Word has reached here that the Narwhal cleared from Noumea, New Caledonia and she is believed to be continuing her cruise among islands peopled by savages.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—The bark Narwhal was reported to be lost when Captain A. C. Wilvers of the American ship Muscovite reported here January 23, that he sailed from Sydney November 4, for Noumea and had not been heard from for several weeks, although she should have made the passage in 12 days.

Word has reached here that the Narwhal cleared from Noumea, New Caledonia and she is believed to be continuing her cruise among islands peopled by savages.

The Narwhal's crew is an unusual one. Only Captain Charles Arce, the commander, and her mate are professional seamen. The others are adventurous men of middle age, from many countries, but most of them are Americans. The majority served in the world war.

The crew includes a Russian count, a British aviator, former American army and navy officers and several retired business men. They formed a corporation and each contributed \$800. Murray N. Fay, motion picture man, is one of the leaders of the expedition which left San Francisco February 28, 1923.
