Tested Recipes

Winter isn't over yet. There's a lot of cold days coming when a hot, tender, stack of wheat cakes is acceptable. What could be better than to fortify the family for a cold, but not a bit hard to make.

These directions, if followed fully, are pretty certain to give light, tender cakes that you can eat with a good conscience. Add the milk and egg to the ingredients, stirring just enough to combine them thoroughly. If the mixture is stirred too much the cakes will be tough. Add the melted fat to the mixture, and mix thoroughly. Do not mix the liquid and dry ingredients until you are ready to bake the cakes. If the batter is too thick, add a little more milk, and the cakes will be just as they should be. It is not plan to put the soda in the milk, because some of the soda is wasted as it begins to fizz.

The correct quantity of soda depends on the strength of the soda, and the thickness of the milk. Batter does not give cakes desired thickness, it can be improved by adding a little milk to the batter. A little flour for thickening the batter of what you add and the recipe accordingly. If the griddle is the right size, the cakes will be baked on one side and ready to turn. The bubbles appear on the top and start to break. If it is as this, the cakes will be just as they should be. If the griddle is too hot, the cakes will be cooked too slowly. If the griddle is too cold, the cakes will be cooked too fast. Serve at once on a hot plate.

Whole Wheat Cake
If you like whole wheat cakes, you will be glad to get the recipe. These cakes are delicious cups whole wheat flour, 1 cup, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. sugar, 1 tsp. melted fat, 2 cups milk.

If the sour milk is not very sour, 1 3/4 cups of it may be used. If sweet milk is used, use 2 cups. Instead of the soda, use 1/2 tsp. of baking powder. All measurements are level. Measure the whole wheat flour before sifting. Sift the flour, salt, and sugar together. Then mix the bran that has been back into the flour. Mix the liquid and dry ingredients together. Add the melted fat and mix. Bake on a hot griddle that has been lightly greased. Serve hot on a hot plate. This recipe, like the preceding one, may have to be changed to suit your flour. It is either a very soft kind, or the batter is just the right thickness to give kind of cakes you want. Add more milk or flour and be sure you keep track of the change so you make it next time the recipe your kind of flour.

Bread Crumb Griddle Cakes
Every thrifty housewife has a supply of bread crumbs and is sure to use it out. These crumbs can be used to make griddle cakes. 1 cup dry crumbs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 2 tsp. melted fat, 1 cup milk, 1 tsp. salt, 1 level tsp. baking powder. Pour the hot milk over the crumbs and let them stand until the mixture is soft. Sift the flour over the mixture. Mix and stir the mixture. Bake on a hot griddle that has been lightly greased. Serve hot on a hot plate.
