MANY SEEK JOB
AS SECRETARY

SALEM, Feb. 5.—With the resignation of Ward A. Irvine as private secretary to Governor Pierce believed to be due about February 15, a number of names are being mentioned as possible successors to the position.

Those being mentioned most prominently are those of M. J. Brown, former newspaperman and now connected with the state market agent's office; Miss Celia D. Dillmann, head stenographer in the governor's office; Major W. P. Simpson, acting secretary of the state bonus and loan commission, and Milton L. Miller, democratic warhorse for many years.

It is understood that Miller has had an application on file for the position for several months. This, it is believed, was filed on a former occasion when the resignation of Irvine was rumored. Since then Miller has become a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator, and for that reason he may not push his candidacy for the secretaryship.

One rumor is that the governor offered the position to M. J. Brown, but that Brown declined it.

For many years the position has been held by newspapermen.

SEARCHERS SEEK
MISSING PASTOR

TACOMA, Feb. 5.—Searching parties were searching in Puget Sound here today for the body of Rev. Arthur De Jacoby, formerly pastor of the Roosevelt Heights Christian church. The pastor's boat was found drifting in the narrows near Salmon Beach Monday afternoon and whether he has been the victim of accidental death, of suicide, or has mysteriously disappeared is a problem facing local police.

Found in the boat were a hat and coat, identified as that of Rev. De Jacoby. An overshoe was also found floating near the beach. No indications were found in the boat as to whether De Jacoby had landed or had been the victim of suicide or accident. De Jacoby's auto was found near the Point Defiance pavilion.

Rev. De Jacoby resigned from his pastorate about two weeks ago, but since that time has still been working in connection with the church.

When Rev. De Jacoby left home Monday morning, he told his wife that he was going fishing. Mrs. De Jacoby urged her husband to postpone the fishing trip, but he replied that he "felt poorly and that fishing was the only thing that would do him in good."

train at that place. An ice coated windshield that dimmed his view was blamed. Victor Compton, 60, was probably fatally injured at Flint, when he was run down by a truck.

Icy rails that prevented an inter-urban car from stopping in time, caused the death of Mrs. Esther Wilson, 45 and Mrs. Doris Ruhn, 40, late last night at a grade crossing near Vipsillante. Their auto was demolished and the women were instantly killed. Rain and sleet driven by a high wind caused considerable discomfort in New York City and reports from up-state indicated the storm was increasing. A moderate temperature was reported.

MILWAUKEE, Feb. 5.—Three persons are dead, a dozen injured and property damage estimated at \$1,000 is the result of the most paralyzing storm in 40 years which began yesterday at noon and continued throughout the night. John Greits, 40, Joseph Doyle, 52 and Carl Anderson, 32, died during the night from exhaustion caused by battles with the blizzard in an attempt to reach their homes. Many others fought the elements during the night after street cars and taxicabs had given up the battle, while hundreds crowded downtown hotels, not attempting to leave the business district.

of his responsibilities in the war years.

The marines will come from the ships and posts about Washington and among them will be veterans of the hard-fought fields in France where American valor claimed and received its recognition from the world. They will be picked men of the service to whom this honor falls. In like manner the eight army sergeants were being selected. Records of personnel in all posts from which men could be drawn were examined to locate war heroes as far as possible to bear this fallen war president to his last rest. It was fitting that such comrades should bear him gently to his quiet resting place.

Still today there was demand on many sides that a last moment change would be made and more elaborate ceremonies mark the funeral. There were many like Senator Johnson, who believed that this dead son of Virginia, mother of presidents, should go back to sleep in Virginia. It was this feeling that prompted the suggestion that entombment should be in the memorial amphitheatre at Arlington where America's unknown already stands guard. Home felt that the permanent resting place of Mr. Wilson, war president and himself struck down by the war as surely as any of the glorious dead who sleep on the hillsides beneath the unknown's resting place, could be within that stately enclosure sacred to the memory of those who have died for the flag.

The offer of sepulchre in this hallowed circle was promptly made. Perhaps there is a legal barrier, since the law says that no monument or vault shall be placed within the memorial structure until him to whom honor is done shall have been a decade dead. Secretary Weeks made it plain that no narrow legal construction would stand in the way in opening the last haven of patriotic Americans to the war, since none could doubt that congress would approve in such a case the disregard of that restriction.

Mrs. Wilson had her way, however, and the marble vault under the great church that looks down on the house where he died will hold her husband's honored casket until the form and manner of his final resting place can be determined.

COUNCIL GETS IN
SERIOUS TANGLE

large lawn. With no alterations they would provide the city with one of the most beautiful small rest parks in the state, and would fill one of Roseburg's greatest needs.

