GOVERNMENT IS UNAPPRECIATIVE.

There is a class of public servants that go on working day after day—year after year—faithfully performing their duties. Rain or shine these boys are on the job. They are expected to give the very best possible service, which they do, otherwise they are penalized severely, frequently by summary dismissal from service. No matter how painstaking in their efforts to serve this great industry, no matter how great their burden, little thought is given by the government concerning their remuneration. Faithful service and long duration at their post of duty is no incentive for greater reward. At least such has been the case for the past ten years. We refer to the army of letter carriers and postoffice clerks employed by the government. While their duties have increased two fold in the last ten years, their salaries remain as of old, the government taking no cognizance of present day living costs which are fully 70 per cent higher than prevailed ten years ago. Is there any private concern handing out such treatment to its employees? We hardly think so. Very much to the contrary. Wages have been increased in accordance to service rendered and in keeping with present day living costs. The government is setting a mighty poor example to its employees by keeping them at the same wage that was in force ten years ago. It is a big institution and should have big ideas concerning its army of employees. The wonder is that so many efficient men seek government work where their talents are discounted as in no other enterprise.

GERMAN "SYMPATHY" FOR EX-PRESIDENT.

We want to call your attention to a Berlin, Germany, dispatch published on page one of today's News-Review. It reads thusly: "His achievements are compared with those of Nikolai Lenin, the Tages Zeitung declaring 'the great difference between them was that Wilson conferred on other nations the blessings of his disastrous experiment while Lenin made only his own people victims.'" And the Boersen Zeitung, another German publication, referring to our beloved ex-president, remarks: "One of our taskmasters has gone to his grave." Thus you have a sample of real German five-years-after-the-war thought. They still find it difficult to speak a good word even for the dead, but on the contrary that devilish hatred uppermost in their minds during the World War needs only a spark to kindle into a raging and destructive flame, eating at the very vitals of our country. With such glaring aspersions bespattering the body of a dead hero is there any wonder that red blooded Americans are reluctant to forget the war. It will ever remain a nightmare in their memory.

It is natural for youth to take far distant looks. Many young folks today look in a somewhat slighting way on the town where they have grown up. They think that far away scenes offer broader opportunities. Sometimes they do, for young people of a very exceptional type. But in the majority of cases, a young person does best in his home environment. He knows the ways of his home people, and how to adjust himself to their personalities, and ways of thinking. The acquaintance that a young person has in his home environment helps toward success. The young man starting life in some distant town must push himself entirely. In his home town, he has back of him whatever of friendship and reputation has been created by those who went before. It is a big asset. The young people should hesitate long before throwing it away and settling elsewhere.

COMPLAINT MADE BY
GERMAN GOVERNMENT

French Asked to Cease Hindering
Return of Persons Expelled
and to Fulfill Treaty
Obligations.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—The government has sent a new note to France emphasizing the heavy responsibility of the French government in the event of its failure to meet immediately its treaty obligations. The note complains that French civil and military support of the separatists whose bands are mostly composed of non-palatable elements, has entailed serious infringement of the sovereignty of the Reich and the oppression of seven hundred thousand defenseless persons.

The German government, therefore, again requests the French government to establish conditions in accordance with the treaty terms and to disarm the separatists and secure their evacuation from public buildings and allow unrestricted resumption of the activities of the German authorities.

The note further calls upon France to cease hindering the return of persons expelled and henceforth to refrain from all interference in German internal political affairs and particularly from all direct or indirect support of the rebellious elements in the occupied territory.

The German government has also addressed a note to France and Belgium urging the immediate withdrawal of the customs measures whereby it contends the occupied territory is from a political-economic point of view converted into completely foreign territory, so far as Germany is concerned. It alleges among other things that the importation of French and Belgian goods is favored by the reduction of the duties on these articles.

An official announcement in this regard says:

"The loss of German economy and German finance is enormous. The earnest and hitherto successful attempt by the German government to stabilize its budget will be jeopardized if this state of affairs is allowed to continue."

CITY ELECTION IS
DECLARED BE LEGAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Feb. 5.—The election of three city commissioners at Oregon City on December 18, last was legal, the supreme court held today in the case of the state, by the district attorney of Clackamas county on relation of William H. Sloane, plaintiff, against Willa M. Andersen, C. H. Kaufeld and Frank H. Cross. The three latter were elected city commissioners under a new commission form of government established by the election. The friendly proceeding was instituted in the supreme court to determine the legality of the election. The opinion was written by Chief Justice McCall.

Other opinions handed down today were:
Emma Harrison, appellant, vs. F. R. Beale; appeal from Tillamook county; suit to collect on promissory note; opinion by Justice Burnett; Judge George R. Bagley, reversed and case remanded.

Leo D. Schmidt vs. Jackson county Creamery, et al., appellant, appeal from Jackson county; suit involving accounting; appeal dismissed in opinion by the court.
In the matter of the petition of J. L. Reader, et al., for locating and establishing county road on Sauvie Island number 911, appeal from Multnomah county; appeal by land owners from order of the circuit court for Multnomah county upon verdict of the jury awarding damages by reason of laying out of county road through their land. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge H. H. Bell, affirmed.

Astoria National Bank, appellant, vs. State Bank of Portland; appeal from Multnomah county; suit to compel Frank C. Bramwell, as superintendent of banks, to deliver plaintiff a promissory note for \$7,500. Opinion by Justice Rand; Judge Walter H. Evans affirmed.
Elizabeth Bagley, appellant, vs. William Bagley Jr., et al.; appeal from Washington county; suit to contest will; opinion by Justice Burnett; Judge George G. Bigham, affirmed.

F. R. Beale, et al. vs. Ama Harrison, appellant; appeal from Tillamook county; suit to cancel mortgages; opinion by Justice Burnett; Judge George H. Bagley reversed and case remanded.

TODAY'S BANK ROBBERY

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—The Eureka Valley branch of the Bank of Italy at seventeenth and Castro streets was entered by three young bandits today and robbed of \$6,000 in coin and currency after four employees of the bank had been locked in the vault and another in a closet. The bandits escaped in an automobile.

The three men entered the bank with drawn pistols and demanded all of the money in sight. They were refused. They then herded the three men clerk and one woman clerk into the vault and locked the janitor in a closet. The janitor broke from the closet after a few minutes and called the police. The others were liberated from the vault.
The bandits scooped up approximately \$6,000, but they overlooked a large quantity of silver.

BRITISH OPINION UPHOLDS
BATTLESHIPS IN WARFARE

(Associated Press.)

LONDON, Feb. 4.—England has been interested in a debate as to whether the modern battleship had not been rendered obsolete by the airplane. Admiral Mark Kerr took the affirmative and Viscount Curzon the negative. The decision favored the arguments of Curzon.

The Viscount contended that whether or not the present type of capital ship was obsolete depended on whether the battleship could be destroyed by underwater boats or by aircraft. Jutland proved that the bomb and torpedo had not gained ascendancy over the heavy gun. Gunfire had an accuracy far above that of the weapons of submarines or planes. Experiments purporting to show that the big ship was at the mercy of hovering planes had been carried out, but the target ship was an obsolete one, and the test had been carried out in fair weather and perfect water. The battleship still remained the greater factor of naval strength.
