DENDORFF AND OTHERS TRIED

Former German Field Marshal
Charged With Attempting
Government Overthrow

CURRED IN NOVEMBER

Adolph Hitler Also One of
Defendants—Treason
Started in a Beer
Cellar.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MUNICH, Bavaria, Feb. 26.—The Munich events of last November are again a topic of intense public interest today with the opening of the trial of former Field Marshal Ludendorff and his nine associates for their parts in an attempt to overthrow the government.

The provisions for the press have been made in the military court, where the trial is being held. The most important of the provisions will be taken behind closed doors and the public sittings are expected to develop much in accordance with the facts already published. The proceedings are expected to last but a few days.

The defendants, the defendants are: Adolph Hitler, leader of the "fascist" party; former Bavarian "fascist" leader, Dr. Frick,

president of the Munich district; Lieutenant Henry Purnet, who is Ludendorff's step-son, and five men accused of being Hitler's aides, Lieutenants Wagner, and Bruckner, Captain Rohm, Dr. Weber and Colonel Kriebel.

The nationalist's "putsch" was comparatively short lived. It started the night of November 8, in a beer cellar, when Hitler at the head of his men, raided a meeting attended by the Bavarian government leaders, and proclaimed the cabinet overthrown. Hitler named himself chancellor and Ludendorff dictator of the entire German republic.

Hitler's well organized troops of the Oberland organization occupied different quarters of the city and apparently controlled the situation. The next day Reichwehr forces, Kwar, the recently resigned Bavarian military dictator, attacked the Hitlerites and after brief fighting regained possession of the war ministry. Ludendorff and other leaders were arrested but Hitler fled and was not taken until later.

Reports are current that many of the witnesses will not appear against the defendants, on pleas of illness.

BERLIN, Feb. 26.—The Socialist News service today publishes what purports to be an extract from the indictment against those accused in the Ludendorff-Hitler "putsch" at Munich last November.

According to this extract the conduct of Dr. Von Kahr, the former Bavarian dictator, and General Von Lossow, who headed the Bavarian Reichwehr, was held to "be harmless" although they had relations with Adolph Hitler and the others and were well informed of their plans.

The indictment describes Hitler as the prime mover, asserting that he aimed at the government of Bavaria and the Plechs and that he allotted the offices of state, giving himself the leadership.

General Ludendorff is declared to have been acquainted with all the plans for "this violent, unconstitu-

HARE SHOOTING IS TO BE INVESTIGATED

MARSHFIELD, Feb. 26.—The Curry county grand jury today began investigation of the shooting of Lawrence Hare in connection with which State Probation Officer Paul Mumpower and E. C. Neill are held. Alf Gauntlett, foreman of the grand jury was taken ill soon after the jury convened yesterday and it adjourned until today when Judge Kendall appointed Charles Wakeman to replace Gauntlett. The jury is not expected to report before late tomorrow.

Attorneys Buffington and Childs, who were engaged by Hare's relatives to assist in prosecution of the case have withdrawn owing to differences with Miles H. McKee, who was sent by Governor Pierce, and Attorney-General Van Winkle to investigate the case. They claim McKee did not allow them fully to cooperate and complained because McKee had Judge Wood reduce the charge to manslaughter after Mumpower and Neill had been bound over on a second degree murder charge. They claim McKee asked the change in the charge without notifying them. The matter, they said, will be laid before Governor Pierce.

WINCHESTER DAM DEADLINE MOVED

The Oregon State Game Commission has rescinded its order of May 4, 1923, establishing the deadline below the Winchester dam at the new highway bridge, and the line is now restored to a point 200 feet below the dam. The change was made because of the actions of fishermen who persisted in taking out fish from the forbidden waters. It is believed, however, that those responsible for this illegal fishing, will not again violate the law, and because of this fact the Roseburg Rod and Gun club, which was responsible for having the deadline moved, have been successful in having it restored to its former place. The sportsmen will take no action to obtain another change unless more poaching is reported, in which case the commission will immediately be asked to reestablish the line.
