical energy. The proposed new tariff filed by the California Oregon company was suspended by the commission yesterday until such time as an investigation as to the reasonableness of the rates can be completed.
