THE CONSERVATION POLICY.

It was one of the greatest achievements of Theodore Roosevelt that he aroused the nation to realize the permanent losses it was suffering through the waste of its natural resources. One reason for the great stir made by the oil lease controversy, has been the feeling that these principles of conservation of resources have not been adhered to in the disposition that has been made of the oil lands. It has proved true in some periods of our history and in many regions, that the value of resources wasted was greater than the value used. This was particularly true of forest resources. The natural wealth of a country is the chief base of material prosperity. An industrious people might live in a country devoid of natural resources, but it would only be under great difficulties. If the country is to continue prosperous, its forests, water powers, soils, minerals, oils, etc., must be scientifically handled. It is the tendency of many men to look only at the immediate profit to be made out of such resources. The man who cuts down woodland in a wasteful way, may think that a dollar in hand now is worth two dollars in timber later on. But as a result of following that policy many years, the American people now find that their timber supply is short and construction costs high. The United States government and the American people ought to take up the conservation movement again with renewed zeal, to make sure that every natural resource is being carefully used. The oil property belonging to the government is the first matter to come up, and the whole question should be re-examined to shape a policy that will protect the country's oil reserves from wasteful exploitation.

NORWEGIAN SHIP REPORTED ASHORE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SEATTLE, Feb. 27.—A wireless
message from the Norwegian steam-
er Tatjana reports that she went
ashore on the rock off Carmanah
Point, near the entrance to Puget
Sound at 6:30 this morning. The
crew were going ashore to stand by
the message stated.

The Tatjana was bound from
Muroan, Japan, to Vancouver B. C.,
under charter to load lumber. Car-
manah point is on the west coast of
Vancouver Island and at the north
side of the mouth of the strait of
Juan de Fuca. Marine men here
said that the Tatjana must have
been five miles off her course, and
attributed the accident to fog. The
Tatjana is a steel screw steamer of
5329 gross tons.

the United States coast guard cut-
ter Snohomish from Port Angeles,
Washington, were proceeding to the
assistance of the Tatjana.
