The spectacular dashes, airplane legs of the great variety of climate experiences to tropic variations.

The four or more months that the aviators will be out of land only four times. The trip will be some seven months and stations have been established around the earth.

The stations information is being sent back to earlier points by the fliers with complete information on terrain and climate.

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DAUGHERTY IN BIG CONSPIRACY (continued from page one)

General Daugherty today questioned O. O. Holdridge of Baltimore, a former department of justice agent. The witness was asked what he knew about any arrangement whereby the pictures were to be exhibited in spite of the law prohibiting their transportation. F. C. Quimby, producer, has testified that they were shown in 22 states under an "understanding" that there would be no interference by the justice department and Gaston H. Means, once an agent for the department, has declared that he received and passed on to Jess Smith, close friend of Attorney-General Daugherty, various sums of money.

The committee made plans to follow up its investigation into gun running on the Mexican border into stories of American financial aid to Mexican revolutionaries. A subpoena was announced for Casey Adams, former mayor of Calexico of California, who was said to have knowledge of Cantu revolutionary affairs in lower California.

The Postal Telegraph company delivered to the committee telegrams of Gus T. Jones, a department of justice agent, at San Antonio, Texas, from A. B. Pail, E. L. Doehony and Harry P. Sinclair from December 1, 1923 to March 7, 1924. Holdridge told of investigating exhibition of the fight pictures and of an "apparent conspiracy" to violate the law in showing them. The department of justice delivered a letter in November 1923, he said, calling attention to the alleged conspiracy.

The department circular, signed by Wm. J. Burns, ordered agents to secure evidence, if possible, which would result in convictions. Before the circular was sent out, Holdridge said the films had been shown in Albany and other New York cities. The witness said his connection as special agent for the department of justice was between October, 1920, and 1922, during which time he was stationed at Albany.

He went to New York, however, Holdridge said, and he and another agent, Thomas Spellacy, while investigating a lottery case called on Jap Muma, Cincinnati Enquirer correspondent at Spellacy's suggestion. Muma previously had been named as one of the film syndicate.

Muma told him, the witness said, that he believed another agent was "looking for a shake-down." Muma also mentioned, he said, that he was "very friendly with Mr. Burns and Mr. Daugherty."

"What did Muma say as to his acquaintance with the Attorney-General?"

"He told me he was acquainted with him and seemed to want to impress me with that fact."

Later Holdridge said, he submitted his conversation with Muma and Burns.

Muma produced two letters signed by the attorney-general during his conversation, the witness said. Muma "flashed" them, but did not let him read them. They began "my dear Muma," and were on department stationery, he continued, and the gist appeared to be "replying to Muma asking for help for some one in the way of promotions or otherwise."

"I think they referred to persons in the postoffice department," said Holdridge.

Spellacy said he had been told the whole story of the film affair, Holdridge said, and Muma later told him the details, involving Quimby and others. Holdridge later was told by Muma he said, that the attorney-general was the head of the whole conspiracy and that W. J. Burns was "standing in" on it.

After he returned to Albany, he said, he mentioned to Spellacy that he was preparing a report on the Dempsey-Carpenter fight film case.

"With some excitement," he testified, "Spellacy told me the man at the head of the whole thing was Jap Muma. I took him to a quiet place and told him to tell all about it."

Holdridge said Muma told him that on July 5, 1921 he (Muma) brought films here and went to the home of Edward H. McLean, the publisher.

The pictures were exhibited at McLean's house, the witness said, and Postmaster General New and various cabinet members and ambassadors were present.

Mr. Daugherty, Mr. New and Geo. Christian, President Harding's secretary, discussed with Muma the exhibition of the films the witness said Muma told him.

Muma said Mr. Daugherty told him, according to the witness, that the law prohibited only transportation of the films and suggested to Muma that he take up the matter with A. R. Urien, a lawyer here.

Muma said he had "reached an understanding with Urien."

Muma told him that either Judge Landis of Illinois or Judge Anderson of Indiana had such a hostile attitude that the matter was dropped, Holdridge said, adding that he believed the reference was to Judge Anderson.

Muma said Quimby became alarmed after talks with Spellacy and Ralph Navarro, department agents and went to Washington to see McLean Holdridge testified.

