MEADOWS WAIVES COURT HEARING

George Meadows, alias Ed Franklin, wanted in Alabama on a charge of murder, waived hearing in the local justice court today, and was committed to the county jail to await the coming of a deputy sheriff from Walker county, Alabama. Meadows appeared before Justice of the Peace George Jones and heard the complaint charging him with being a fugitive from justice. He evinced more interest in a newspaper found in the office than in the proceedings. He stated that he desired no hearing and would submit to the authorities in Alabama without protest. He was informed that the charge upon which he is held will not permit bail, and was committed to the county jail to await the coming of the officers. A dispatch received over the News-Review leased wire from Jasper, Alabama, states that Deputy Sheriff A. H. Self, is on the way to Roseburg, to take Meadows back to that place to answer to the charge.

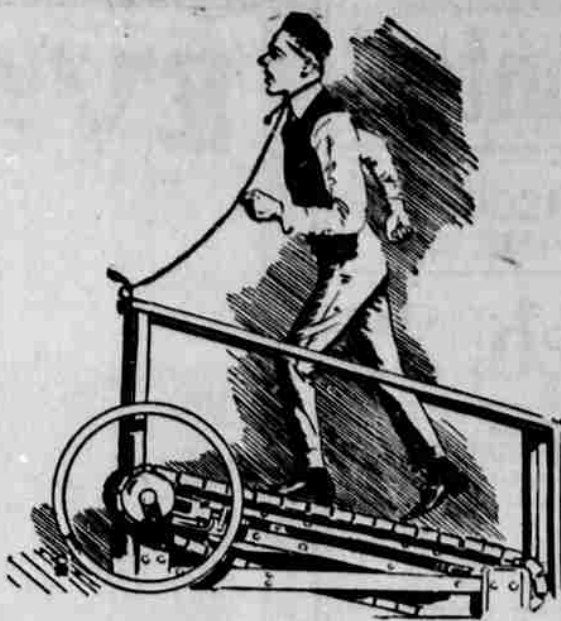

In The News-Review issue of February 27th the auction representative set forth his claims for the auction system.

Theory is a beautiful fabric—but with business men, results count.

SO LET US WEIGH THE RESULTS

1. On Friday, February 22nd, the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange sold 2 cars of Broccoli at \$1.10 per crate NET F. O. B. ROSEBURG.

2. On Saturday, February 23rd, the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange sold 3 cars Broccoli at an average of \$1.13 per crate, NET F. O. B. ROSEBURG.

3. We were gradually working our prices upward—demand exceeded supply. Our sales are strictly f. o. b. basis. We have never had a car refused or a draft dishonored.

The Auction representative says he has come in to help in marketing the Broccoli. We appreciate his philanthropy, but if he is a judge of business methods, he must concede that our system is at least a few steps in advance of the Auction method.

We have no leased wires, but it is our aim to maintain a lease on the good will and patronage of some of the best produce jobbers in America.

Like the majority of farmers I sometimes attend auctions. When I do it is with the expectation of buying something for less than its real value. Produce men, being human, are governed by the same motives.

We urge our growers to accept the invitation of the Auction representative to attend a meeting, giving him an opportunity to explain why a mere farmer whose only equipment is experience and a wide acquaintance among the produce dealers of our country, is able to secure for the growers better results than the widely heralded auction company with its leased wires, elaborate organization, and high salaried representatives.
