TRICHINIASIS IS SPECIFIC INFECTION.

It is dangerous to eat raw or underdone pork. Pork, ham, bacon and sausage may be infected with trichina, says a bulletin issued by State Board of Health. Trichiniasis or trichinosis is a specific infection with the thread worm, *Trichinella Spiralis*, and results from eating meat infected with the living encysted larvae of the parasite. The life history of the parasite occurs in three stages, the adult, the embryo, and the encysted larvae. The larvae are usually found in carnivorous and omnivorous animals such as rats and mice, dogs, cats, hogs and man. So far as infection in man is concerned the only animal of practical importance in the spread of the disease is the hog. The rat is of importance because hogs will consume dead rats. When the encysted larvae enter the digestive track of an animal capable of becoming the host of the worm, the digestive juices dissolve the capsule wall. The adult parasite develops from the larvae in two or three days and goes through the procreation process mainly in the small intestine. The males die, while the females penetrate the intestinal mucous membrane and lodge between the epithelium and connecting tissue. The embryos are discharged fully formed from the female about eight days after impregnation and penetrate the lymphatic and are carried to the mesenteric node and thoracic duct, then to the general capillaries they may wander into various regions, as the lungs, heart, brain, and serous cavities. The majority reach the voluntary muscles; those which survive become encapsulated larvae if the host does not succumb to the infection. The main symptoms and signs of the disease are associated with the period of wandering and lodgement of the embryo. The mortality from trichiniasis in the United States is about half that for typhoid fever. There is a resemblance to typhoid fever with edema of eyelids and face, and muscular pain and tenderness. In a disease of this nature prevention is much better than cure, for it is obvious that once the embryo are in the general circulation it is too late. The farmer who raises hogs should be educated regarding the danger of feeding the uncooked offal or rats. Piggeries should be as rat-proof as possible, so that pigs themselves cannot kill and eat rodents.

Young people who have strong convictions of the need for reform and higher ideals, can do something to promote their conceptions, by taking a greater interest in political affairs. If they will form debating groups in churches and clubs, they will stir up interest among a lot of young folks who otherwise would be indifferent to public questions. Many ambitious young men could do well to volunteer for service on political committees, and try to carry in politics the high purposes they have formed. The country is not reformed very fast by those who just stand off and criticize, but it is improved by those who take hold and work according to the light of higher ideals.

FANATICS FORCED TO MAKE SURRENDER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MANILA, Feb. 15.—Nearly 300 fanatics who have been causing trouble on Bucas Island, Surigao province, off the island of Mindanao, surrendered today to Lieutenant-Colonel Clarence H. Bowers, commander of the Constabulary forces in that district, and the campaign against them virtually has ended, according to a radio dispatch received here from the gunboat Sacramento now at Surigao. Eleven rifles and one revolver were taken from the 285 fanatics who surrendered. The message says.

In addition to announcing the capitulation of the fanatics, the dispatch states:

"Expect to arrest Lazala, the leader, tomorrow. Only a small number of fanatics still are out. Expect to arrest them tomorrow. The Bucas Island campaign is practically ended, though we believe it will be necessary to maintain constabulary soldiers there for a week or two longer. As soon as possible the Mindanao constabulary will be returned to the station, unless conditions on the mainland or elsewhere need their attention."

BRITISH PROFITS WOULD BE LARGE

LONDON, Feb. 15.—The British government would have made a profit of £15,000,000 on its original investment, had it sold its five million shares in the Anglo-Persian oil company to the Burma Oil company, it is stated by Philip Snowden, the chancellor of the exchequer. In a written reply to a parliamentary question regarding the terms of the offer. He said the price offered was approximately £12,000,000, representing a profit of nearly £3 per share on the current market price. The chancellor added that the government was satisfied on full examination that it would not have been in the national interest to part with the shares and that it had no intention whatever of reconsidering its decision.

VENICE, Italy, Feb. 15.—Another step toward the Canonization of the late Pope Pius X, was taken at a solemn meeting here today, presided over by the patriarch La Fontaine, at which forty witnesses were cited by the vice-postulator of Beatification. The parish priest of San Salvatore also made depositions concerning miracles attributed to the late pontiff.

The witnesses, together with many from other places where Pius lived, will be heard shortly before the central congregation for beatification in Rome.
