THE FATHER OF HIS COUNTRY.

It is one of the blessings of America that our country's character has been shaped to some degree by the great men who have led our footsteps as a nation. It is hard for a country to have low and mean standards, when it was started in its career by such a marvelous man as George Washington. Washington was a constructive statesman, a profound thinker on government, a great military strategist, a magnetic leader of men. He showed marvelous courage when he told his tattered little army before the battle of Long Island, that the time had come to "resolve to conquer or die." He well knew that if beaten, he would be a hunted man, to be sacrificed as a warning to future rebels. Yet when he won his great victory, he did not gloat over the foe as smaller size character would have done. "Let no sensation of satisfaction for the triumphs you have gained induce you to insult your enemy," he told his soldiers when the British surrendered at Yorktown. "Let no shouting, no clamorous hazzing, increase their mortification. Posterity will huzza for us." And it has, for all the years since that great day. Washington's serene character seemed like a great mountain, quiet and calm while little men were assailing him. He was full of hope when others despaired, he had the prudence to delay when rash spirits counselled hasty action, he struck with quick and resistless blows when the moment came. He dealt with little armies on a microscopic scale compared with modern war. But his great genius would have carved out a name for himself if he had been put down in Europe in 1918. Well may America honor him with a full heart today, February 22.

THOUSANDS WILL PARADE IN KLAN ROBES TONIGHT

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Feb. 22.—Klanism's flaming cross will glow tonight above a column of 20,000 or more members of the Ku Klux Klan, in full regalia, marching in parade, the crowning and closing event of the state convention of the organization.

Throughout last night and during the day special trains and automobiles brought thousands of members to the capital for tonight's parade, which Klan officials say will be the largest crowd of robed men ever assembled in the southwest.

Every state in the invisible empire has representatives at today's convocation. N. C. Jewett, grand dragon of the Oklahoma realm of the Klan, and organizer of the convention declared.

The marchers are expected to be maskless, conforming to a law prohibiting the wearing of masks in public places, passed recently by the legislature, but which is not effective until June 1. If the marchers appear unmasked, it will be the first time in the history of the Klan that a public meeting will have been held without masks.

REBEL LEADER IS CAPTURED BY TROOPS

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 22.—General Salvador Alvarado, one of the principal rebel leaders in the west, has been captured at Colim, according to a report given out by the war department.

The report, which was forwarded by General Lázaro Cárdenas, who has been raising volunteers to attack Colima, said Gen. Alvarado was taken by Crescencio Anzaldo, one of his subordinate officers, who abandoned the revolutionary causes and submitted himself to the government's orders.

General Alvarado formerly was governor of Yucatan, later secretary of the treasury during the provisional presidency of Adolfo de la Huerta and was a candidate for the presidency when the rebellion broke out last December.

Other leaders, including General Ramirez Garrido, also were captured. Two rebel warships anchored at Mazatlan have surrendered, according to advices from General Cárdenas, leaving the railway open from Mexico City via Guadalajara to Mazatlan.

SHERIFF STARMER UP FOR REELECTION

Petitions have been placed in circulation for the nomination of Sheriff Sam Starmer as a candidate on the republican ticket at the May primaries to succeed himself. Mr. Starmer announced some time ago that he would again seek the office, but is making no extensive campaign for reelection. He states that if the people of Douglas county are satisfied with the way in which the sheriff's office has been conducted that he desires to return for another term, but that he does not expect to go into the field and spend a large sum of money in order to place his candidacy before the voters.

Mr. Starmer has made a good sheriff and has a record of which he may well be proud. He has handled the affairs of the office efficiently and without favor, and has at all times maintained the office on a high standard. He has perfected an organization consisting of able deputies, so that under his direction the entire county is well protected.

In the matter of the enforcement of the prohibition law he has been very vigilant, and many thousands of dollars have been collected in fines during the time he has been in office. Douglas county, in spite of its wild, mountainous territory, so well adapted to the purposes of the moonshiner, and bootlegger, is listed as one of the cleanest counties from the standpoint of liquor law violations, in the entire state.

COURT TO CALL FOR BIDS ON BRIDGE

The county court expects at its next meeting to advertise for bids for the construction of the proposed bridge at the site of the Lone Rock ferry. It is hoped that this bridge may be built and put in use by July 1 in order that it may be used during the summer months when travel up the North Umpqua becomes heavy.

The plans for the bridge were prepared last fall and the contract for the piers was let and the concrete work done. The approaches were also built so that it is now only necessary to build the wooden part of the bridge. The court expects to follow the plans which were prepared during the fall and will advertise on those specifications, which call for a wooden bridge, heavy enough to handle the heaviest traffic the road will be called upon to bear for many years to come.

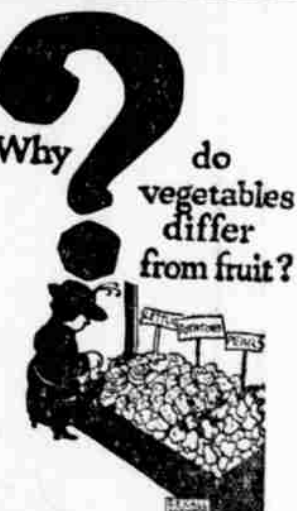
