RIVER BOAT BADLY BATTERED IN STORM

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
PADUCAH, Ky., Feb. 1.—Survivors of the wreck of the Steamer Tom C. Powell, arriving here early today on the tugboat Marcia Richardson, reported that three deckhands lost their lives when the Powell's hull was battered in by ice and the vessel settled on a sand-bar in the Ohio river at a point near Smithland, last night.

A report was also current among those landed from the tugboat two passengers had lost their lives in the wreck. Several of the survivors were suffering from shock and exposure and were sent to a hospital here.

The Powell, accounts of survivors said, settled on a sand-bar within 2 minutes after an ice flow had ripped a hole in her hull. Only the Texas deck of the vessel remained above the water and furnished refuge for those on board.

First reports received here were that 23 persons were unaccounted for.

PADUCAH, Ky., Feb. 1.—Two passengers and three negro deckhands were missing today as a result of the wreck of the river steamer Thomas C. Powell in the Ohio river near Wilson's light, eight miles from here, last night. Survivors landed here by the tugboat Marcia Richardson, told graphic stories of the wreck and expressed belief that those missing were trapped below by an onrush of water or pinned by shifting freight when the boat listed.

Shepherd Green, captain and pilot of the Powell, declared the boat struck a sunken obstruction while moving in mid-channel and sank within three minutes. As soon as he felt the blow, Captain Green turned the steamer and ran for a submerged bar. The boat rounded with only the deck and pilot house above water. The survivors found temporary refuge on the "Texas" deck and later some of them were moved ashore in the boat's yawl.

Mrs. Mary McReynolds of East St. Louis, the only woman passenger, was rescued with difficulty after shifting freight had pinned her against the side of a cabin.

The boat is believed to have struck a large ice floe.

The dense fog and presence of ice in the river added to the difficulty of rescue work.

The Powell was enroute to Nashville, Tennessee and carried 13 passengers and a crew of 17.
