BROWN EYED BETTY: Brush them as often as possible, using an upward movement, with a small brush and pure white vaseline. This will increase the growth, but will not change the color. The only way to change the color is with one of the preparations that they sell for this purpose and must be put on daily. I would not advise their use as they are apt to give an artificial look to the eyes. A mild soap and warm water can be used on gloves of this kind, but would advise you to have them dry cleaned.

WORK IS STARTED ON SUTHERLIN CAMP GROUND

During the past week very satisfactory progress has been made in putting Sutherlin's new automobile camp ground in shape for occupancy and if the weather continues fair the work will be practically completed within ten days, says the Sutherlin Sun.

The old building formerly used as a shelter for farmers' teams, was dismantled last week, and a portion of the lumber, with the addition of considerable new material, is being used in the construction of shelters for tourists' cars and in which they can prepare meals. There is a water hydrant on the grounds and camp tables will be built in convenient places for the use of those who may desire to rest there for a day or two.

A large portion of the work has been donated by enterprising citizens, desirous of seeing a good camp ground established in Sutherlin, and the spirit which they have displayed in the matter is certainly commendable.

A number of shade trees are to be set out within the camp grounds and it is probable that additional lots adjoining will be taken over for the purpose of putting in a tennis court. All this will require a little time and some money, but citizens generally are behind the enterprise, we are sure to accomplish our desire.

Help for Baby SCOTT'S EMULSION Builds Strong Bones

and instructions for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of such ground squirrels and is hereby recommended, to-wit: alkaloid strychnine used on either barley or wheat, barley preferred, mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Barley, clean grain, 16 quarts; Strychnine, (powdered alkaloid), 1 ounce; Bicarbonate of Soda (baking soda) 1 ounce; thin starch paste, 3-4 pint; heavy corn syrup, 1 pint; glycerine, 1 tablespoonful; Saccharine, 1-8 ounce.

Mix thoroughly in a clean vessel, 1 ounce of powdered strychnine (alkaloid), 1 ounce of common baking soda, and 1-8 ounce of saccharine. Over this pour 1 pint of thin, hot starch paste and stir well. (The starch paste is made by dissolving 1 heaping tablespoonful of dry glass starch in a little cold water, which is then added to 34 pints of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a clear thin paste is formed.) Stir in 1 pint of heavy corn syrup and 1 tablespoonful of glycerine, making sure that none of the heavy syrup paste sticks to the bottom of the container. Pour this mixture over 16 quarts of good cleaned barley and mix well so that each grain is coated.

From the date hereof until May 1st is the most effective time to poison and destroy the digger squirrels, as they are just emerging from their hibernation; they are hungry and food is scarce.