The house now standing on the lot is large and with little expense could be made over into a suitable library building. The fact that the site is close to the business center, but yet off the main street far enough to be free from noise, makes the place ideal, the council believes.

This property can be acquired for only \$9,700 and it will require only a small amount to put the building in suitable shape for use as a library. The council considers this to be the best proposition for the city and desires to proceed with that project.

At the regular session last night the recorder read two ordinances, one providing for a vote on the bond issue in the sum of \$18,000 and the other on a bond issue of \$9,700 the former for the Woman's club site and the other for the Marsters property, and it was decided to submit both propositions to the voters at a special election. The council took a recess while a special committee selected judges and clerks of election so that the ordinance might be completed and while this was being done an informal discussion took place.

G. V. Wimberly asked the council if they intended to kill the library project and when the council emphatically denied that it had such purpose he informed them that such would be the effect of their action in submitting both propositions, and when an inquiry was made into this assertion, it was found that it would be impossible to put over either measure unless the citizens were unanimous on one proposition.

As a basis of figuring it was supposed that 2,000 votes might be cast. It was figured that 1,500 people would be for a library but would be divided regarding the site, and 500 people would be opposed to both sites, and if such should be the case, both measures would be lost. If 500 people should favor the Marsters property they would vote no on the club site making 1400 no to 600 yes, and if 600 people favored the club site, they would vote no on the Marsters property, making 1100 no and 900 yes, defeating both propositions in spite of a three-to-one vote in favor of a library building.

Faced by this state of affairs the council became greatly puzzled. It does not dare submit both measures at one election for fear of killing the library entirely. Both can be submitted at special elections, but it would not be fair to the supporters of the different sites to offer one before the other. At the same time an initiative petition for an election on \$18,000 worth of bonds specifying no site, but providing money for the acquisition of land. The Woman's club wants one site and the council is convinced that the other is a better business proposition, and that it is favored by more people. Such is the tangled state of affairs and the position in which the council found itself last night when an adjournment was called to give a week in which to endeavor to find some solution.

One plan was offered and is to be investigated and may be put before the voters.

The city has a bridge and park fund amounting to \$10,000 provided for in the last budget. With this money it could buy the Marsters property outright, and would then have two sites for a library building. The initiative measure could then be submitted to the people calling for the issuance of bonds up to the sum of \$18,000 and at the same time the people could vote upon the sites offered and select the one upon which they believe the library should stand, or the council could proceed to use its own judgment on the site. If the Marsters site should be selected, the council would issue only the amount of bonds needed to put that place into shape, while if the other should be taken the council would construct a new building costing the full \$18,000 and would still have a rest park. This proposal is under investigation at the present time and an effort will be made to arrange some way in which the library matter can be put before the people with complete fairness to all interested and in a manner which will determine completely the desire of the voters.

WINNER IS ANNOUNCED.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 5.—Charles Herbert Levermore of New York, student of international relations, writer and former college professor, was announced as the winner of the \$100,000 prize offered by Edward Bok for the best plan to preserve peace among the nations of the world.

Levermore was announced the winner by John W. Davis, of the policy committee of the American Peace Award. Davis also presented him with \$50,000, half of Bok's prize and the remainder will be given only if the plan is accepted by congress.

Levermore's plan was number 1469 in a total of 22,165 received.

WILL GO SOUTH

The Roseburg high school basketball team will leave Friday morning on their trip south for their first games in the Southern Oregon conference. The first game will be played at Ashland on Friday night and on Saturday night the local boys will meet the husky Medford team. The latter game is expected to be hard fought and the outcome will have a decided effect upon the Southern Oregon championship and possibly the state championship.

The Roseburg team is especially strong this year, and is in good shape at the present time. The two games with the Eugene high school teams gave the locals some excellent training in preparation for the season, and they have been greatly benefitted by the experience gained in these two hard-fought battles.

In the game with the University high school of Eugene, last year's state champions, the Roseburg boys displayed a decided improvement over their playing of the previous game, when they lost to the Eugene high school. Since their last contest they have made still further forward strides and are determined to return to Roseburg on Sunday with the scalps of the Ashland and Medford basket tossers.

The Roseburg defense is almost perfect and is a puzzle to all opponents. The boys have a system which keeps the opposing team guessing all the time, and the players against Roseburg have a hard time getting within scoring distance of the basket.

Although Roseburg's offensive has been a little weak, it is showing considerable improvement, and the boys are being drilled hard by Coach Larsen on basket tossing, so that they are converting more and more of their attempts at each practice. Roseburg has a team which will give a good account of itself in the fight for the state championship.
