Woman's Division Takes Up Lawn Project

Three members of the Roseburg Woman's club, Mrs. Foster Butler, Mrs. S. D. Evans, and Mrs. William Bell, compose a division of the City Beautiful Commission, and to them has been given the lawn project, one of the most important of the many departments of work to be taken up by the commission.

The ladies have already worked out a plan of organization which they will set in motion at once, and have announced a lawn contest in which every one can enter, the only requirements for entrance being an earnest desire to beautify homes and streets by means of lawn and shrubbery, and a willingness to work to this end. Roseburg has been divided into five divisions, the southeast section, southwest section, northeast section, and West Roseburg, using Jackson and Cass streets as the dividing lines. Chairmen will be announced later for each section whose duty it will be to watch the work being done by the various home owners, and report to the commission. Three classes of prizes will be given in each section. Class 1 for the best lawn and parking, first, second and third prizes; class 2, improved lawn and parking, first, second and third prizes, and class 3, the most attractive grounds, first, second and third prizes.

The long streets running north and south, east and west are put into another division, and two classes of prizes will be given in this division, the first for the most beautiful street as a whole in Roseburg, and the second for the street showing the most improvements. Chairmen will be appointed for each of the long streets, and they will keep close watch on the general improvement work going on, call on home owners, and stimulate interest in home beautification. The streets to be included in this division are Main, Jackson, both north and south, Rose, Stephens, Pine, Mill, Winchester, Douglas, Washington, Lane, Cass, Oak, Mosher, Court, and Commercial.

In the first division, where prizes are awarded individual homes, the prizes will be money, and possibly shrubbery, and choice rose cuttings. In the street division, the prizes will be ribbons.

For those who do not know the first steps in making a lawn, the following instructions have been issued by the commission: "To have a good lawn the soil must be fine and rich, and well leveled. A load of two or three river loam spread over the soil after it is leveled will greatly improve the condition of the soil. Rake, level, and roll before sowing the seed. Raking in the seed and rolling is advisable. Sow one pound seed to 200 square feet. A good lawn mixture is two pounds blue grass, one pound white clover, and one-half pound red top. In watering your lawn soak it deeply as light watering every day brings the roots close to the surface where they quickly burn or dry out."

The judging of streets and individual lawns and parkings will be done late in the summer or early in the fall.

BURNS IS LINKED TO OIL SCANDAL

agers of the Western Union and Postal telegraph companies at Three Rivers, N. M., where Albert B. Burns' ranch is located, were subpoenaed today by the oil committee. They were asked to produce in Washington copies of all telegrams received there since January 1, 1921, for Mr. Fall, Harry P. Sinclair, J. W. Zevely, Robert Stewart of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, and H. W. Blackmer of the Midwest Oil company.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—William J. Burns, chief of the department of justice investigation bureau, will be summoned by the oil committee to explain whether code messages sent to E. B. McLean's employees in Florida were in a cipher used by the department's secret agents.

He also will be asked whether Mr. McLean himself is not carried on the books of the department as a secret agent at a nominal salary. Mary Duckstein, who once was secretary to Mr. Burns and who now is on the department's roll of secret agents, also will be called by the committee and asked whether she signed code messages sent to Florida in the signature of "Mary."

One of the code messages was so signed and placed before the oil committee was addressed to W. O. Duckstein, one of McLean's confidential men. He is the husband of Mary Duckstein.

Mr. Burns said today that he understood the code employed in this message was used at one time by the department of justice agents.

He denied however, that he ever had had any communication with McLean in Florida and said he did not know the basis on which the message from Mary Duckstein to W. O. Duckstein, as it had been deciphered, mentions "Burns" in interpreting himself in McLean's affairs.

This message was sent on February 2, and was indorsed in red "telegram post for W. O. D." with the initials A. D. M. affixed. Arthur D. Marks is business manager of the post.

Committee members would not discuss this situation today beyond saying that Mr. Burns and Mr. Duckstein would be questioned.
