IRRIGATION RATE WILL BE GIVEN

The California Oregon Power Company Has Schedule Effective April 1.

MAKES REDUCTION

New Rate Will Provide Saving for Persons Using Water for Upkeep of Lawns, Parkings, Gardens.

Persons who are making extensive lawn improvements, putting in gardens, and otherwise improving their yards, will be glad to learn that starting April 1 the California Oregon Power company is putting into effect an irrigation rate which will make a slight reduction in water bills. The rate goes into effect automatically and remains in force for six months, from April to September, and is applicable only for irrigation and domestic use, not including business houses, apartment houses, and boarding houses.

The regular domestic rate, now in force, is as follows: First 300 cubic feet or less, \$1.25. Next 1700 cubic feet or less 15c per hundred cubic feet.

Next 18,000 cubic feet or less, 10c per hundred cubic feet.

All in excess of 20,000 cubic feet, 8c per hundred cubic feet.

The following is the schedule which will apply during the irrigation season:

First 300 cubic feet or less, \$1.25.

Next 200 cubic feet, 15c per hundred cubic feet.

Next 19,500 cubic feet, 10c per hundred cubic feet.

All in excess of 20,000 cubic feet, 8c per hundred cubic feet.

SLAYER OF BRIDE TAKEN TO KELSEO

PENDLETON, March 13.—Sheriff Studebaker arrived here last night by auto from Kelseo for Eldon Hutchinson and journeyed back this morning with his prisoner leaving Pendleton about 7:30. Last night W. H. Hutchinson, uncle of the boy was in Pendleton and he described the finding of the words "God Bless You" written in pebbles on the grave of Olive Hutchinson at Pilot Rock by Eldon Hutchinson as he kept his ghastly vigil over the grave of his slain wife Tuesday night. The uncle also described the meeting between father and son. "It was sad beyond words." There will be no legal defense offered by the family.

Both the father and the uncle told the boy that he would have to tell the truth and take his medicine when they talked to him yesterday morning.

The uncle said that the boy had been quiet, but that he had always been very bright and had never given any trouble. "He had spells when he was especially singular," said his uncle. "In fact he was far older than his years warranted. He never had a boyhood nor played like other boys, he was always an old man."

The father E. E. Hutchinson is nearly prostrated over the terrible deed of his son. The boy's own mother is dead, the present Mrs. E. E. Hutchinson being his step-mother.

UNABLE TO DEAL WITH JAP QUESTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Efforts to deal adequately with the Japanese immigration question have failed former Senator Pehlan of California today told the senate immigration commission because of the "subservient character" of American diplomacy "actuated by fear mostly" in dealing with Japan.

Appearing as spokesman for a California deliberation at the committee's hearing on the Japanese immigration bill, Mr. Pehlan declared that to give the Japanese the same recognition as is accorded Europeans under the quota provisions would be to "discriminate" not against them but "in favor of the Chinese, the Japanese, and other proud and cultured people."

Citing that "the federal government by law for 130 years has drawn a distinction between those that are eligible to citizenship and those that are ineligible," he asserted that since adoption of the gentlemen's agreement in 1908, "38,000 Japanese women have been sent in with Japanese passports as alleged brides."

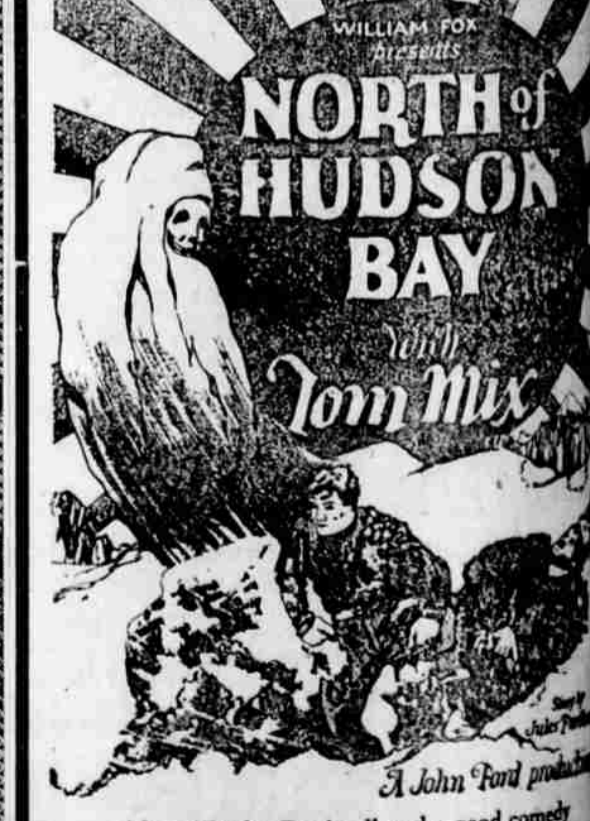

MELLON MAKES AN OPPOSAL TO PLANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 12.—Secretary Mellon opposed today before the senate finance committee a proposal to decrease the fund supplied for the reduction of the public debt as a means of making greater surplus available for tax reductions. He pointed out that the money paid by England and other nations on their loans to this country must be applied under the law to the retirement of the bonds which made possible the loans. The present law would make it possible, he said, to retire the public debt of \$29,000,000,000 in about 35 years. Chairman Smoot supported Mr. Mellon's views.
