BREAKING HOME TIES.

Years ago a noted old picture called by the above title was found on the walls of many homes. It portrayed a young man leaving home to take up work in some more or less distant scene. It was a big event in that family, and it is today one of the turning points of life. In this picture the young man's seriousness, the mother's solicitude, the family regret, made a touching appeal. The yearning of parents over their youngsters who go out into the world with so little experience, to meet trials and temptations they do not comprehend, is one of the deeper situations that life has to meet. While a multitude of young people go away considerable distances, still they are not perhaps as remote in some ways as in former years. People travel more easily nowadays and automobiles eliminate distance to some extent. Parents who regret this departure can still do a great deal to keep up the home tie and continue their helpful training, by giving thought and time to the matter of letter writing to the absent ones. It should be more than the hastily written post card or the brief chronicle of home incidents. Thoughtful correspondence, in which the home folks give their impressions of the experiences that the young people are going through, can be a very powerful influence. Tactful words or hinted corrections may be more effective than long lectures in the home environment, since the absent one looks at his home relations with a sentiment magnified by distance. Theodore Roosevelt, in the letters to his children recently published, showed how the home ties can be still kept vital. Such letters may make dad and mother seem more like pals than in the old days at home, when their restraints seemed irksome at times.

IRRIGATION DAM SURVEY COMPLETE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PENDLETON, Feb. 19.—Actual field work in connection with determining the suitability of the rock formation of the Columbia river as a base for a dam at Umatilla Rapids, three miles above Umatilla, will terminate March 1 according to E. R. Crocker, engineer in charge of the work. The survey which was conducted by the reclamation service and which was authorized by an act of congress drilled in 21 places across the river channel at the rapids and in one place went down to a depth of 192 feet.

While the government men had nothing to say as to the desirability of the place for the dam site in connection with the proposed Umatilla Rapids project local men who are familiar with the work and who have been following the progress of the survey state that nothing unfavorable was found by the diamond drills in their descent into the river beds and that the river bed at that point would form an excellent foundation for the dam.

action for the 50-foot dam necessary to the proposed project which would irrigate a total of 270,000 acres and developed a total of 800,000 horsepower.

Before the reclamation survey is actually completed about two months of office work is necessary in connection with the findings of the field operations. This work will be done either at Hermiston or Denver according to Mr. Crocker.

FUNERAL BISHOP GARRETT FRIDAY

Presiding Bishop of Episcopal Church in America Died Last Night—Body to Lie in State.

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 19.—Funeral services for Right Rev. Alexander C. Garrett, presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church in America who died here last night will be held Friday according to tentative plans announced by Dean R. S. Chalmers of St. Matthew's Cathedral here. The body will lie in state in the chapel of St. Mary's college for women, which the bishop founded and where his cottage home was located, until Friday, when it will be removed to the cathedral.

After building 54 churches and serving as minister, priest and bishop of the church for 67 years, Rt. Rev. Alexander C. Garrett became the presiding bishop of the Episcopal church in America in April, 1923, upon the death of the then presiding bishop, Daniel Sylvester Tuttle.

Bishop Garrett was at that time almost 91 years of age and totally blind. He joked about his infirmity by saying: "Being totally blind I cannot see my friends. I have to refuse to see them." He admitted that he was the oldest bishop in America, but questioned the assertion that he was the senior bishop of the world.

Bishop Garrett was born November 4, 1832, in Lucan, County Sligo, Ireland, where his great grandfather, his grandfather and his father, over a period of 150 years, had successively presided over Ballymore parish there.

A brother, the Rev. John Garrett, rector of Moss Side church, Manchester, England, died in the pulpit while preaching his farewell sermon. Three other brothers studied for the church, two of them dying in the service and one being accidentally killed at the finish of his ecclesiastical studies.

Bishop Garrett was the youngest of 15 children, and at the time he became bishop in 1923 was the only one living.

After being educated at Lucean he earned money by teaching and paid his way through college, completing his studies at Trinity college, University of Dublin. In 1856 he was made deacon, and in 1857 a priest. He spent two years in England and then sailed for Canada in 1859 as a missionary. For nine years thereafter he traveled throughout the northwest, and in 1870 was appointed rector of St. James' church in San Francisco, remaining until 1872. He also, remaining until 1872. He then went to Trinity Cathedral at Omaha. In 1874 he was elected Missionary Bishop for northern Texas.

GOVERNOR PIERCE TO BE HERE SOON

Governor Pierce will personally inspect the proposed road leading to Umpqua Park Addition at some future date, he informs County Judge Quine in a letter today. After going over the situation as presented in the review prepared and submitted by Roadmaster Frear, at the direction of the county court, the governor states that it appears to him to be the best policy to construct the road.

The governor became interested when residents of Umpqua Park Addition wrote him asking him to take some action to aid in procuring an outlet. The governor asked for information on the proposition and a complete review of the entire case was given him. In answer he has written the county judge as follows:

"I wish to thank you for the very complete explanation of the bridge situation. I had no idea that you had given it the amount of work and thought that you have.

"All I am attempting to do is to help straighten out the tangles. I do not see how I can be of much service in the situation. You have gone over it so thoroughly, I am inclined to believe that the road suggested should be constructed. It seems that a road costing only approximately \$5,000 would afford the outlet that these people need so badly. The next time I am in Roseburg I want to take a personal view of this situation.

FIVE KILLED IN ANARCHIST RIOTS

SOFIA, Feb. 19.—A fight between police and a band of alleged anarchists, led by a woman, last night resulted in the death of five persons, including two policemen and the wounding of several others.

Police were about to search the house in which the band was congregated, when there was a volley, killing two raiders and wounding eight. Soldiers and firemen were summoned and laid siege to the place. Calls for surrender only brought forth further shots, wounding more policemen.

Finally the prefect ordered firemen to destroy the building. Kerosene was poured into the cellar and ignited. When the flames reached the upper stories the three surviving occupants surrendered. The bodies of the woman leader and two others were found in the building.

When the session ended 31 of the articles on the program had been approved. Consideration of the remainder will begin tomorrow.

The premier carried the famous article III, providing for a 20 per cent increase in taxation, but only after a fight against the stiffest opposition he had encountered and by a vote of 315 to 254.
