

FIFTEEN ARRESTS
FOLLOW SHOOTING

FORT WORTH, Feb. 22.—Fifteen arrests have been made in connection with the killing of Richard Watson, Corsicana policeman and chief state witness in Somervell county moonshine and bribery trials.

Watson was shot to death last night as he sat in the home of friends in Glen Rose. He had gone to Glen Rose following the trial of former County Attorney Hark at Cleburne, on a charge of accepting a bribe. The jury is still out in this case.

Watson in his testimony admitted he had been employed by moonshiners in the hills of Somervell county.

\$17,700,000 WOULD
BE USED ON ROADS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—A total of \$56,758,512 of which \$17,700,000 would be available for improvement of highways during the coming fiscal year, is carried in the agricultural bill reported today by the house appropriations committee.

The total is \$16,852,916 less than the appropriation a year ago, when \$32,500,000 was allotted for state aid road construction, and is \$411,312, less than budget estimates.

For the enforcement of the special laws by the department of agriculture the bill carries \$2,627,000, the items including: packers and stockyards act, \$152,540; food and drug act, \$116,000.

An additional \$1,071,150 is provided for meat inspection and \$652,480 for the department's new service on fruits and vegetables.

An appropriation of \$20,000 is authorized to enable the weather bureau to give warnings throughout the country to fruit growers as to frost and advice on harvest weather and fruit spraying conditions.

The bill carries \$3,577,600 for eradication of tuberculosis among cattle, the major portion of it to be spent in Idaho.

Provision is made for appointment of delegates to the international seed testing conference to be held in England during 1924.

The committee's report in dealing with expenditures of federal funds for highway improvement brought out that since 1917 federal appropriations to the amount of \$392,817,500 have been made available to the states of which \$284,389,359 had been paid to the states prior to January 1 last. Estimates that expenditures are being made during this fiscal year at the rate of \$6,000,000 a month, the committee went on the theory that \$52,437,160 would be available July 1 for expenditure in the coming fiscal year in addition to the \$17,500,000 carried in the bill.

MCADOO FORCES WIN

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 22.—Vern G. McDoo forces apparently won the first skirmish in Kansas over followers of Governor J. M. Davis as a favorite son candidate for the presidential nomination when the annual mass meeting of democrats here today adjourned immediately after being called to order to avoid a clash for leadership which the Davis men threatened before the meeting.

Both the McDoo forces, headed by Samuel B. Amidon of Wichita, National committee man and the supporters of Governor Davis as a favorite son candidate for president had held caucus and agreed upon uncompromising stands when the matter was presented to the mass meeting. The resolution to adjourn, offered hastily when the chairman asked what business there was before the body, was seconded by Amidon in a brief talk and then adopted.

MANCHESTER MAN
OUT FOR COOLIDGE

CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 22.—Frank H. Chubb, of Manchester, became a Coolidge pledged candidate for delegate-at-large to the republican national convention today in opposition to Senator George H. Moses.

The senator said recently in debate in the senate that he would support President Coolidge.

PRISON SURVEY MADE.

MACALESTER, Okla., Feb. 21.—Completion of the survey of ex-service men, now incarcerated in Oklahoma prison institutions has been announced by Leon H. Brown, former department adjutant of the American Legion, and a member of the Soldiers' Relief commission, which undertook the survey.

More than three hundred ex-service men in the prison were examined by the commission, particularly in regard to mental and physical conditions that might have been superinduced by war. However, all claims of these men for compensation, for state bonus, travel, back pay, allowances and other matters were ascertained by the examiners and will be prosecuted.

EX-SERVICE MEN NOT CRIMINALS

ERIE, Pa., Feb. 21.—Ex-service men are not responsible for crime increase in the United States, as has been charged in some quarters, declared Federal Judge P. P. Schoonmaker, but the blame is to be placed on growing boys from 17 to 21. Judge Schoonmaker's statement was made in commenting on recent reports of sociologists that the average age of criminals had dropped six to eight years.
