FIRES IN MINE HINDERS RESCUES

CASTLE GATE, Utah, March 13.—A day and a night of fighting fire, the burial of seven victims and the finding of a few additional bodies is the story of the rescue work in mine number 2 of the Utah Fuel company since early Wednesday morning. An early hour this morning a total of 130 bodies had been taken out of the mine in which 173 men were entombed Saturday morning.

The recovery work, which had been going on rapidly until Wednesday morning was suddenly halted by the appearance of two fires in the mine. The rescuers were forced to give up their search for bodies and become fire fighters.

Danger that the rescue crews might be cut off by the fires, led to a search through all the old workings and various fires of minor importance were extinguished.

No exploration in the south end of the mine has been possible because of the fires. The north end has been almost completely searched and once the fires in the south are extinguished the combined efforts of the crew will make the final steps in the exploration and recovery a short task, it is hoped.

Seven bodies were buried in the little cemetery which sets almost above the place where the bodies were recovered.

CASTLE GATE, Utah, March 13.—Several small fires continued to burn today in mine number 2, Utah Fuel company, hampering the further recovery of the bodies of 173 men who perished in the explosions of last Saturday. Two bodies were taken out during last night, bringing the total recovered to 130.
