SENATOR FLAYS SOLDIER BONUS

Maryland Man in Speech Today Says Nation Owes No Debt to Defenders.

CLAIMS NO CONTRACT

Says Men Who Enlisted Did Not Make Contract With Government and Have No Right to Bonus.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Describing the proposed soldier bonus as a "squalid and odious gratuity" Senator Bruce, Maryland, today gave notice to the senate of his opposition to its enactment, and any of the forms so far proposed.

"If I thought that all or nearly all of our world war service men were solicited the bonus," he said, "my faith in popular rule and its ability to resist class pressure would be destroyed. I would be driven to the conclusion that the tendency of the great body of our voters to break up into special groups or blocs which is the most alarming feature of our political life at the present time, had reached its culmination, and that henceforth government duties would be given over to the wretched business of setting of one class against another."

The obligation to bear arms, resting upon every citizen, is "no creature of contract," Senator Bruce said, "and no element of barter or sale enters into it."

Throughout history, he added, few things have been more striking than the persistent contempt held by all peoples for mercenary soldiers or those who fought for pay.

"The only satisfaction I can derive from the proposition is that it may give the people of the United States a sense of the importance of devising some international plan by which war may be brought to an end altogether."

The committee on ways and means was instructed to see that signs warning motorists to slow down are placed near the school buildings of the city.

Tentative plans are being made for the district conference of the American legion, which is to be held in Roseburg during the middle part of the month of March. The legion posts in Lane, Coos, Douglas, Klamath, Jackson and Josephine counties are to send delegates, and it is proposed to make the conference a sort of school for post officers. No definite date has been fixed, but it is expected that the conference will take place on the last day of the "Days of '49" show to be staged by Umpqua Post and the Rod and Gun club.

NINE ARRESTED ON ROBBERY CHARGE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 19.—With nine suspects under arrest in connection with the \$200,000 Provident loan Association robbery here February 9, last, authorities today continued their search for two alleged ring-leaders of the gang believed responsible for this and many other crimes, including at least three bank holdups in or about Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Irby McCarty, one of the men whose arrest on suspicion of robbery was announced last night, has signed a confession, according to the sheriff's office, admitting that he and two other men held up the provident loan Association offices here and escaped with diamonds, jewelry, cash and liberty bonds valued at well over \$200,000.

The two others named in this purported confession, however, were at liberty still today.
