## DEVELOPING POISON IN THE BODY.

There are poisons that are developed within the body. The life processes produce poison as by-product. The liver destroys these poisons and the skin, lungs, kidneys, and bowels eliminate them. These poisons cause old age and eventually death. Were it possible to insure perfect elimination we might live indefinitely. It is therefore important that elimination be promoted by efficient kidney action, regular bowel movements, and an active skin, says a bulletin from the Oregon State Board of Health.

It is not alone important to eliminate the poison produced within the body, but it is just as important to keep out of the body poison from outside. Drugs, self-administered as medicine, and habit forming drugs are important causes of physical impairment. The type of self-medication which is particularly harmful is the taking of headache powders, which in no instance effect a cure of the underlying cause. The abuse of puratives and laxatives is another type of poison.

However, the most common form of poisoning is infection. Infections are due to the growth in the body of minute animal or vegetable forms commonly known as germs. Infections enter the body through the skin and mucous membranes. These germs are carried from person to person and the diseases which they cause are known as "catching." Most of these germs develop in the body and leave by way of the discharges. Mouth sprays, sneezing, coughing and kissing may convey the infection to others. Infected persons and carriers may through their discharges infect water, food, and eating utensils. Infection is spread by unclean hands and promiscuous expectorating. Water supplies are infected by sewage.

Although most healthy people's germs are not disease germs and are therefore harmless to other people, it is hard to tell when even healthy people may get disease germs from some one else. Try not to let other people pass on their germs to you, especially if they have any kind of disease germs such as tuberculosis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, measles, etc. Persons having on them or in them, germs of communicable disease, must be controlled. To do this properly means intimate attention and supervision of infected persons by health authorities who know their business and do nothing else.

Do not allow poison or infection to enter your body.

## THE RACE FOR SOCIAL POSITION.

It may be said that the American people devote more thought to getting money than anything else, yet the desire for social position is equally strong in many people's minds. Many women feel it keenly. There are intense heart burnings because people are not able to get into this or that "set." Even in many of the smaller cities and towns, where life is supposed to be democratic, there are often cliques that are considered superior to others, and people fret if they can't get into just the group they want. What is called social position should be a kind of by-product of life. It is not something to which people should devote thought and diplomatic strategy, as many do. Some people get the idea that if they commit trifling errors of etiquette they may be condemned by the people whose society they desire. The really valuable friendships, however, are not affected by such minor considerations. It is natural that people should desire recognition from people whose friendship is valuable. If people remain in the towns where they grew up, they usually have plenty of friendships from early associations. It is not always so easy to make fine associations when people move about from place to place. Such people are frequently overlooked for a time. One should not feel affronted if he is not at once sought out and welcomed. He needs a certain self-dependence that will make him willing to be inconspicuous for a time. Let him be responsive to friendly approaches, and make himself useful to the community. The friendship of people who are doing really vital things is of the most importance. If one forgets that such a thing as social position exists, and just tries to give service and friendship, he is most apt to make the friends that count.

People who wonder why it is that so many accidents occur nowadays, might get an idea if they would take a position in the front vestibule of a trolley car in thickly populated district. Looking from the viewpoint of the motorman, one will be likely to see revelations of public carelessness. He is likely to see people crossing the tracks close in front of a rapidly moving car, when they would not lose five seconds by waiting. The ground may be slippery and they might catch their feet in the protruding rails, but that would not bother some folks. The way automobiles will race with trolley cars on narrow streets suggests how little caution some folks have. The public was never more inclined to gamble with hazards than it is today.

# FEDERALS ATTACK A BAND OF REBELS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

VERA CRUZ, March 15.—Heavy  
firing in the vicinity of Puerto Mex-  
ico where the rebels are being at-  
tacked by government troops under  
General Jose Dominguez, is reported  
by refugees. The fighting is believed  
to be taking place at a strategic  
point about 15 miles from Puerto,  
Mexico where the rebels have erect-  
ed strong defenses.

The federal general, Fausto To-  
pete has established headquarters at  
El Hule, 30 miles southeast of Tiera  
Blanca on the Isthmian railway and  
heavy reinforcements are going  
forward to him.

The rebel general Pascual Casarin  
with headquarters at Naranjal, sur-  
rendered with 150 men and came to  
Vera Cruz last night to arrange  
terms.

# M'ADOO TO MAKE MORE ADDRESSES

MACON, Ga., William G. McAdoo,  
candidate for the democratic presi-  
dential nomination, will deliver his  
third Georgia address here today in  
the interest of his campaign. He  
will speak in Savannah, Ga., to-  
night. Mr. McAdoo came here from  
Atlanta where he was given a rous-  
ing reception yesterday. He opened  
his Georgia campaign at Marietta,  
where he was the honored guest at  
the home-coming celebration arrang-  
ed by citizens of Cobb county, in  
which he was born.

From Savannah, Mr. McAdoo will  
go to Columbia, S. C., where he has  
accepted an invitation to address the  
South Carolina legislature Monday.  
In an address in Atlanta last  
night, Mr. McAdoo criticized the re-  
publican administration declaring  
that "in three years not one single  
measure has been enacted in the  
genuine interest of the people."

Referring to the Teapot Dome sit-  
uation he said "a campaign of un-  
paralleled calumny" had been directed  
against him, adding that "it has no  
justification in any of my public or  
professional career."  
"He 'defied' efforts to tarnish  
his record of public service," he as-  
serted. He reviewed also the record  
of the last democratic adminis-  
tration, declaring that during eight  
years of the Wilson administration  
there was neither talent nor breath  
of scandal.

# WOMEN PRISONERS IN UNIFORM GARB

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, March 15.—Women pris-  
oners at the state penitentiary are to  
be dressed in uniform garb in the  
near future, deputy Warden J. W.  
Lillis said yesterday, and otherwise  
they will be deprived of many of the  
privileges that have heretofore been  
allowed them and placed on about  
an equal basis with the men pris-  
oners. The reason for this is the  
increasing number of women. There  
are now seven in the prison, all fed-  
eral prisoners for whom the gov-  
ernment pays the state \$40 a month  
each.

"So far," said Deputy Lillis, "the  
women prisoners have hardly known

they were in prison. They have  
dressed as they pleased, which was  
all right as long as we had only two  
or three of them. But now we have  
seven with prospects of more very  
soon.

Sometime ago the practice of re-  
leasing women prisoners of all  
jailers, including rings, was adopt-  
ed. Gradually more restrictions  
are being placed upon them. There  
has been little restriction on the  
amount of money the women were  
allowed to spend for luxuries each  
month, and this has become consid-  
erable of a burden to Mrs. T. E.  
Cornelius the matron, who makes  
the purchases. Hereafter the women  
will be limited to \$2.50 a month as  
are the men. Hereafter the men  
will be required to use prison sta-  
tionery for their letter writing.

There is little work for the women  
to do at the prison, other than  
some scrubbing and keeping their  
quarters in condition. The women  
are taken on short walks for exer-  
cise at regular intervals. If only one  
or two go at a time, the matron  
alone accompanies them, but if there  
are more or a woman is considered  
dangerous a guard is sent along.
