NATIONAL GUARD TEAMS TO PLAY

Roseburg and Eugene to Tangle in Basketball Contest Here Wednesday.

HAVE HARD SCHEDULE

Roseburg Boys to Meet Cottage Grove Tonight and Will Play Eugene and Medford This Month.

The Roseburg National Guard basketball team has lined up some very promising and interesting games for this month. The first game will be played at Cottage Grove tonight, when the guardsmen tangle with the artillerymen of that city. The Cottage Grove team is big and heavy and the Roseburg team is fully as strong, and both are made up of experienced players so that the contest will be an interesting one. The local guardsmen will be accompanied by a number of rooters from this city.

Tomorrow night a fine game is to be played in this city, when the Roseburg and Eugene national guard teams tangle at the armory. The Eugene boys won last year by a small margin, and are coming down with the determination of again trimming up the Roseburg quintet. Roseburg however, does not expect to be trimmed, and a lively battle is certain.

On the 20th the local team goes to Medford for a game there, and Medford will play a return game here either the last of February or the first of March.

The armory floor is being put in fine shape for the game on Wednesday night, and will be one of the best basketball floors of the state when the game is called. The floor which is kept clean and smooth for dancing, is being thoroughly cleaned and scrubbed, so that the players' shoes will stick firmly and make the game fast. As the floor is large a great deal of open play is possible, and scientific basketball is assured.

The local team is made up of George Singleton and Harley Watson, forwards; Okey Taggart, center; Free Farmer, Charles Thurston, and Sam Campbell, guards. All of these players are experienced men in the game, all having been high school stars, while Taggart played on the O. A. C. varsity team. The local boys have been practicing every night and are in good condition, and should show their opponents some stiff basketball.

POWER RATES TO BE PROTESTED

City Council to Ask Reduction in Electrical Rates for Roseburg and Vicinity.

ACTION IS DEMANDED

City Attorney Instructed to Endeavor to Secure Co-Operation to Lower Power Rates.

The city of Roseburg will enter a formal protest against any increase in electrical rates for light and power, and, going further than that, will file with the public service commission a petition in which it will be set forth that the existing rates are too high, and will ask that the present schedule be lowered. This action was determined at a meeting of the city council last night, at which City Attorney Carl Wimberly was instructed to go to Medford to represent the city in a hearing to be held on Tuesday, February 19, on the application of the California-Oregon Power Company for a new schedule of rates to be effective over the entire system. The city attorney was authorized to get in touch with the city attorneys in Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties, all of which are served by the California-Oregon Power Company, and see if some united and cooperative effort cannot be made to obtain a uniform reduction, rather than an increase as is being asked by the company. As the time is short it is very probable that an extension of time to secure data and information to place before the commission in support of the city's claim, will be requested.

At the meeting of the city council last night, Recorder Whipple read a notice from the public service commission stating that a hearing will be held at Medford on Tuesday, February 19, at which time the application of the California-Oregon Power Company for a new rate schedule will be heard. This was the first official notice received by the city, the recorder stated, although he was personally advised that the company had filed its petition and that the proposed schedule could be seen at any time at the company's office. The city was not furnished with a copy of the new tariff, he stated, and no formal notice of the filing of the petition had been given by the public service commission. In view of the fact that the city has had, no time in which to arrange and prepare data on which to base its objection, it is quite probable that City Attorney Wimberly will request further time in which to prepare the city's protest, and also will ask time to arrange the city's application for lower rates.

The council expressed the opinion that the power rates in Roseburg are too high. There has been a constant increase over a period of several years it was stated, and since the new company took over the control, there has been an appreciable increase in all bills. This increase, it was thought, is due largely to the increased voltage causing more electricity to be consumed, but many protests have reached the ears of the mayor and members of the council. The city has found its own bills materially higher, and it is claimed that the charge at present is too high and that a reduction should be made rather than an increase.

The new rates, as proposed by the company, it is stated, will make a slight increase over the entire division, and will make increases in some classes and reductions in others. The new schedule of rates would make the rates uniform over the entire system, and would give the same rates to all cities served in Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Douglas counties.

MUMMY OF KING TUT IS FOUND

Tutankhamen's Sarcophagus Is Most Splendid Ever Found in Egypt.

CASE 3 METERS LONG

Effigy of Ancient Pharaoh Appears in Relief on Mummy Case—Gem-Studded Headpiece.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LUXOR, Egypt, Feb. 12.—The lid of Tutankhamen's sarcophagus was raised today. It is understood the body of the king was found within. Mr. Carter opened the tomb at 10:15 a. m. Shortly afterward the police guard above the tomb came to attention as the under secretary for public works, accompanied by the provincial governor arrived. At Mr. Carter's invitation the officials entered the tomb where they inspected the sarcophagus and the gear in readiness for the lifting of the lid, afterward visiting the laboratory in the tomb of Seti II nearby.

The government's decision to keep today's operation private caused disappointment among the archaeologists working at Thebes whom Mr. Carter had invited to attend the opening of the coffin.

When the lid was raised there was revealed the most splendid mummy case ever found in Egypt. It is about three meters long.

The mummy case bears an effigy in relief of the king wearing the gems or sacred head dress like that of the sphynx, draped with the head of a hawk and a serpent in pure gold set with lapis lazuli. The hands are crossed, one bearing a crooked sceptre and the other a fillet.

A pathetic touch is given the effigy by a little crown of withered natural colors set about the gold head-dress.

BISHOP KEATOR BURIED AT TACOMA TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 12.—Bishop Frederick W. Keator, was buried here today after two funeral services that marked his high standing as a church man and a citizen.

The first service, held in St. Luke's Pro-cathedral at 10:30 o'clock, was private and was restricted to the immediate family of the bishop, officers of the diocese and officers of St. Luke's, the faculty and alumnae of Annie Wright seminary and the clergy of the diocese and their wives.

The private funeral was followed by public services at noon in the Scottish rite cathedral, conducted by the right Rev. William F. Nichols, bishop of California.

Mr. Keator died on January 31, in New Haven, Conn., where he was visiting his son, Frederic W. Keator, Jr., a member of the Yale faculty.

He was one of the prominent members of the Masonic order in this section and was nationally known for his work as a shriner.

MARTIAL LAW WILL NOT BE INVOKED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) HERRIN, Ill., Feb. 12.—That Williamson county would not be placed under martial law, was the statement issued by Major-General Milton J. Foreman, in command of the two regiments of Illinois National guard troops stationed in the county to maintain law and order, following the disturbance Friday night when Constable Caesar Cagle was killed and Deputy Sheriff John Layman was wounded.

"The sole aid of the military forces is to exert and vindicate the supremacy of the law which will be enforced to the fullest extent," reads the last sentence of a statement signed by General Foreman, appearing in placards posted in every city and along all roads in the county.

Hereafter, carrying of firearms or other weapons by any duly authorized officers of the law, is prohibited and troops are instructed to confiscate all firearms and weapons so carried and to hold the offenders for appropriate action.

S. Glenn Young, leader of the Klan forces in Williamson county and acting chief of police of Herrin until John Ford, the regular chief of police resumed office today, after being "kidnapped" left last night for his home at Marion. Young said he would leave the last of the week for Washington in response to a letter from W. A. Anderson, Chicago chief of the general prohibition agents, directing him to finish the matter of preparing the first group of injunctions against alleged bootleggers arrested in the liquor raids.
