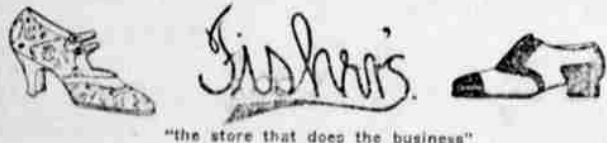

M'ADOO NAMED IN OIL SCANDAL

ness said "the services rendered by Mr. Fall, Mr. Brandegee and Mr. Smith for Americans abroad everywhere were of greater value than that of any other men in those days." Mr. Doherty said he referred to Senator Brandegee, republican, Conn., and former Senator Mark Smith, democrat, Arizona. They were members of the foreign relations sub-committee on Mexican affairs in the days when Mr. Fall was a senator.

Replying to inquiries by Senator Adams, democrat, Colorado, Mr. Doherty said Mr. McAdoo had "no part" in the negotiations of his company with Mr. Fall for the lease of California naval reserve number one.

"He represented us in the west," he said.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Mr. Doherty said his company had employed Mr. McAdoo to represent it in Washington on Mexican affairs shortly after he left the cabinet.

Mr. McAdoo received \$250,000 "all told from our company," Doherty said, adding that Mr. McAdoo still "represents us in Mexico." "Our company and a half a dozen others employed Mr. Gregory to represent them before the president in regard to getting permits to drill oil wells in Mexico," said Mr. Doherty. "Our share of the fee was \$2,000."

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 1.—William G. McAdoo, candidate for the democratic presidential nomination, late today telegraphed Senator Walsh of the senate committee investigating Doherty and Sinclair leases, asking that arrangements be made for him to appear before the committee.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 1.—That the "dragging of my name into the investigation of oil leases at Washington is wholly without justification of any sort," was the declaration today of William G. McAdoo when shown E. L. Doherty's testimony of his connection with the Doherty company before the senate investigating committee.

McAdoo declared that he "never at any time has been employed or consulted regarding any oil leases anywhere in the United States." His services to the Doherty interests, he said, were rendered entirely in connection with Mexican matters. He said his annual retainer from the Doherty interests since coming to Los Angeles has been \$25,000, that his firm has received a fee of \$100,000 for services rendered in New York and that he and his firm's connection with the Doherty company had extended over a period of four years.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Without debate, the house today passed the Walsh resolution, already approved by the senate, directing the president to bring about cancellation of the Doherty and Sinclair naval oil reserve leases.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The vote was 120 to 4. The leaders agreed to forgo debate in deference to Woodrow Wilson's condition.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Representative Lockworth, the republican leader, urging that there be no show of partisanship with the former president, near death, asked that debate be limited to 30 minutes. Representative Howard, Democrat, Neb., suggested that the house proceed immediately to vote—a suggestion that was accepted.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Agreement was reached by house leaders today to take up the Walsh resolution looking to annulment of the naval oil leases without referring it to a committee. Debate will be limited in an effort to obtain a vote before adjournment this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Indications were given at the White House today that Thomas W. Gregory, former attorney-general, would not be employed as special counsel in the oil lease cases in view of the testimony today of E. L. Doherty before the senate oil committee.

A formal statement issued at the White House said that such employment "might be an embarrassment to Mr. Gregory and perhaps otherwise would be improper."

William B. Hibbs, of the Washington brokerage firm of Hibbs and company, appeared today before the senate oil committee in response to

a subpoena requiring the production of the books of his firm from which the committee will determine whether there was speculation in oil stock through his office before the lease of the Teapot Dome naval reserve to Harry F. Sinclair was executed by former Secretary Fall.

Mr. Hibbs conferred with Chairman Lenroot and other committee members in an effort to ascertain just what books the committee desired to examine.

He explained that it would require a truck to take all the books bearing entries of stock transactions.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Feb. 1.—Mason Day, representative of Harry F. Sinclair said today that Mr. Sinclair would remain in Europe two or three weeks longer, and then leave for home.

