L. M. Goodding, who is connected
with the Botany department of the
Oregon Agricultural college, but who
is employed directly by the federal
government, arrived in Roseburg this
morning to spend several days in con-
nection with the work of the agricul-
tural agent here. Mr. Goodding is a
specialist sent out by the government
to survey and handle the Pine blister
rust disease which is affecting the
forests and plant life of the north-
west. He is to work with County
Agent Conney while here and will
visit several of the surrounding coun-
ties making talks about the
disease and its prevention. Mr. Good-
ding states that the rust has not been
found in Oregon but that it is to the
interest of Oregon people to prevent
its entrance into the timber regions of
this state.

KLAN CREDITED WITH
HUGE BOOZE RAID

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
JOHNSON CITY, Ill., Feb. 2.—
One hundred and twenty eight
persons had been arrested today in
the dry raids in Williamson coun-
ty, which began last night and con-
tinued today. Several hundred men,
said to be members of the Ku Klux
Klan, conducted the county-wide
raids, which were led by S. Glenn
Young, dry worker and paid em-
ploy of the Klan.

The raids were principally on pri-
vate homes. The Chicago and East-
ern Illinois Railroad furnished a
special train to take the prisoners to
Benton for appearance before a fed-
eral commissioner. The raiders con-
fiscated six stills, 27 barrels of wine,
51 gallons of moonshine and 200 gal-
lons of home brew.

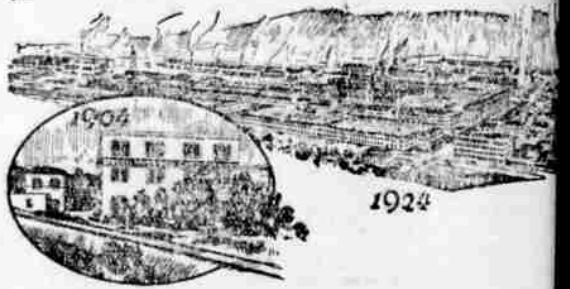
