DAUGHERTY NOT READY TO QUIT

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Daugherty, it is pointed out that a direct charge that his name appeared to be "mixed" in the oil scandal has been made in the senate by Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, that the attorney-general repeatedly has been attacked by Senators for taking no action to stop the consummation of leases which congress now declared to have been made contrary to law and that many charges relating to other matters have been made publicly and will be investigated if the proposed inquiry into the development of justice is carried out.

After the Sunday afternoon conference, Chairman Lenroot and Mr. Pomerene visited the White House. Senator Lenroot said today that certain information which had been brought to his attention had been discussed with the president, but he still refused to discuss the nature of the information.

Later in the evening Senator Borah, republican, Idaho also called on Mr. Coolidge and Mr. Daugherty joined the conference. At this meeting oil was not discussed, but Mr. Borah frankly told the attorney-general that he should resign because the country and congress had lost confidence in him.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Attorney-General Daugherty in a letter today to Senator Pepper of Pennsylvania declared his retirement "voluntary or otherwise, would be a concession of the truth of all the baseless charges" against him. He added he never would be a party to such a proceeding.

EXCAVATIONS TO BE RENEWED.

CAIRO, Egypt, Feb. 21.—The Egyptian government has granted the Countess of Carnarvon a new concession for excavations at Tutankhamun's tomb, according to information from a responsible quarter today.
