THE BARBER SHOP.

Last time I was in town I went to Ike's Barber Shop and took May to get her hair trimmed and the clippers put on her neck, and to have the same thing done for myself, says a writer in Farm Life. Mrs. Dr. Wesley was there with her eight-year-old girl twins, and young Bob Farrel with his little sister, Miss Galt, who clerks at the Emporium, was there with her chum, and there were two high school girls waiting to have their bobbed hair trimmed. Also and incidentally, there were a couple of men, but they had a furtive, hang-dog air, and one of them stared out of the window, and the other at a magazine, while they muttered occasionally. The women in the place, and the children, contrariwise, were natural, and chattered a good deal while they waited turns at Ike's big red plush chair.

I'm just this side of thirty, but it came over me with something of a shock, as I sat listening to Mrs. Dr. Wesley talking about the church bazaar, how the world has changed. Why, I can remember when I was twelve or thirteen, we felt that it was immodest to so much as look in the window of a barber shop. A "nice" girl walked by with circumspection, with her eyes glued to the sidewalk, and never lifted her head to stare into this den of masculinity.

Now, all over the country, in all the little towns, the barbers with much politeness are trimming bobbed brown and golden heads and clipping slim white young necks. I asked Ike, and he says the girls and children have doubled his income—that they are good cash customers, orderly and decent, and every man who comes into his place understands that the barber shop is a place for public service, male or female, and behaves accordingly.

About this time, as the almanacs say, the spring poet used to walk into the newspaper office and drag out some laboriously wrought verses, which with a kind of hopeful diffidence she presented to the editor. That authority was not commonly much impressed with their news value, but in many cases he printed them, out of sympathy for a kindly soul. We have more poets than ever before now, the majority highly sophisticated and cultured. Most of them seek less obvious subjects than spring. However the romance of the spring time appeals to many people who still preserve simplicity of heart amid a complex age. DEMPSEY-FIRPO TO
FIGHT LABOR DAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, March 12.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, will defend his title against Luis Firpo, south American fighter, in New York on Labor Day he announced after his arrival here last night.

The Argentinian will be his only opponent this year, the champion said.
Decision to fight Firpo was reached at a conference with Jack Kearns, his manager, before he left New York. The public wants the match he asserted.

"Most of the fans naturally would expect to see another such battle as we put up at the polo grounds, but it is seldom that two fights repeat in such fashion," Dempsey said. "I know Firpo's style of fighting now and our next meeting may not prove as interesting. By this I mean the fans will not see me going out of the ring as a result of one of Firpo's punches."

"If Firpo is beaten by Willis or Gibbons, then naturally, I would be compelled to fight the winner. However, I understand Firpo will not engage in any fights until he meets me. Under such conditions it looks like a quiet outdoor season for me."

The champion looked a bit thin and pale as a result of his recent operation. He planned to visit his parents before going on to the coast where he will engage in motion pictures for three months.

HIRAM JOHNSON IS
CRITICAL OF COOLIDGE

BISMARCK, N. D., March 12.—Criticism of the administration of President Coolidge and declaring that the Mexican policy of the administration is un-American and makes this country a "partner in war," Senator Hiram Johnson of California, candidate for the republican presidential nomination, in an address here last night continued his campaign in North Dakota for endorsement at next Tuesday's primary.

Mr. Johnson said E. L. Doheny, oil magnate, had loaned \$5,000,000 to the Mexican government and that he "wondered if the Mexican policy of the American government had anything to do with the loan."

IN SPRING LAMBS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, March 12.—Considerable decrease from last year in the market supply of early spring lambs in April, May and June is indicated by present conditions in the principal early lambing areas, according to a report issued today by the United States department of agriculture. The supply in July and August promises to be larger than that of last year.

The greater part of the supply of spring lambs in April and May comes usually from California, Arizona, Kentucky and Tennessee. Conditions in all these states except Arizona are less favorable than last year as regards productions and it is possible that the foot and mouth situation in California may cut off all supplies of lambs at eastern markets.

In June early lambs from the corn belt begin to move in volume and there is usually some receipts of early lambs from Idaho and Oregon.

Conditions both in the corn belt and in the northwest indicate a larger lamb crop than last year and with favorable spring weather the June movement from these areas

may be larger than that of last year.

Conditions in California have been generally unfavorable for the early lamb crop, especially where rainfall has been only 25 per cent of normal and there has been little pasture or green feed available.

In the Sacramento valley conditions have been more favorable and possibly almost as many lambs as last year will be raised. Under the most favorable conditions from now on there will be hardly 175,000 head for eastern shipment this year as against more than 275,000 head shipped last year.

In Arizona there will be from 40,000 to 60,000 early lambs for market. There are 40,000 in the southern valleys that will begin moving shortly after April 1 and continue through May.

In Iowa sheep have wintered well and there probably will be some increase in the number of early lambs. There have been plenty of winter feed in Idaho and sheep have wintered well. Weather conditions have been excellent especially in

February, when the bulk of early lambing takes place.
In Oregon the winter has been one of the most favorable known and sheep are in excellent condition. The early lamb crop is somewhat larger than last year and the June shipments will all equal last year's.

In Washington few early lambs are loaded before July. The crop is estimated at between 10 per cent larger than last year and sheep and lambs are in excellent condition in years. Winter has been abundant and prospects early range are good.
