INVESTIGATE FRAUD CHARGES (Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Inquiry into charges of fraudulent land operations in Texas was ordered today by the senate in adopting a resolution offered by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama.

SIMMONS SEVERS KLAN CONNECTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 13.—Paul S. Etheridge, imperial klonsel of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, has issued a statement declaring the contract in which William Joseph Simmons, imperial emperor, relinquished all rights and interest in the order, was "so tight, he, Simmons, cannot bob up again." The Atlanta constitution says today. The statement followed the purported issuance of a statement by Simmons in Jacksonville last night, which quoted him as denying he had "sold out" for a consideration of \$145,500, and declared he had merely severed relations with the organization and has discounted his royalty of \$1,000 per month, which was being paid him for the use of the ritual which he is said to have copyrighted.

Attorney Ehringer, according to the constitution, announced that under the agreement with Simmons, all litigation pending between Simmons and imperial headquarters, instituting a libel suit filed by imperial wizard H. E. Evans against Simmons for \$150,000 in libel, Rock, Ark., would be terminated.

Reports from Little Rock stated that the imperial wizard's attorney in that city has announced the suit would not be dropped unless Simmons retracts on certain libelous statements concerning Evans.

DAUGHERTY DENIES MAKING STATEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Attorney-General Daugherty denied in a communication sent today to the senate that the department of agriculture had made any settlement in war contract case by which immunity from criminal prosecution was promised provided the civil liability was met.

Many cases had been settled without criminal prosecution, the attorney-general said, but these involved in the main over-payments by the government through mistake of law or facts and other contentions which would not warrant commercial prosecution.

In the settlement of civil liability, in the matters and cases referred to, Mr. Daugherty wrote: "There has never been in any instance or has any agreement whatever, direct or indirect, immediate or remote, expressed or inferential, by the department of justice not to prosecute for any criminal liability where there was such liability."

ALLEGED VICTIM OF KLAN MARRIED

Hale, victim of the alleged Ku Klux Klan night riders outrages at Medford a year and a half ago, was married last night to Miss Monta Cecilia Maegly, 184, Kingston Street, Portland. The wedding was solemnized by the Rev. W. G. Elliot, Jr., at the home of the brides parents. The couple will spend their honeymoon in Honolulu and will later live in San Francisco.
