CLAM HUNTERS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

MARSHFIELD, Feb. 6.—After an exciting battle with the waves, three men, G. H. Rutherford and R. L. Milburn, longshoremen, and H. Paulsen, Stout lumber company employee, yesterday escaped possible drowning and the loss of their boat when they attempted crossing the Coss Bay channel off the north jetty in a small power boat during a sudden squall.

The men were on a clam-hunting expedition on the jetty when the storm rose. Hoping to return to the mainland before the waves rose to serious proportions, the men embarked and set out. It was with great difficulty, the men narrate, that the boat was launched from the shore without being buffeted back to land. The waves rose so high that they swept over the small boat, nearly swamping it. And stalling the engine in mid-channel, Paulsen, with clam-shovels, the men headed the boat into the waves until the engine was started again and managed to negotiate the rough channel into the smoother water of the bay without further mishaps. They arrived in North Bend late yesterday, soaked and chilled but otherwise uninjured. They reported the power boat undamaged.

EUGENE TO ENFORCE ITS CURFEW ORDINANCES

EUGENE, Feb. 7.—The city curfew law, the law which prohibits the sale of tobacco in any form to minors and the law which prohibits minors from loitering in pool halls is being enforced to the best ability of the police, said Chief W. G. Judkins, yesterday.

The Federation of Women's organizations a short time ago asked the police to enforce all these ordinances and the request is being complied with, said the chief. The officers be-

gan to enforce the curfew ordinance a month or two ago he said, and as a result not many boys under 16 are seen on the streets late at night. The law provides that all children under 16 shall be off the streets by 9 a. m., unless accompanied by parents or someone else to look after them. This hour applies in winter time and 9:30 in the summer.

The chief said he found a good many minors in pool halls yesterday and he ordered them all out. The law applies to students of the university as well as to anyone else.

TEAM OWNERS BUSY GROOMING ENTRIES IN FAMOUS DOG DERBY

ASHTON, Idaho, Feb. 4.—(A. P.)—The American Dog Derby, to be run here February 22, has taken on an international aspect with the entry of a team from Canada. A competitor from Alaska also is anticipated.

Whether Canadian or Alaskan dogs, trained for long drags instead of for speed, will be able to hold their own with the fast American teams of this section is a dispute unsettled, but Idahoans generally are willing to "bet their shirts" on their entries.

Miss Lydia Hutchinson, heroine of past Ashton races and nationally known as a pilot of dog teams, will drive the Canadian team. She was last reported in Montreal picking out her dogs, which will be entered under the colors of the Montreal winter sports committee. Heretofore "Lydia," as she is known in this section, has driven her teams with excellent results. She always was among the first to cross the finish line. In the last year, however, she has had ill luck with her dogs, many of which have died of some strange malady.

Several drivers already are here, putting their team through practice. The youthful Oleott Zarn is among them.

"Smoky" Gaston, the present champion, whose team won last year by a few seconds, has his dogs about 60 miles from Ashton. In the Targhee Forest is the hunting lodge of William Knoch, who until put out of the race by a sick dog made a wonderful showing in the last derby. On the Buffalo river, also in the Targhee, is "Tud" Kent, former American champion and acknowledged one of the crack dog drivers and trainers of the world. He is intent on recovering the honors which Gaston lifted from him last year.

This city lies to the southwest of Yellowstone National Park. During the winter months it is the meeting point of the railroad to the south and the snow trails to the north.

Race officials are making elaborate preparations to care for visitors this year, as the event has been growing in interest annually.

Beauty Congress Meeting In France Sounds Death Knell of Bobbed Hair



PARIS — Bobbed hair, like hooped skirts, is passé. For months the style has been dying a painless death. Now it is officially laid to rest by the International Hairdressers' Congress, the recognized style group. In tolling its death knell, coiffure experts declare "all Europe has quit bobbing and the mademoiselles with short locks are wearing transformations." Reports from American beauty experts also show bobbing is on the wane and "in six months will be atrociously unpopular, if not in utter bad taste."

Accordingly, three new modes of hairdressing that permit the wearing of false hair will prevail among women of taste in 1934. They are the Empress Josephine, with hair drawn back and a cord or band around the temples; Louis Philippe, with chignon curls clustered around neck and ears, and Empress Eugenie, with two bands across the forehead and curl falling over each ear. Transformations, deftly worn, will be covered with reliable invisible human hair nets now used for

all evening and dress wear. Greater demand for hair nets, it is declared, was one of the first signs of the passing of bobs, over six million Gainsboroughs being sold in 1923.

"Bobs are gone, but after all who cares?" sighed the chairman in adjourning the congress.
