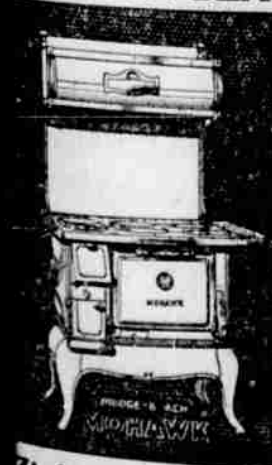

BROCCOLI TRAINS IN RACE TO EAST

Would Be Biggest Publicity Stunt Possible Says Foster Butner in Interview.

BE ROUTED TWO WAYS

One Train Would Go South and Another North to See Which Would Reach the East First.

"Solid trains of broccoli from the Umpqua Valley straight through to Chicago will be a wonderful means of publicity for both the commodity and the valley," said Foster Butner, manager of the local Broccoli Exchange, in an interview with a representative of the News-Review today.

"It seems to me," Mr. Butner continued, "that we should go the limit in this matter of publicity. With the movie people on the job, taking views of the fields, the harvesting, the packing, hauling to loading stations, loading into cars, being the cars, then showing the entire trainload, with banners displayed, as the train pulled out would bring more publicity to Roseburg along commercial lines, than we have ever received heretofore. To complete the story, photographs should be taken at Chicago showing the arrival of the train, the unloading of the cars, the selling of the broccoli in South Water street, display of our fine broccoli in the best retail stores of the city, and as a finale, the happy expression upon the faces of the consumers as they partook of our delicious product."

"It has been suggested to me that still greater publicity might be given these trainloads of broccoli by routing one train via Roseville, California, and the other by the way of Portland, Oregon. It could be arranged for our train to go via one route, and the train of other shippers via the other route—both trains leaving Roseburg simultaneously. There has been considerable controversy as to the superiority of these two routes, and such a test would not only make a great publicity stunt but would decide, probably as could be decided in no other way, which of the two routes is the better. "Some of the early strains of broccoli are beginning to come in. Receipts are gradually increasing and it now looks as though we will be able to get our first carload either Friday or Saturday. This will be the earliest car upon record from the state of Oregon."

MAN IS KILLED IN JUMP FROM TRESTLE

Dan Murphy, a transient aged about 47 years, whose residence is believed to be at San Luis Obispo, died at noon today as he was being carried into Mercy Hospital, death being the result of a fractured skull when he jumped from a trestle over Cabin Creek near Leona. When found a short time later, Murphy was conscious and said that he jumped to avoid being struck by a gas-line speeder. He gave his name and age and residence, but nothing was learned of any relatives. He carried a heavy pack, but no papers of identification. He has been employed at Kelso by the O. W. R. and N. he said. He was picked up by a southbound freight and brought to Roseburg and died as he was being taken in to the hospital, the body being turned over to Coroner Ritter, who is endeavoring to locate relatives.

BAD ROAD STRIP WILL BE IMPROVED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—The most heavily traveled piece of bad road in the state is to be turned, as soon as possible, into the finest piece of show road between Washington and California; the state highway commission decided today.

The commission authorized a call for bids to pave the 19½ miles that now connects Albany and Corvallis. Bids will be opened February 27. The strip will be concrete, eighteen feet wide. It will connect the East Side and West Side Pacific highways.

The new Albany bridge will be a part of it.

The commission also decided to open bids at its next meeting for rock surfacing nine miles of the Crater Lake highway. This will complete the surfacing of the road from Medford to the forest boundary by closing a gap between Medford and Cascade Gorge.

The commission protested to the state engineer against permitting the California-Oregon Power company diverting the waters from Mill and Red Bluff creeks on the Crater Lake highway. This action would wipe out Mill Creek Falls, one of the most beautiful sights along that scenic road.

The government forest and road services have also objected to the power company's proposed action.

the validity of the income tax will be attacked will be:

That the section of the law imposing income tax on non-residents of Oregon, either individuals or corporations, is void because of uncertainty of meaning and attempt to reach earnings outside of Oregon over which this state has no jurisdiction.

That as to dividends of corporations distributed to Oregon residents the section is void because the same method of distribution is not applied to non-residents, even though they are tax payers in Oregon, thus constituting discrimination.

That the constitution of Oregon does not permit graduated scales of taxation.

That the tax law is so worded that those engaged in business in this state are taxable on all incomes whether or not derived from such business.

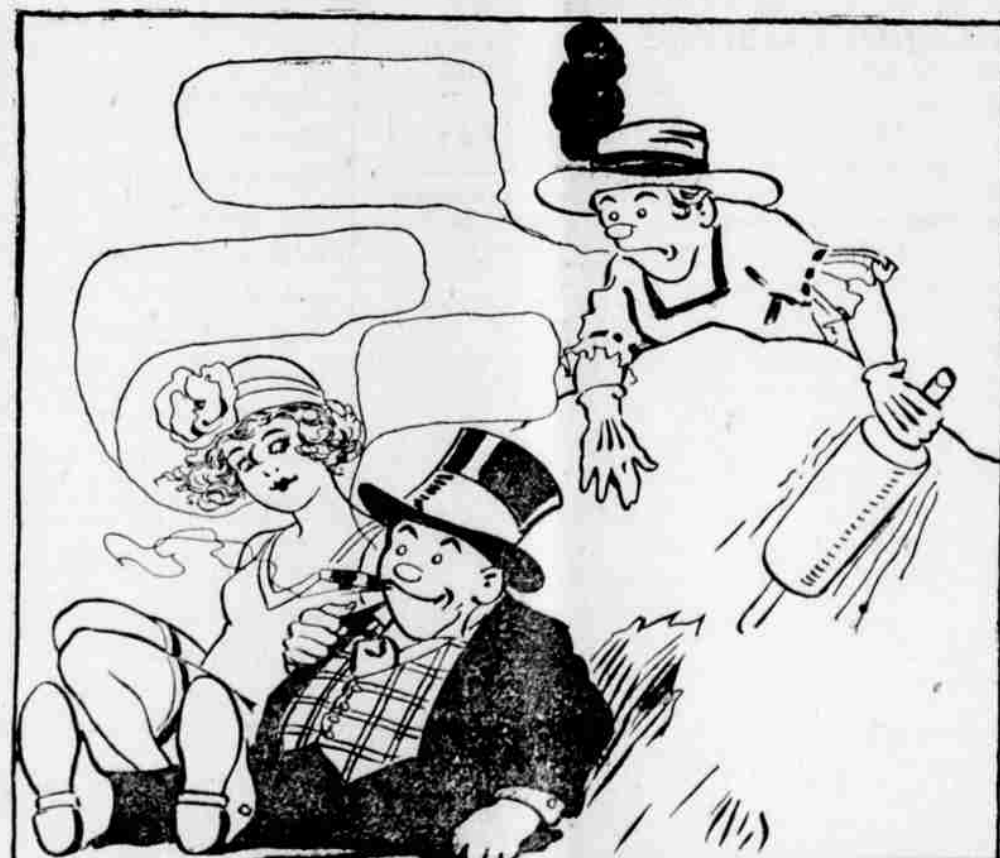
