OREGON DELEGATION STANDS FOR BONUS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Feb. 2.—Letters from all members of the Oregon delegation in congress pledging support for a bonus for world war veterans, were read at a meeting of the executive committee of the Oregon state department of the American Legion here today.

All state posts were urged to adopt resolutions thanking the congressmen and senators for their stand. The committee ordered telegrams sent to President Coolidge and Representative Albert Johnson, chairman of the house immigration committee, urging that aliens who cannot become citizens be kept out of the United States.

Similar messages were sent to legion departments of California and Washington.
