G. O. P. MUST CLEAN HOUSE JOHNSON SAYS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The republican party must clean house or the people will do it for them, Senator Hiram W. Johnson, candidate for the republican nomination for president declared in a statement issued today.

The senator characterized as "ridiculous and absurd," recent "mysterious and anonymous" assertions by Coolidge managers that the president already is virtually assured of more than enough convention votes to nominate.

"They follow the regular course of a Bourbon campaign—to claim all while putting every obstacle in the way of free expression or fair contest," he continued.

"If there were any such feeling of security or any such certainty of success, it would be necessary to steal delegates in the south or deny primaries in the north like in Minnesota.

"These Bourbon republicans, who control the republican machinery have a rude awakening before them and they may just as well make up their minds now as next June, that the republican party must clean house and if the republicans themselves don't clean their house and clean it thoroughly, the people will do it for them."

DRIVE TO RAISE FUNDS IS MADE

A campaign to raise funds for the support of the Louise Home for girls and the Albertina Kerr Nursery Home, two schools which are carried on under the direction of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective Society, is being made in Roseburg during this week. The different grade schools of the city have taken up the work here and will conduct a tag sale on the streets tomorrow. The tags are to be sold for twenty-five cents each and it is expected the Roseburg people will support the movement. AN ARCHITECTURAL ACHIEVEMENT

The new Federal Reserve Bank building of St. Louis is on the way to completion. It is an architectural achievement. It combines a massive wall treatment suggestive of the age-old dignity of Egyptian prototypes with a grouping of the related parts to indicate their true inter-relation.

Most important in a federal reserve bank is the quick and economical passage of its currency and securities through the various channels. In this respect the architectural design is unique. The great main floor banking section is tied to its direct control, the offices quarters, on the second floor, with a filing floor. This filing floor, unobtrusively between the two, is easily accessible to both. Above are the two floors for the clerical force. The whole is crisscrossed by an attic story, having for employees, architects designed the building are Mauran, Russell & Corwell, St. Louis.

To attain massive design without sacrificing practicability and to

produce a texture of warmth and charm Indiana limestone was used. Most other federal reserve banks are constructed of this material having remarkable weathering qualities. Unlike other stone it is available in huge dimensions free from blemish. Uniformity of the blocks in the great wall surfaces of bush-hammered finish and the sharpness of the clean-cut mouldings add greatly to the beauty of the new St. Louis structure.

Simplicity, texture and scale are the dominant notes in the exterior design of this monumental building.

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
