POLITICAL JOURNALISM.

It is frequently charged that the editorial policies of newspapers are purchasable, that publishers and editors will give their support to certain candidates and parties if they are given financial support and withhold it if they are not thus favored. No doubt instances can be found where that happens. Our observation, however, would suggest that newspapermen are fellows of pretty strong convictions who rarely do that kind of thing. The average editor and publisher is not a man who is in the business with money making as his first object. If these were his aims, he could usually find other occupations that would yield better returns. But there is a peculiar lure in the game that attracts men with the newspaper instinct. One of its rewards is the ability to take part in directing public opinion. A man who is interested in human progress and likes to express himself, values highly the chance to speak his mind in a newspaper. If he is asked to sell out this privilege, it is like asking him to sell one of the dearest ends in his life. Of course when men are associated with each other in newspaper production, either as partners or as employer and employee, some one must decide what the newspaper shall say, and one must sometimes yield his own ideas to meet the views of his associates. But as a rule men of sympathetic views tend to come together. Newspapers of course frequently print as political advertising views to which they do not assent, but it is generally customary to indicate that such notices are admitted as advertising. It seems a broad and liberal policy to admit such contrary views to a publication, but those who seek to express them ought to pay a reasonable price for the chance to get them before the public.

Some people carry the boosting spirit so far, that one gets tired of hearing the glories of their home towns extolled. But there are more folks who go equally far to the opposite extreme. They seem to want to give the impression that they feel superior to their own surroundings. It is out of that spirit that many town knockers are developed, who are constantly running down the conditions in the community in which they live. There is nothing winsome in that spirit, and people who have it rarely get the prizes of life. The big rewards go to the folks who are so overflowing with friendliness and enthusiasm, that they see everything in sanguine and happy colors. They would find pleasant and encouraging conditions anywhere. Their hopeful and optimistic spirit encourages other people to do things, and fills a town with a spirit of achievement such that it accomplishes positive results.
