What God Says about THE PEOPLE PAUL OWED

"I am debtor to the Greek and to the Barbarian; both to the wise and to the unwise."

What was it Paul owed? He tells us in another place, where he urges us to "owe no man anything but to love one another."

It is love, God's love, that made him bankrupt. But, mind you, not love that he didn't have, but love that he actually possessed. And the trouble was that he hadn't the strength and the omnipresence—hadn't the distribution facilities to get the goods out to his creditors. Oh, how poor that ought to make you and me feel—poor that we have so small a conception of the Christ-love debt we owe. And as I write, it does make me feel poor, and so I continue to write of the love of God.

But who was it Paul owed? The Greeks who didn't want the love of God, because they had so much else, and the Barbarians who had so little else that they were glad to hear the story of one who loved them to the death. Paul owed the wise, even though they repudiated the divine coin of love and chose the counterfeit stuff they themselves issued and put their own image and superscription upon. Yes, and he owed the unwise, who would some day find out how unwise they were and would want love with the divine imprint.

And you and I owe the same sorts of people. We owe the rich, and we ought to pay them the love that will be coin which they can use in heaven. Aye, they may not take it, but we owe it to them just the same—owe it in sacrificial life as well as in warning word. We owe the poor divine love more than we owe them bread, but we can often pay the one at the same time that we minister the other.

Yes, we owe so much and so many that, as for me, I have made an assignment, and I have made the Holy Spirit receiver of the assets—divine assets of my life—and I am trusting Him to pay, through me, as fast as He will, or as Paul says, "As much as in me lies," to all the creditors He can reach through me. What say you? Are you, fellow Christians, ready to let the Spirit take your life and pay out God's love through it?

CITY OF RIDDLE TO CONDEMN PARK

A complaint has been filed in the circuit court by the city of Riddle against H. Wollenberg and P. W. Diddel to condemn the cedar grove park which for a number of years has been used as a park for celebrations and picnics by the people of this community and which is known by several different names, probably the best-known of which is the "Barbecue Park," says the Riddle Enterprise.

This park, consisting of several acres, is one of the most beautiful spots in the county. It has a growth of fine large cedar trees on the bank of the Azalea river, just in the edge of town and is within easy access from the city with a small amount of work on the old roadway.

In the past the owners of the land have always been glad to allow the public the free use of the grounds and pavilion for celebrations and picnics at those seasons when they were not used for sheep corrals etc., but the city desires to repair the building, string electric lights, erect dressing rooms and fix up the natural swimming hole for the benefit of the whole community. The road will also be repaired to enable cars to drive in at any time.

All of these improvements would cost considerable money and the city could not make the investment on private property when the right to enter and use same might be revoked at any time, hence the condemnation proceedings.

Several attempts have been made to purchase the park from the owners of the land without success, and as the state law makes provisions for the condemnation of land for playground and park purposes this course has been decided upon in this case.

If successful in its suit, the city of Riddle will have the finest park of any town of its size in the state.

The pavilion was erected in 1915 by the Riddle Rod and Gun club for use at the venison barbecue celebrations, which at that time were annual affairs. The building was later deeded to the city and is still city property.

U. OF O. SELECTS ATHLETIC COACH

EUGENE, Feb. 8.—Joseph H. Maddock, an assistant to "Hurricane" Yost of Michigan in 1920 and 1921, was named coach of football at the University of Oregon at a meeting of the executive council of the Associated Students here last night. He will succeed Charles Huntington, who resigned the position here December 4, after serving six years.

Maddock began his athletic career at the University of Michigan in 1902 and in 1903 was named by Walter Camp as a member of the all-western football team. Yost and others at this time named him as an all-American tackle. Previous to his service with Yost in 1920, Maddock was coach at Utah for six years, and during this time turned out championship teams in football, basketball and track. He is now a business man at Idaho Falls, Idaho, and for the past two years has been coaching the local high school gratuitously.

Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics, recommended Maddock to the student council, following an extended scouting trip through the east. No terms of contract, nor the amount of salary were given out tonight.

Yost of Michigan highly recommended Maddock to Virgil Earl and said of him "Maddock is one of the greatest tackles I have ever known. I consider him an excellent football coach with fine enthusiasm and personality."

In addition to being a star football player, the new coach was at one time champion wrestler of Michigan and was prominent in track and other athletics. It is not known when he will assume his duties at the University of Oregon but he is expected to report for spring football practice.

NO TRACE FOUND OF MISSING MAN
