I have consistently supported such legislation when it appeared in the senate, and you may be sure that my vote will be cast in the interest of the ex-service men whenever the opportunity affords itself.

As I have heretofore stated I shall support the adjusted compensation measure, and shall vote to carry it over the president's veto if he should take a stand in opposition to this legislation.

In reply to your favor of February 8, 1924, I beg to say that the understanding here is that the adjusted compensation bill will be passed again by this congress. I assisted in the preparation of the bill in the last congress in our committee on ways and means, assisted in reporting it from the committee and passing it through the house, and voted to pass it over the president's veto. I intend to follow the same course now. Our committee expects to take up the preparation and report of the bill in a short time, that is, immediately after the passage of the revenue bill.
