EXECUTION STAY IS ORDERED TODAY

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) MOSCOW, Feb. 7.—A stay of execution in the death sentence against General Popelayev, former commander of the Siberian White Army and 20 of his followers, has been ordered by the Siberian revolutionary committee. The committee has also asked the federal central executive to pardon the prisoners, declaring that the present strength of the Soviet federation permits the proletariat to forego revenge. Popelayev and his men were condemned by the military tribunal at Chita for their counter-revolutionary activities in Siberia after Kolchak's defeat.

It has occurred to the writer many times that someone should push the doors of the Umpqua Valley wide open and let the rest of the one hundred and ten millions of people know just what our valley is like and what a wealth of meaning there is in the name "Umpqua."

Here's a grand opportunity to lay aside all peanut personalities and boost the big thing even to donning our overalls and helping to load the train and starting it on its way.

FARM REMINDERS

(O. A. C. Experiment Station)

It is customary to run the incubator for several days before the eggs are put in to make sure that it will maintain an even temperature. Many thousands of eggs are spoiled annually because this advice is not followed.

Moss and lichens on fruit trees may be quickly destroyed during the winter by spraying with ordinary lye at the rate of 1 pound to 6 or 8 gallons of water. If San Jose or other scale is present add the lye dissolved in a little water to the usual winter strength lime-sulfur. Thorough spraying of this solution will remove both the moss and scale. Lye removes moss most rapidly but not permanently. For permanent prevention the usual Bordeaux spray is recommended. Applied for apple tree anthracnose, peach leaf curl, and prune and cherry blossom blight it will prevent the moss from developing.

Start preparing the brooder house as soon as the eggs are put in the incubator. Clean and spray it thoroughly, put some clean sand on the floor, and make certain that the heater is working properly.

A successful farmer is the one who takes advantage of the experiences of others. Bearing this in mind, the farmer can make the best use of his time at this season of the year by catching up on the reading that he has neglected during the summer.

The heavier breeds of chickens should be hatched by February so they will mature in time for heavy fall production. March and April is the best time for hatching the egg breeds as they mature faster. If hatched at this time the birds get the benefit of better feed and range conditions, and the invigorating influence of the hot weather.

Lambing season in the Willamette valley is now on. The little lambs should be docked as early as possible, preferably before they are 10 days old. Otherwise, rush of other farm work is apt to cause neglect, resulting in lambs going to market with long tails. Undocked

It is a good plan to start the stove in the brooder 2 or 3 days before the hatch comes off so the young chicks will be dry and warm for the young chicks. The temperature should be approximately the same as that of the incubator for the first week, and reduced gradually.
