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CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR HERE

K. K. Kubli, Speaker of the House of Representatives Now Candidate For U. S. Senator in City.

K. K. Kubli, of Portland, candidate on the republican ticket for the office of United States senator, stopped in Roseburg today on his way to Klamath Falls in the interest of his campaign. During his brief stay in Roseburg Mr. Kubli took advantage of the opportunity to meet some of the prominent men and women of the city being introduced by Attorney J. O. Watson.

Mr. Kubli is accompanied by D. E. Fletcher of Independence, Oregon, who is representative to the state legislature from Polk county, and is chairman not the ways and means committee of the house.

They are going to Klamath Falls and then will return through southern Oregon stopping at the various cities and towns, meeting with as many of the voters as possible.

It is Mr. Kubli's intention to visit all of the state before the primary election. His platform will be issued publicly about the middle of the present month. He states that he is greatly encouraged by the reception met with in the places already visited and is confident of the nomination.

Before returning to Roseburg he expects to make a visit to Jackson county where he was born and spent much of his early life. Upon his return to this city he will speak at the Soldiers Home.

Mr. Kubli served as speaker of the house of representatives and is well known throughout the entire state.

CHAMBER WILL TAKE NEW WORK

The board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce met yesterday afternoon in regular session, all directors being present.

A letter was read from the Chamber of Commerce of Grants Pass announcing a dinner in honor of their retiring president on Monday evening of next week, and asking for a delegation from this city to attend the dinner. T. H. Ness agreed to head such a delegation, and all those members of the local chamber who care to visit the Grants Pass chamber Monday evening will please report to Mr. Ness so that plates will be reserved for them.

According to tentative plans it is very likely that a tourist information bureau will be established in the chamber, as a branch of the Oregon State Motor association. There are certain conditions that will have to be met however, to secure the bureau, but it is thought by the directors that there will be no trouble on this score.

The secretary was instructed to write the commissioner of the State Bureau of Labor notifying him that the local chamber would be pleased to conduct a free labor bureau in connection with the other work of the chamber this season. Farmers who need help during the busy season are requested to call at the chamber and register their wants, while idle laboring men will do the same. There will not be any charge for this service, as the chamber wants to be of the utmost service to the farmers of this county.

The finance committee announced that their campaign for membership would be renewed next week, Tuesday, and that in the meantime some advertising matter would be gotten out to acquaint people with what the chamber stands for in the community. The secretary was instructed to place this publicity campaign in operation at once.

The secretary announced that he had secured the services of the boy scouts to undertake the industrial survey of the city some time right after the 15th. Further announcement of this survey will be made from time to time until the date set. This survey is of the utmost importance and it is hoped that every business and professional man in the city will be more than willing to cooperate with the boys.

OVER 400 ARRESTED

SOFIA, Bulgaria, March 5.—Further arrests of Macedonian leaders throughout Bulgaria have brought the total of those in custody to over 400.

In the Sobranje (national assembly) a former attorney-general, a Macedonian interpellated the government on arrests made without the legal procedure provided in the constitution. The minister of the interior took the entire responsibility for violating the constitution, declaring the action was necessary to safeguard the life of the country. The arrests are continuing.

equipment specified by the disputed clause. This is absolutely not true. If that was the case it never would have been inserted in the ordinance. Following is a list of firms doing business on the Pacific coast who can supply a "triple combination fire truck of standard make with a pumping capacity of 1000 gallons of water per minute."

Anyone interested is at liberty to write to any of these firms and secure literature.

In purchasing a fire truck such as is described in the so-called "Joker" the city will have bids or competition from at least four companies, all of whom know of the proposed purchase and have had representatives in this city investigating the matter and interviewing some of the councilmen.

Those who fear that the instigators of the fire truck measure, myself and other firemen, have hope of obtaining a graft should have their fears allayed. The city council is the only body or person that possesses authority to purchase fire equipment and is the body which will make the selection in case of purchase. Why would graft be handed to we persons who have absolutely no authority to in any way make or influence a deal of this kind? If a truck is purchased by the city the council has authority to select from the several bids the one to the best interest of the city. Let them do so.

Included in the bond issue was the sum of \$1500 for additional equipment which is needed equally as much if not more so than the fire truck. Included in this list is a life net, gas masks, helmets and many other articles, which also can be secured through a competitive bid from quite a number of concerns.

When the purchase of the present fire truck was agitated about eight years ago the same kind of opposition was encountered by those, including myself, who sponsored the movement as is prevailing now. Right finally prevailed and the present standard make truck was purchased. There is no one who will admit but that it has paid for itself time after time, and was an excellent buy for the city.

Some of those who were most strongly opposed to the purchase of the present fire truck at that time have burst forth claiming all the credit of securing it for the city.

I was born in Roseburg and have lived here continuously since except for time spent in the army, so my past life should be an open book to the citizens of Roseburg. All I ask is that my sincerity in the present truck bond proposition be judged by my past.

There you have the so-called "Joker" and our reasons for inserting it in the ordinance. I am not ashamed of the part I had to do with it.

It also was stated in the article in Tuesday's News-Review that not more than one firm can supply the type of

piece of fire apparatus having a chemical tank, body for carrying fire hose and a water pump. The three units combined constitute "triple combination." The next clause "of standard make" should need no explanation, as it would not be logical for the city nor anyone else to buy machinery for emergency use such as fire trucks that is not of standard make—reliable, backed by the maker's name and reputation, and for which parts to replace breakage can be secured 10 or 15 years hence as well as today. In my opinion the city should not purchase a fire truck that is not of standard make, and that clause was purposely put in the proposed ordinance as a protection to the taxpayers to insure against the purchase of an assembled piece of apparatus which may not have a manufacturer to back it a few years hence.

With a pumping capacity of 1000 gallons of water a minute" is the concluding clause of the "Joker." A pump of this type will pump any amount of water desired up to about 1100 gallons of water per minute. It will pump 100 gallons per minute as well as 1000 gallons, or it will pump 500 gallons per minute as well as 1000, but at a great deal more pressure than a 500 gallon a minute pump. However this is a very technical subject that can be understood only after much study. But neither is the pump specified the largest size made, as many are capable of pumping 1500 gallons of water per minute. However the 1000 gallon pump is the size ordinarily used under local conditions, where there is only one pump to depend upon. It is not an exceptionally large size pump, as 500 gallons of water per minute will flow through one line of fire hose such as we use in Roseburg (the standard size), so it can be seen that the full amount of water the pump is capable of delivering can be pumped through two lines of fire hose.

A pump of 750 gallons per minute capacity costs only \$1000 less, so I believe we should have the larger size when we can get it for only 133th additional cost, and then the city will have in service a pump of ample capacity when it is needed—which may be any day.

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
