THE LIVES OF GREAT MEN.

The lives of great men are full of suggestion as to how ambitious folks can get ahead. So the first steps in a career like Woodrow Wilson's offer thoughts as to how other folks can get a start. The first step taken toward large achievements is often more difficult than any succeeding one. Mr. Wilson seemed to take this first step upward as the result of the writing and lecturing he did on politics while he was a college professor. He gained his first hold on the public attention as the result of having rather clear ideas as to how reforms were to be made in our national government. His distinctive ideas through that period, which influenced his career as president, was that congress was too irresponsible a body. He felt that the responsibility was divided up too much among the committees and that the congressmen were concerned too much with local interests, and he offered certain definite suggestions as to how such conditions could be remedied. Whether or not one believes in his idea, it is easy to see that the fact that he offered positive and direct suggestions helped him to get his ideas before the people and win attention and secure political advancement. If one will study the career of successful public men, it will be found that a big element in their success was usually their clarity of ideas. It is often noticed in public assemblies how opposition will melt away, when some speaker with a clear and definite program begins to talk. The average man forms impressions, but he often fails to reach conclusions. Unless a political or business leader has pretty definite and fixed convictions he does not usually get very far.

The city beautiful campaign in Roseburg is taking root and our energetic and thrifty citizens are alert to the excellent benefits to be derived by carrying forth a program of home beautification. With everybody doing a little toward the good cause noticeable results will be apparent in early spring and the coming summer will round out a well-kept and beautiful little city. An hour a day in your yard will accomplish wonders.

Today's news reports tell of the shooting of a United States senator at Washington, D. C., by prohibition officers who were rounding up a gang of bootleggers. The accident occurred by a stray bullet fired from a moving automobile striking the senator in the head. This is the first authentic report coming from the capitol that a senator has been "shot" since the holiday period.

Yesterday's dispatches told of the real value of a dead man's body, which was placed on the bargain counter at 98 cents. This is about 93 cents more than some live ones would bring on the same counter—if their wives were doing the shopping.