Muma said he told McLean that he (Muma) was headed for the Atlanta penitentiary the witness quoted Muma as saying. Then he said, Muma told him that McLean got in touch with Mr. Daugherty.

Holdridge then said Muma told him of the private showing here, at-

tended by the president and members of the cabinet.

Following the exhibition of the pictures, Holdridge went on, "Muma had a talk with Attorney-General Daugherty and the president."

Secretary Christian, secretary Hughes and Mr. New joined them. The discussion became general. "He told me it seemed to be the general opinion that it was a shame people could not see them," the witness added.

Later Muma, talking with the attorney-general, he told me, was told that the law against the pictures was solely directed to transportation. Muma said Attorney-General Daugherty directed him to see Urien.

The witness was reading from a prepared statement and Senator Jones, republican, Washington, asked how long it was after that conversation that "you made up the memoranda?"

"I made notes as soon as I got out of the place," Holdridge said, "and made up this typed account later."

Spellacy "heard all the conversation," Holdridge said. "McLean got in touch with the attorney-general," Holdridge went on, "who called in W. J. Burns and Muma went to talk with Burns."

"If you are trying to intercede for Tex Rickard, it is no use, for I am going to send him to Atlanta," Muma was quoted then as saying.

Burns had stalked around his office and declared everybody around the department seemed to know what was happening excepting himself.

After this interview, Muma, the witness said, "went back to New York with an easier mind."

"Did he tell you Burns had given him assurance of personal safety?" Senator Jones put in.

"He did not say that; but that his mind was easier."

"Was Muma ever prosecuted?" Senator Wheeler asked.

"Not to my knowledge," the witness said. "It was just the goats who were prosecuted."

"That was all."

"Were any of the films ever seized?" Senator Wheeler asked.

"Not to my knowledge," Holdridge replied.

Senator Wheeler suggested they could be seized under the law.

Holdridge said Muma, after telling him the story, showed him the contract under which he and the "dummy" Martin got 50 per cent of the film profits.

The witness said he later learned a man named Martin was Muma's partner.

Muma showed Holdridge a statement of expenses in each state, the witness went on, and said there was no doubt that some money was "being held out," in these expenses.

At Chicago legal costs were \$35,000.

"What did Urien try to get over to you—that was his idea?" Senator Wheeler asked.

"He tried to impress me that he was a friend of Director Burns," said Holdridge, "some of these people tried to give me the impression Urien was a friend of Mr. Daugherty."

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Secretary Hughes, mentioned by two witnesses before the Daugherty committee as having witnessed the showing of the Dempsey-Carpenter fight films at the home of E. B. McLean, issued a formal statement today to say he had no discussion or conference regarding the films with any one.

The statement follows: "The statement that I had any discussion or conference with Muma or anybody else at any time either at Mr. McLean's house or elsewhere with regard to the fight films is absolutely false. There is not a word of truth in it."

LOCAL WAITER STRIKES OFFICER

Man Interrupted in Act of Beating Woman Companion Turns on Officer and Causes Injuries.

Al Powers, a local restaurant employee, was arrested late Saturday night charged with resisting an officer. Powers, it is claimed, struck Nightwatchman J. J. Cawfield, cutting his face very severely.

The officer was called, it is stated, when Powers undertook to beat Gladys Cole, a young girl, with whom he is alleged to have been registered as man and wife at a local boarding house. The girl began to cry and scream when he struck her, officers state, and finally evaded him and succeeded in escaping to an adjoining room where she locked herself in. Other occupants in the boarding house called for the police, and Cawfield responded.

He states that he found Powers intoxicated and very angry as a result of his fight with the girl.

Upon reaching the street the officer and prisoner engaged in a scuffle in which Powers struck Cawfield heavily in the face, splitting the officer's lip and bruising his face. The policeman was driven into a place glass window in the Sheridan street bakery and the glass broken out. Assistance was given the officer and Powers was landed in the city jail.

The girl, who was registered as Powers' wife, is said to have arrived in Roseburg the last of February from Dunsmuir. An investigation is being made to determine whether or not the girl was brought here by Powers, and if evidence to this effect is shown it is probable that a government charge will be placed against him.
