"For all this McAdoo did not appear in a single lawsuit. He did not write a court brief. He did not prepare a petition or an answer. He was dealing for the most part in his domestic transactions with men who had been part of the administration when he was a member of the cabinet."

GARNER HAS NEW SET OF FIGURES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—A new set of treasury figures made public today by Representative Garner, Texas, ranking democrat on the house ways and means committee estimated that the personal income tax reduction schedule of the Garner Tax plan would result in a loss of \$483,000,000 in revenue in 1925 and the Mellon plan would cause a loss of \$350,000,000.

The estimates did not take into consideration proposed reductions in the miscellaneous taxes and were based on estimated revenue for the calendar year 1925. Joseph McCoy, government actuary, who made the estimates, said also they were predicated upon the passage of either plan, "so that their effect will be felt by us the latter part of 1924."

Commenting on the figures, Mr. Garner in a statement said it would be observed that the estimates on the Mellon plan show \$250,000,000 loss whereas in the letter to Chairman Green of the ways and means committee the treasury secretary estimated the loss at \$289,000,000. He said he called attention to these matters to show the unreliability of the figures that have been emanating from the treasury department.
