"The Witness, Albert B. Fall, having refused to answer any questions that might be put to him touching the matters under investigation by the committee on the ground that his testimony might tend to incriminate him and the committee being advised by counsel that the statute providing that a witness should not be excused from testifying before a congressional committee on such grounds, be it in or out of scope than the constitutional guaranty, so that proceedings for contempt or by indictment against the witness for contumacy would probably fail, and that if the witness proceeded to testify before the committee under protest he might gain immunity from prosecution and the committee being advised by the attorney for the witness that his purpose was to stand on his constitutional rights, the committee moved that the subpoena issued for the witness, Albert B. Fall, be vacated and that he be released from further attendance on the committee."

"The danger of proceeding along these lines is that in the prosecution of a witness who might subsequently be indicted for an offense about which he is compelled to testify, the line of distinction between the evidence which the defendant was compelled to give and the other evidence obtained as the result of his testimony might be so indefinite as to make it practically impossible to distinguish, and therefore, the probability of a conviction would be increased."

"Indeed the testimony of the witness and the other evidence might be so commingled as to preclude the acceptance of any evidence concerning the subject matter."

"In view of the provisions of the fifth amendment of the constitution permitting Mr. Fall to testify unless he waives his constitutional privilege.
