LINCOLN CLUB AT MEDFORD BANQUETS

Under the auspices of the Lincoln club, of Jackson county the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the birth of that greatest of all figures, the one preeminent character in the life of the nation, the first, martyred president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln, was celebrated in the city of Medford last night by approximately 400 men and women, who gathered at the Hotel Medford to pay tribute to the man whose determination in a righteous cause held the Union together in its darkest hour, when enemies from within and without sought its destruction, and at the same time, through the great civil war brought human slavery forever to an end, not only in America, but made the traffic unavary in every part of the world. The spacious dining room of the hotel was crowded with these 400 devotees paying homage to the immortal name of Lincoln. The walls were festooned in the colors, and back of the speakers hung a magnificent painting of Lincoln, around which was draped the warm folds of the flag. Pictures of Washington, Garfield, McKinley, Roosevelt, and others of the famous men in American history were grouped in an attractive setting, adding to the patriotic effect of the occasion.

Following the invocation the banquet was served and during the hour reports of nomination committee and resolutions were heard. C. E. (Pop) Gates was elected president of the organization for the ensuing year, while Hon. A. C. Marsters of Roseburg, was elected vice president. One of the resolutions adopted was that offering sympathy to the widow of the late President Warren G. Harding, and a copy was authorized sent to the wife of the nation's dead chief and also to the press of the state.

Hon. B. P. Mukey, former state senator from Medford, was the orator of the evening. In a masterly address covering a period of 45 minutes, he vividly and eloquently portrayed the life of the martyred president from the time of his humble birth in the woods of Kentucky in 1809 to the day of his assassination in the Ford theatre at Washington in 1865.

Chairman Gates at this point asked if there were any present who had personal recollections of Lincoln. Mrs. Riley, a Medford lady, arose and stated that she had enjoyed that distinction, and that when a girl Mr. Lincoln was on several occasions entertained in their home in Illinois.

Gettysburg, recited by Capt. H. A. Canaday of Roseburg; speeches by Attorney George Neuner, of Roseburg; Judge C. B. Watson of Ashland; E. W. Miller of Grants Pass, and a winning address by Mrs. W. B. Robinson, of Medford were warmly applauded. Prior to singing the Battle Hymn of the Republic, the closing number for the evening, Dick Posey, of Ashland, poet laureate of southern Oregon, read some of his own verse, which "brought down" the house and called for two more recitations from the gentleman.

GOOSEBERRY CONTRACTS ARE OFFERED AT 7 CENTS

SALEM, Feb. 7.—The Oregon Packing company is offering to accept contracts for gooseberries for 1924 at 7 cents a pound, according to reports from various growers. The number of contracts is not known.

Growers are being advised by the canneries to watch the gooseberries this year and to spray if necessary, for last year many of the berries were pinholed, due, it is believed, to the effect of the sulphur on the berries after they were set.

Two sprayings are advised, the final one just before the berries are set and none after that time. This method is believed to be successful in eliminating the pinhole difficulties.

The gooseberries were sold on a 7-cent basis last year. Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Thorsen who have been spending the past few days in this city left this afternoon for Cottage Grove where they will spend a short time before returning to this city where they intend to locate permanently.
