## DAWES IS NOT BLINDED.

Commenting on the progress of the Dawes committee and its investigation of German finances, the New York Evening Post says:

"Germany has been house-cleaning ever since she heard General Dawes and his committee on reparations were to visit Berlin.

"The dust seems to have been intended for the eyes of General Dawes et al., that they might not see too clearly the flaws in budget and tax schedule. If there was any such intention it proved futile.

"The German tax scheme provides for raising about \$1,300,000,000. Germany has wiped out her public debt in toto. She has a very small army. She has no navy at all. These points considered, the amount is too high.

"The German budget provides for no reparation payments. From this point of view the estimate is too low.

"The task for the Dawes committee is therefore obvious. Throwing the German figures into dust-bin, it must work out a new set, showing how Germany's governmental expenditures are to be reduced and how provision is to be made for reparations payment.

"Germany's bureaucracy is overcrowded, the national railways are overmanned by 100 per cent. Government subsidies are on too generous a scale.

"The average German should pay in taxes at least as much as the average Frenchman.

"Under the Berlin scheme as presented, Germany's per capita tax amounts to \$22. Last year the French per capita tax was \$29. Poincare's new tax program raises this figure to \$35. Germany's per capita tax should be at least \$35."

The best advice that could be given the German people is, "Don't let your representatives try any sharp practices or evasion of the truth with the American members of this special committee. They are bigger men in public and industrial life than any with whom they are dealing. For once, remember that you have to think straight, act straight and continue to play straight. The eyes of the world are watching the progress of this committee, the success of which means so much toward the permanent establishment of world peace and renewed industrial activity."

The two most urgent public questions at present time are tax reduction and dealing with corruption which has been unearthed in official circles in Washington, remarks an exchange. President Coolidge feels with all his fellow countrymen a depressing sense of humiliation at the gross betrayal of public trust that has been disclosed. The taxation question as well as lax or criminal action of officials performing public duty is a problem for both republicans and democrats. The people of the whole United States have an interest from the standpoint of lessening tax bills and securing honest administration of public affairs regardless of what party is in power. The pity is that self-seeking politicians will attempt to use the present situation to further personal political ends rather than to advance best interest of our government. The people must register their approval of honest public officials and their demand for tax reduction if they expect to eliminate dishonesty in public office or increasing tax bills.

It is an interesting fact, and food for reflection, that our country shipped 750,000,000 feet of lumber to Japan during 1923, says the Manufacturer. This simple fact of information is supplied by an organization that collects the statistics for the benefit of sawmills large and small. The West Coast Lumbermen's Association also sends out to every mill, rules and regulations for standardizing lumber for the world trade. This organization has promoted conversion of sawmill waste into carbon briquets that is going to make iron and steel industry possible. Without such organizations on the Pacific coast the primary lumber industry would be impossible owing to wasteful methods of operation. Instead of a wasteful and chaotic mess, suffering at times from overproduction, scarcity of labor and unemployment, there is scientific industry promotion. Some of the red tape departments at Washington look upon this service which is purely cooperative, through an inverted telescope, as highly illegal.

The city beautiful plan is working wonders for Roseburg. Home owners are taking an active interest to put over a mighty constructive and far-reaching program.

ASKS COOPERATION  
OF ALL PARENTS IN  
SCHOOL PROBLEMS

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—If the school is to accomplish anything more than the transmission of technical knowledge from one generation to another, the existing attitude of indifference toward the child's education must give way to the realization that the visit of the parent to the school is an opportunity, Mrs. Edith E. Bristol, dean of girls at Soldan High school, St. Louis, told members of the National Association of Deans of Women, in convention here today.

Educators alone cannot direct the mind of the child in the proper channels, technically and socially, Mrs. Bristol said. "We must realize that preoccupation with school affairs tends to keep us from envisaging the community which we serve. Our teaching of single subjects endangers the main object of education, rearing well informed and useful citizens to carry on the world's affairs. If we can see the futility of too much faith in our single handed methods, we shall make use of the criticisms expressed by parents, to build up a better mutual understanding and to encourage democratic participation in community life."

In discussing the duties of parents and teachers in relation to schools, Mrs. Bristol urged more visits by parents and an active interest in school life, both educationally and socially. "The teachers need the suggestions furnished by the parents as much as the parents need them to give the child a technical education. The dean can be the connecting link between the teacher and the parent and on her depends the success of the school. To bring fruitful relations between the school and community, which results in raising the standard of civilization among the younger generation, is one of the many problems confronting educators."

"We have lost sight of the fact that without close cooperation between the school and community, the parent and the teacher, the best result cannot be obtained in advancing civilization."

"If a frequent interchange of opinions could take place between the school and the community through participation on the part of students in a democratic management of school affairs and through a similar organization of parents and teachers, we should not be laboring under misunderstanding."

JEALOUSY MAY  
BE CRIME MOTIVE

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Police investigation of the mysterious slayings Friday of John Duffy and his wife is centering on a jealousy theory as a result of disclosures said to have been made by Ruby Downing of Louisville, Ky., an intimate friend of the couple, brought here for questioning.

Authorities in other cities have been asked to look for a Chicago nurse named Dolly said by the police to be a former sweetheart of Duffy and for James Zolar, former business promoter for a Memphis or Nashville firm. Zolar at one time employed Mrs. Duffy, then Miss Leah Exley, as his secretary in Columbus, Ohio, according to Miss Downing's alleged statement to the police.

According to the story, the Downing woman is alleged to have told Harold Levy, assistant state's attorney, the Exley girl, daughter of a wealthy retired oil operator, and a farmer of Norwalk county, Iowa, at one time attended a California institution where she was a credit ble student.

Dissatisfied with farm life, according to the story, the girl went to Columbus, where she met Zolar. Later she left him and went to Louisville, Ky., where she received letters containing threats from Zolar, Miss Downing says. Duffy and Orlando Horton, who is being sought in connection with the slayings, are believed to have been in Louisville at the time.

ROAD AND BRIDGE  
COMMITTEE REPORTS

Assurance Wanted That Residents of Rice Creek District Will Donate Materials and Labor for Proposed Bridge.

All sections of Douglas county were represented at the road and bridge committee meeting of the Douglas Taxpayers League held on Saturday, including Elkton, Scottsburg, and Glendale. A number of taxpayers from various parts of the county appeared before the committee, C. O. Garrett representing the Glendale district, reported that about two years ago, a petition was signed by the people of that road district asking that the road between the Pacific highway and Glendale be given a standard grade and be surfaced with crushed rock and gravel. The county court still has about \$15,000 of the \$30,000 bond issue unexpended in this district. The members of the committee passed a resolution asking that the wish of these parties be carried out by the county court. The committee as a whole then visited the proposed site of the Rice Creek bridge and upon their return submitted the following report:

"We, your road and bridge committee of the Douglas County Taxpayers' League, have carefully examined the proposed Rice Creek bridge, but before making a definite report on the project desire the following information. We wish to know the amount to be donated by the residents of this section and the security offered, if any, by the residents, that the amount donated will be paid. We also wish the estimated cost of the bridge and to know whether or not the estimate is based on the proposed donation. It is our understanding that the estimated cost is \$10,000 and the residents of this district propose to donate \$5000.

We further wish to report that we have examined the Dillard-Brockway road and believe that the money now being expended on this road is wasted. That the old road abandoned was and is of more value to the general public than the new road, as only one family lives on the new road and this residence is only about one-fourth mile from the Pacific highway. We further would discourage any further expenditures of market road money on this project and would expressly urge and insist that further road projects, if of any consequence, be built by contract."