Mr. Sinclair, who arrived here from Paris yesterday, expects to return to Paris this week-end and then will go to Belgium on a business trip, perhaps visiting Germany before sailing for the United States.

Mr. Day characterized as "bunk" a report that Mr. Sinclair would remain abroad for two months.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The committee of physicians which was appointed after Mr. Fall's doctors had reported him unable to go before the committee, submitted written statement, which said the former secretary was under a nervous strain, but that his general appearance was fairly good.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior is in condition to appear for examination in the senate oil inquiry, the investigating committee was told today by the special medical commission appointed to examine him.

Chairman Lenroot announced that on the basis of the report a new subpoena would be issued for Mr. Fall, requiring his presence before the committee at 10 o'clock tomorrow.

WARTIME PRESIDENT SUFFERS DISORDER

old trouble that had assailed the former president during his western speaking trip late in 1919.

Dr. Grayson, on his return to Washington yesterday, confirmed that diagnosis and said he did not at that time regard the attack as serious unless it should fail to yield to treatment.

The change during the night, however, manifested grave fears of Dr. Grayson and Mrs. Wilson, who has been the faithful attendant of her husband since the first symptoms of his collapse became manifest during the western trip four and a half years ago. Today she notified all the members of Mr. Wilson's family of his condition, at the suggestion of Dr. Grayson. None of his three daughters are in Washington.

For a brief time this morning Dr. Grayson left the side of his patient and made a hurried trip to his own home. He did not take leave of the Wilson home, even then, however, until he had summoned Dr. H. A. Fowler, a Washington kidney specialist, who had treated Mr. Wilson previously, to remain on watch. Dr. Grayson said the step was taken "as a precautionary measure."

News of the change for the worse spread rapidly throughout Washington as alarming rumors were disseminated over the whole country during the night by radio broadcasting stations. Early this morning before Dr. Grayson had issued his bulletin, messages of sympathy and encouragement began arriving by the thousands.

President Coolidge was one of the first to convey his expressions of regret. As soon as he reached his office, the president learned of the serious condition of Mr. Wilson and he immediately sent to Mrs. Wilson a message for himself and Mrs. Coolidge, expressing concern and hope for a speedy recovery.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—At noon Mr. Wilson had rallied a little but there was no material change in his condition. He was fully conscious and in a faint voice talked with those at his bedside.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Dr. Sterling Ruffin, one of the attending physicians, pronounced Mr. Wilson's condition unchanged as he left the house shortly after noon.

The physicians will issue a joint bulletin later in the day.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of the former president, left hurriedly today for Washington, according to friends living in her apartment house on Washington square.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 1.—Mr. and Mrs. William G. McAdoo, son-in-law and daughter of Woodrow Wilson, who early today received their first news of the serious turn of Mr. Wilson's illness from The Associated Press, will leave without delay for Washington. It was announced at Mr. McAdoo's office.

PASSAGE OF MEXICAN TROOPS THROUGH ARIZONA AUTHORIZED

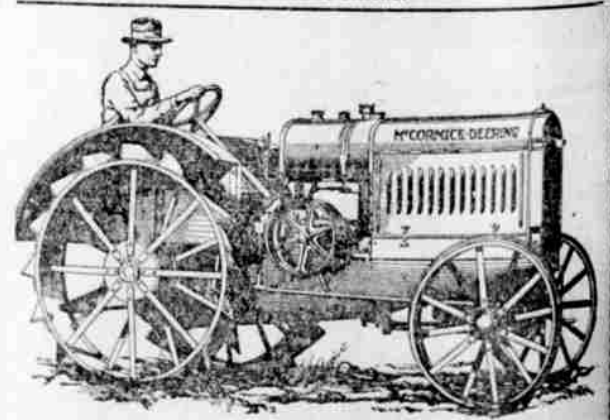
