Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is preparing to launch an active membership campaign starting Tuesday. The campaign to start on Tuesday will be well organized and will reach all parts of the city. CARAVAN WILL BE HERE TONIGHT

The Mexican caravan conducted by W. P. Hawley, Jr., will arrive from Portland this evening, and after the night spent here will leave tomorrow morning promptly at 9 o'clock. The caravan will be officially dispatched from Roseburg by Mayor George J. Baker, of Portland, who is scheduled to arrive tonight from Coos Bay where he has been attending the convention of lumbermen. Mr. Hawley is making the trip by automobile to Mexico City over the great desert, a task which has been declared impossible. He is accompanied by public men, motion picture photographers, mechanics and others who expect to secure some interesting data on the trip. Leaving Roseburg in the morning, it is expected that the expedition will reach Redding Sunday evening and will spend the night there.

Mayor Baker was forced to be absent from Portland when the caravan left, owing to the previous engagement, but he has arranged to give the official sanction to the trip in a public ceremonial tomorrow morning. The caravan will form in front of the city hall, where Mayor Baker will speak, and will leave immediately on the trip south.

REFUSE TO DISCLOSE NAME IN BRIBE CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 8.—The department of agriculture declined today to disclose the names of the two representatives referred to in the Chicago grand jury report.

Attorney-General Daugherty offered, however, to transmit to the house in response to its request, evidence said to indicate improper use of influence for a consideration, developed in Chicago.

Mr. Daugherty took the position he could not disclose the identity of the two representatives as asked in the house resolution until the department had an opportunity to more carefully go into the charges against them. He offered to withhold further action by the department in the case to enable a house committee to examine the evidence and develop the truth of the charges.

Representative Longworth immediately moved that the communication be referred to the judiciary committee with instructions to report immediately with regard to a course of procedure.

Before the house could act on the Longworth motion, Representative Zihlman, republican, Maryland, who has been mentioned in connection with the charges took the floor to defend his name.

A few moments later the house adopted the Longworth motion.

Mr. Zihlman, declared he had it on reliable authority that John W. H. Crim, who represented the department of justice in the Chicago grand jury proceedings had disclosed to some persons his name and that of another house member in connection with the charges.

In declaring he wanted action and full investigation of charges which might concern him, he declared he could "demonstrate to the house and the country that he had been guilty of no wrong doing."

"I have no fear," asserted the Maryland member, who is chairman of the labor committee "but that I will be able to clear my name."

While Mr. Zihlman was speaking, seated directly in front of him was Director Langley, republican, Kentucky, who yesterday told the house he had information that he was involved and was innocent of the charges.

As on yesterday, when Langley had completed a brief statement from the floor of the house, members rose today when Mr. Zihlman concluded his plea for fair dealing and applauded him as he walked back to his seat.

Before adoption of the Longworth motion, Representative King, republican, Illinois, made a bitter attack on Mr. Zihlman.

CASH BONUS PLAN LOSES IN COMMITTEE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 8.—A proposal to make full cash payments on option in the soldiers' bonus bill was voted down today by the house ways and means committee which decided to limit payments to paid up life insurance.

The vote was 13 to 12 on motion made by Representative Crowther, republican, New York. The eleven democratic members of the committee supported it.

Detailed terms of the bill would be drafted by a sub-committee. Cash payments to veterans not entitled to more than \$50 will be approved as an exception. The benefits will extend to officers up to and including the rank of Captain in the army and marine corps, lieutenant in the navy as allowed in the bill passed in the last session.

KANSAS SENATOR MAKES A DENIAL

and was informed a subpoena for McLean had been issued. So far as he could recall, Senator Curtis did not see Bennett until the day Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, made a speech mentioning a member of McLean's family. That was on January 30, the day before the "principal" telegram was sent.

Later Bennett testified that Senator Curtis had advised President Coolidge immediately after he came into office to ask Attorney-General Daugherty to resign.

Francis T. Homer of Baltimore took the stand and denied the statement in one of the McLean telegrams that he had suggested a direct wire between Washington and the McLean cottage at Palm Beach to give "quick and easy access to the White House."

On the day of the Norris address, Bennett came to Curtis with reference to having Senator Norris withdraw his remarks.

Before that Senator Curtis testified he already had suggested to Senator Norris that the remarks be expunged from the record. Later he saw Bennett in the lobby and told him the statements would be withdrawn.

Senator Curtis flatly denied that Bennett had delivered any message to him from McLean. He added that he had not talked with Bennett about the political aspects of the oil inquiry.

Bennett then was recalled and asked if he cared to make any further statement.

"Certainly," was his answer. "Senator Curtis," he went on, "apparently has forgotten one and probably two additional conversations I had with him."

Bennett said he did not want to relate the conversations as they were somewhat personal.

Pressed as to the conversations he said he would not answer unless compelled to, as he did not want to spread "scandal."

"I hope we won't have any mystery about it," Senator Walsh said. "Go on, tell us about it."

Bennett again refused unless compelled to do so and the committee voted unanimously that he should answer.

The witness then testified that Senator Curtis had been asked for advice as to what the policy of the Post had been while publishing matters concerning the oil inquiry.

E. S. Rochester, employed in the office of Attorney-General Daugherty was questioned about his telegram to McLean of January 16, saying investigation was being made of McLean's financial affairs in reference to his testimony about the \$100,000 in checks.

"That telegram was purely personal," Rochester said, "and had nothing to do with my connection with the department of justice."

Rochester said he obtained his information about the investigation from a dozen or more newspaper men.

"I did not," Rochester said, when asked if he had received a suggestion from within the department of justice about his message.
