BROCCOLI MARKET LOOKS PROMISING

According to Foster Butner, manager of the Umpqua Valley Broccoli Exchange, markets for Umpqua Valley broccoli show good indications for the season, which is expected to open about the twentieth of this month. Mr. Butner states that only a few cases of the product are being shipped at present and that most shipments of this is going to Portland markets. No carload shipments are expected until later in the month, when the shipping to eastern markets and Canada will start. The present weather conditions are very conducive to the growth of the broccoli and will probably affect an early opening of the markets. California broccoli is selling rapidly and it is expected that most of the produce from that state will be off the market when the Oregon producers open their season. Prices are holding steadily so far in the year and local sales are being made at one-fifty per crate, f. o. b. Roseburg.

MEDFORD OFFICERS FIND BIG STILL

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) MEDFORD, Feb. 2.—The Sheriff's office and federal prohibition enforcement officers announced today a raid in the upper Sam's valley district Thursday when they captured a wholesale moonshine establishment and arrested all red distiller E. Hatfield, alias J. B. White, 50, married, with a family living in Klamath Falls. A still with a daily capacity of 100 gallons, 1,000 gallons of mash, four valuable red-wood tanks, 500 pounds of sugar and 100 gallons of kerosene were confiscated. Hatfield declared in a statement to the authorities, that he was employed by another name, whose identity is concealed pending capture, who was the owner of the outfit and distributor of the finished product in a high-powered car, to upstate points, where it was labeled. The still house was cleverly concealed in the heavy brush, and in order to remove the material it was necessary to tear out the front of the plant, the largest ever unearthed in

BRIDGE PETITIONS BEING CIRCULATED

A petition which will authorize the city council to issue \$10,000 in bonds for the construction of a bridge across the south Umpqua river to Alexander addition is being circulated today and is receiving a good many signatures. Over a hundred persons had signed the document at eleven o'clock this morning at the request of the volunteer circulators. Seven of these circulators have been busy all during the day with their work and are making rapid headway. The petition if it receives the proper number of signatures will require the council to place the measure on election and this effort is being made to make the issuance of these bonds come at the same election as those to be issued for the library bonds. The date set forth in the petition is for March 11. It is further provided that the money, if the measure passes, be added to the equal amount which has already been set aside by the council. Another petition which is being circulated with this one is a petition which provides that in the event it is found cheaper to build the bridge outside the limits that this be done.

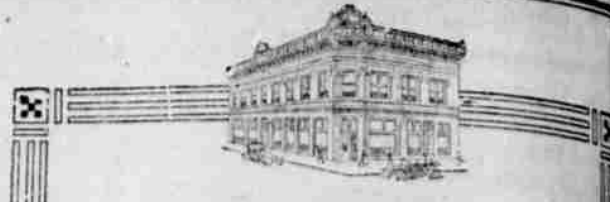
