CREAMERY HAS NEW EQUIPMENT

Capacity for Both Butter and
Ice Cream Making More
Than Doubled.

IS FULLY SANITARY

New Apparatus Makes It Un-
necessary to Touch Any
of Materials Used in
Making Ice Cream.

The Douglas County Creamery is installing several thousands of dollars worth of new machinery and equipment costing more than doubling the output of butter and ice cream. The new machinery and apparatus makes the manufacturing process of the creamery's products absolutely clean and sanitary, and eliminates all chance of contamination.

With the new equipment the cream and other materials, entering into the manufacture of butter and ice cream, are not touched by hands from the time they are received until the finished product is delivered to the customer.

A new Wizard pasteurizer has been installed having a capacity of more than 5,000 pounds per hour.

The cream received from the dairies of the county, is poured directly from the cans into this great vat, where it is brought to the proper temperature for pasteurization, and then passes through electrically operated pumps to a cooler, where it is reduced to a temperature of 40 degrees and flows by gravity to holding vats, and from there is pumped to the churns, or else to the ice cream manufacturing department. The cream is pumped through pipes, which are also attached to water and steam pipes, so that they may be thoroughly cleaned by hot water and steam at all times each.

In the ice cream department, the cream is turned through pipes into mixing vats where the other materials are mixed in, untouched by hands, and this then goes into a mixer where it is thoroughly blended and smoothness given by specially prepared machinery.

The mixture then goes to large vats where it is cooled and then flows by gravity into the new electrically operated ice-cream freezer which has just been installed at a great cost. This freezer is a very fine piece of machinery and will permit the plant to put out more than 1000 gallons of ice cream daily.

The mixture flows into the freezer which is turned by an electric motor. Special hoppers are provided for holding fruits and nuts, or other materials if it is desired to add these ingredients. At the proper time the freezer is opened and the frozen product is drawn off directly into the containers, and is set away in a room where the temperature is kept constantly below zero, the hands of the operator never coming in contact with any part of the process with any of the materials. One operator standing in one position, and never having to move more than a few feet, can control the entire process of manufacture, and turn out over 1,000 gallons of ice cream each day. This is one of the most complete plants in the state and with the new apparatus provided, assurance can be given that all products will be clean and sanitary to the last degree, as at no time does the mixture come in contact with the air.

Mrs. Borg and Mrs. Willett, are now at work improving their formulas for ice cream and expect during the coming spring and summer to turn out an even better product than ever before. Mrs. Borg recently spent five weeks in Seattle studying various methods of making ice cream and will be able to produce some very attractive and delicious dishes during the spring and summer of this year, when their plant will be in full operation.

In the purchase and installation of this machinery, the creamery company has endeavored to obtain extreme sanitation and everything possible to promote cleanliness has been done. All apparatus is connected up directly with live steam and hot water and can be thoroughly cleaned several times each day.

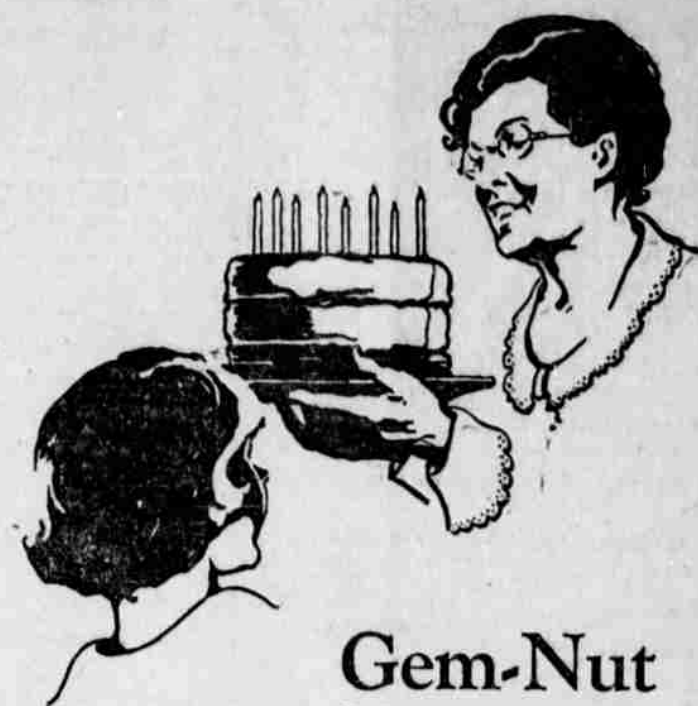
