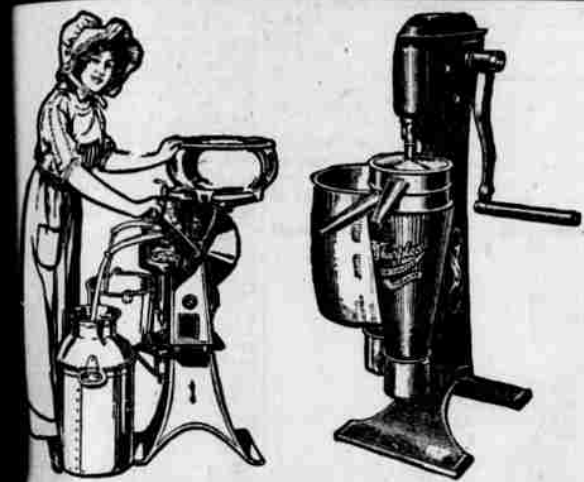

MUST FILE TAX RETURNS BY MAR. 15

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 29.—"It is very apparent that any proposed reduction by congress affecting the federal tax on 1923 incomes cannot be enacted by law and made effective prior to March 15, which is the final day for filing these returns under the present law," announced Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, today. "In view of this fact, taxpayers must file their returns not later than midnight, Saturday, March 15, otherwise they will be fined for delinquency."

"Taxpayers should not longer defer filing their returns and paying at least one-fourth of the amount of the tax. In event congress finally reduces the rate of tax on individual incomes, those who paid their tax in full will promptly and automatically receive a refund of the excess tax paid. Those paying only a portion of their tax will receive a credit on their unpaid balance. But I wish to emphasize the fact that it is imperative for taxpayers to file returns on or before March 15 and pay at least one-fourth of the amount of the tax due."

Sickness or absence from the state, according to Collector Huntley, are the only excuses under which a taxpayer will be permitted to file his federal income tax statement later than Saturday, March 15, and not be penalized for his delinquency. Even then the taxpayer must apply to Collector Huntley for an extension in time of 30 days to complete and file his return, assigning one of the two reasons as an excuse. Such extensions will be granted only when in the judgment of the collector further time is actually required for making an accurate return. Application for any extension of time must be made prior to March 15.

CONCERNING EGGS

To the editor:
In order to correct a quite general misapprehension that, through the statements and comments of the market reorter of the Portland Journal, have arisen relative to the egg ruling recently issued by this office to become effective March 1st, I beg the use of a little space in your valued publication.

To begin with, this ruling was not made in the interest of any dealer or person, but for the protection of the consumer and for the protection and in the interest of the honest producer, be he farmer, small poultryman or operator of a commercial hennery, as well as the grocer and other dealer who wants to receive and give a square deal.

The ruling was made after consulting a number of producers as well as dealers and with the advice of the office of the district attorney of Multnomah county, and of the state market master and we believe it is in the interest of the poultry industry and of all honest persons connected therewith.

Regardless of whatever may have been said to the contrary this ruling was not intended to, neither does it exclude any good marketable egg no matter where nor by whom produced.

The ruling reads as follows:
1. A fresh egg is an egg of recent production, clean, full with "fixed air space" of not more than three-sixteenths of an inch in depth, sweet, strong of body and unimpaired in quality. The albumen must not appear watery. A larger air space with a movable lower line indicates a stale egg, or one that is becoming weak or watery.

2. A fresh standard egg is a fresh egg, as defined in paragraph 1, weighing not less than one and seven-sixths ounces.

3. A fresh pullet egg is a fresh egg weighing of less than one and seven-twelfths ounces.

4. A fresh "peewee" egg is any fresh egg weighing less than one and seven-twelfths ounces.

5. All standard eggs, pullet eggs and "peewee" eggs shall be packed separately and the grade plainly marked on the end of the case, showing the particular grade of the eggs in the case.

6. Second-grade eggs are good, edible eggs, but with an air space more than three-sixteenths of an inch in depth and not good enough to grade as standard in the different classifications herewith defined. Eggs known as large hatch spots, heavily shrunk eggs, settled yolks and leaking eggs, and eggs with loose air space are fit for consumption but will not stand transportation.

