one to justify the means," the senator declared, and the room full of spectators applauded the pun.

Roxie Stinson, divorced wife of Smith, who has furnished all the sensations heretofore, was not on the stand today. It was said she was ill. When the committee adjourned after a rapid fire three hour session to resume at 10 a. m. tomorrow, Senator Wheeler said he didn't know whether he would continue with Means on reopening or whether he would recall Miss Stinson.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Gaston B. Means, former department of justice agent and man of many connections, was the first witness called today at the senate committee investigation of Attorney-General Daugherty. Roxie Stinson, divorced wife of Jesse Smith who has been telling of alleged "deals" between him and Attorney-General Daugherty was reported ill and unable to continue her testimony today.

Means said he had been urged and advised by his counsel, T. H. Felder, not to, but had decided to waive immunity and "to tell all." Means said he worked for the German, British, Mexican and United States governments—first for the German government.

At the request of the attorney-general's counsel, Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, gave assurances that Miss Stinson would remain here until cross-examined.

Means is under two federal indictments, one in connection with a liquor case and another with the New York bribery case.

Before Means began his testimony Senator Wheeler read a letter from the department of justice suggesting that Means might receive immunity in the pending indictments if he testified before the committee.

Asked if he wanted immunity, Means replied: "I waive immunity; I ask no quarter and will give no quarter."

Means sketched his early life, experience as a school teacher, then as

a salesman, and "confidential man." "I've been accused of every known crime in the catalogue, but never convicted so far," said Means when asked if ever convicted of a felony.

When asked what his present business was, Means first said: "Answering indictments."

Afterward he said his business was that of "investigator."

Senator Wheeler brought up Means' indictment for the murder of Mrs. Maud King. He said his evidence in that case was in a large suitcase in the room.

He was often employed by the Burns detective agency, Means testified, adding that his relations now with W. J. Burns, chief of the department of justice bureau of investigation now were the "friendliest in the world."

Asked to give his records, Means produced large diaries, loose leaf, containing he said, detailed records of his activities as a department of justice agent. Ten such books were put in the record.

Sensor Wheeler, at his elbow, Means puffing a cigarette, went through the books for "identifications."

Means joined the department of justice October 28, 1921 and worked there until early in 1922 when he was suspended, he said. He was reinstated with back pay, May 28, 1922.

"Burns didn't know why they suspended me," he said.

The attorney-general told him later, Means said, that he had been

suspended, "because another" cabinet member" had requested it as Means had been too active in investigating oil in Mexico.

"I didn't know whether I was working under Jess Smith, Burns or who," he said, referring to his working investigations. When he was suspended, Burns told him, he said, that he (Burns) "thought they were damn fools."

Means said his orders for investigation work in the department were initiated by various officials and many orders bore the initials of Jess W. Smith.

Means said he did not know then or now whether Smith had an official position. Smith's work would be "very difficult to describe," he said.

In the high price of bread investigation, Smith directed his work, Means said. "That doesn't mean there was anything wrong there because Smith was a merchant, with knowledge of conditions."

Final disposition of his reports were made, not by Smith but to the attorney-general Means explained.

When reinstated, the attorney-general asked him, Means said, if he had called in a law firm—Douglas, Ruffin and Ahear—regarding the oil and Mexican situations. Means told Daugherty he had called on the law firm and the attorney-general said his suspension was the "result of a request of a fellow cabinet member that I did not control."

Smith never gave him orders in the presence of the attorney-general. "They knew the game," Means said in telling of visits to the Daugherty-Smith apartment, and adding that "they" never saw them together—all separately.

Means testified he knew the information he had given Smith had been turned over to the attorney-general.

"Have you collected money on various occasions and from various people in your employment by the department of justice?" Means was asked.

"No sir. I had money delivered to me, for some one else. I did not go out and look for them myself."

When asked who he meant by "they" Means replied: "Ol. Jesse Smith and W. T. Underwood—I saw him last at Palm Beach."

Means said he was sent to Palm Beach by Sydney Thompson, who had business with Underwood, Senator Wheeler suggested Means was the "go-between" after Jess Smith died.

"The money carrier," interrupted Means.

Underwood, Means stated, was making investigation for the president of the United States. He later said Underwood wanted to "catch Secretary Mellon and we got him."

President Harding, he added, wanted the information.

Means said he gave Captain R. I. Scaife "thousands of dollars" in connection with his investigations. Scaife was an investigator at the department who assisted investigation of aircraft scandals.

Means testified that he, too, had worked for President Harding. The charges against the attorney-general, Means declared, were not true. Means said he and Underwood represented the president.

Sidney Thompson, Means added, was "the messenger for Underwood."

Underwood, Means explained, "was the man who worked with Jesse Smith," and helped him (Means) make investigations. He understood Thompson was a friend of Smith's and without any connection with the department of justice.

Means declared he had a Laura Jacobson investigate Senator Caraway, democrat, Kansas.

The Caraway investigation was made after the senator had attacked President Harding and the attorney-general Means said.

Sensor La Follette also was investigated, Means said, adding that he saw to it that the La Follette office was gone through, although he did not do it personally.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—A resolution broadening still further the powers of the Daugherty investigating committee, was adopted by the senate.

Under it the committee can hold meetings outside the city of Washington whenever and wherever

deemed necessary by its chairman; and any committee member can subpoena witnesses and papers, administer oaths and take testimony.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Secretary Mellon's name was brought into the Daugherty investigation today by Gaston B. Means former department of justice agent who said that for president Harding he investigated matters connected with "certain permits" having to do with violation of the Volstead act.

"Jesse Smith wanted us to catch Secretary Mellon and we caught him," said Means. President Harding wanted the information. The first time he slipped through our

"I gave Captain Scaife thousands of dollars to catch him (Mellon)," Means testified.

Scaife was formerly a department of justice investigator, who was active in pressing for investigation of aircraft scandals.

Also at President Harding's request, Means testified, he investigated Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas and also Senator La Follette after the latter had been agitating investigation of the Teapot Dome scandal.

"It came to our attention," Means said, "that Secretary Mellon had to furnish certain permits for certain purposes."

"Generally speaking, you were investigating the liquor ring in New York, were you not?"

"Well it was into violations of the prohibition laws."

Jesse Smith and W. T. Underwood, said Means, gave him orders to investigate Senator La Follette to learn what information he had and "anything to stop him."

Smith paid his expenses. Means could not, however, state of his own knowledge that Smith was following orders of the attorney general. Underwood he knew, represented President Harding because he had seen a letter to Jesse Smith from President Harding authorizing an "under cover" investigation.