7. Eggs known as "yolk stuck to the shell," "blood rings," "partially hatched," "mouldy eggs," "black spots," "black or mixed rots" and other eggs of unwholesome nature shall not be offered or exposed for sale or sold.

General

1. It shall be unlawful for any

person to sell, offer for sale, or have in his possession with intent to sell, eggs for human food purposes which are not fit for human food within the meaning as prescribed in rules and regulations herewith set forth, or to sell or offer for sale any egg except for what it is, or unless it is properly marked or branded, or unless such egg has been properly candled.

2. When eggs are removed from the original container for resale, the true grade of said eggs must be stamped upon the subsequent container in letters not less than one third in height. If placed on display for sale, a sign must be placed immediately over said eggs in letters not less than one inch in height giving the true grade of said eggs. When eggs are sold in lots of half case or more, an invoice must accompany said sale plainly and truly indicating the grade or grades of eggs sold.

There has grown out of the trade the practice of the use of certain names in connection with eggs intended to designate grades or kinds of eggs named—such as "White Hen-nery Standards," "elects," "guaranteed eggs," "Oregon Ranch Eggs," "Mixed Color Standards," "Current Receipt Eggs," and various other terms which to a great extent have meant absolutely nothing in so far as the quality or size of the egg may have been concerned. While the use of some of these terms are all right among professional egg men, or what is known as "the trade," at the present time they are absolutely meaningless to the average consumer or household buyer of eggs. This matter has simply run loose until serious abuses have come about, therefore we feel that it is time that some steps should be taken to correct it.

With this object in view, we have undertaken to promulgate this new ruling through which all of these various terms are done away with in so far as they apply to a recognized quality or grade of eggs.

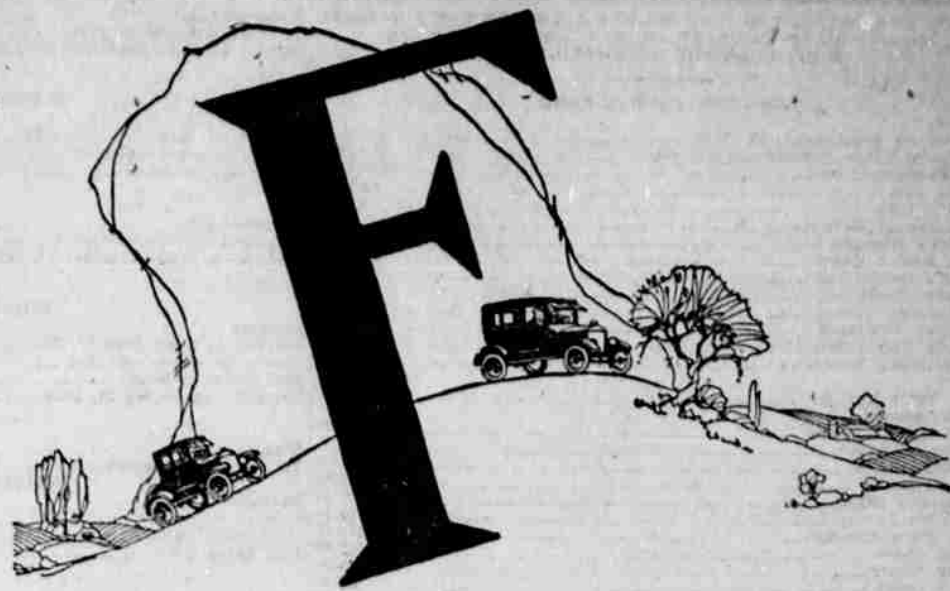
The definitions and standards used are practically in line with the rules and regulations of many other states, also the requirements of the United States department of agriculture and I challenge any one to find anything in the mth that will exclude marketable eggs from any market in Oregon.

You will note that this ruling does not compel the farmer to grade his eggs if he finds it impossible for him to do so unless he is selling direct to the consumer. In that case he must candle and grade his eggs. Neither does it compel the country storekeeper to candle and grade eggs received from the farmer only in such cases as he is distributing to the consumer. We recommend that the farmer should candle and grade his eggs, if he does not the storekeeper receiving them should candle and grade them. However if the will not do so we are not in a position to compel them to, but we will absolutely require that somewhere between the man who produces said eggs and the man who sells them to the final distributor, they shall be candled and graded.
