FROM SHOVEL TO PRESIDENT'S CHAIR.

The career of the late Alfred H. Smith, president of the New York Central railroad, offers many suggestions to young people who are desirous to rise in life. The humblest beginner on the ladder of business ought to feel inspired by the thought that this big man of transportation, head of one of the country's greatest railroad systems, had to quit school when he was 13 years old, and go to work running errands for four dollars a week. Also it was another sign of splendid courage and practical sense, that when he had gotten into a rut in a line of office work, he quit whatever advantages he had gained in this line, and went to work as a section hand at \$1.50 a day. The number of fellows who would do that now is not large. A great many of them would be ashamed to put on overalls and work as a common laborer. Yet this experience must have been one of the foundation elements in Mr. Smith's big success. It gave him an intimate knowledge of the average worker's mind, and put him in a position where he could handle men and become a great organizer. It must have been a tough proposition for a slightly built fellow, who was underweight and none too strong, to take hold with muscular laborers and keep up with them. But the people who put out vigorous effort of this kind gain physical vigor that repays them, and fits them to stand the hard strains of business life. It proved so in Mr. Smith's case. If we had more men in business who know their trade from the very bottom up, and who have associated closely with the ordinary run of workmen, it would be possible to organize business more efficiently, and there would not be so many disputes between capital and labor.

A social worker, speaking recently on the question of regulating public dances, referred to vice and fun as two things that often go together. Too many reformers in attempting to destroy vice, have also destroyed fun. They have cut off natural forms of joy that young people crave, that are essential in their nature, and that they are as bound to have as they are to eat. If the people of any community or group feel that such an amusement as dancing is not properly conducted, they should not thereby attempt to prohibit dancing. It will be about as effectual as trying to prevent eating. The thing to do is to have better dances. Get the young people together under wholesome leadership and among suitable friends, give them their music and let them dance all they want to. They will get the joy and fun that they must have, without the vice.

Before Europe can settle down and cease to create poisons of dissension that circulate through the life blood of the world, two questions must be satisfactorily answered in the affirmative. These are first, can the Germans pay for the damage they did? Second, are they willing to pay? The Dawes reparations committee is finding that Germany has one of the finest industrial plants in the world, and once set going with a stable currency, it can pay a reasonable reparations bill. Then the test of German good faith will come. They might as well realize however, that they can never get complete economic recovery unless they make good on their promises. Commercial credit is essential to business success, and that is not extended to nations that repudiate obligations.

Judging from yesterday's reports from the center of oil activities in the capital dome the subject has been one under discussion for many years, with the majority of the nation's celebrities dipping in the game. So far few have escaped from the nasty tangle, and, in order to make the deals more complete, the basement janitor of the capital building should be interviewed. Lots of things are pulled off in a basement that would be shocking if executed on the top floor.

There's always plenty of fellows on the sidelines watching the march of progress with a monkey wrench feeling in their dome, but the implement is never used only under the cover of dark, which accounts in some degree for its ineffectiveness.

Some men get mad at little things, others get angry at big things, but the man who takes a broad view of the other fellow's expressions, pieces them together and makes right out of several wrongs.

You can tell people how to live and what is good for their health, but to make them comply with instructions is entirely another question—providing it interferes with their pleasures.

Some of the women folks who a few years ago were terribly anxious to vote, have to be urged now to read the newspapers which help them learn how they ought to vote.

The politicians have been shouting against alleged corruption for two months or so, but this has not done much so far to get taxes or the cost of living down.

One airplane down and out of commission, with two stranded aviators in Roseburg, is the first thrill of the 'round the world flight.

The makers of shoe leather will not probably oppose the movement to promote walking.

CARPENTIER AND GIBBONS MATCHED

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., March 20.—George Carpentier of France and Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul heavyweight, have been matched to box in Floyd Fitzsimmons' blue sky arena here July 4, with Jack Dempsey as one of the financial backers, it was announced today.

Fitzsimmons made the announcement himself. It was explained that Jack Dempsey had become associated with Fitzsimmons by paying the taxes due on the arena.

Fitzsimmons said he may stage the Dempsey-Firpo return match Labor Day.

Carpentier and Gibbons are expected to arrive at least a month before their fight.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 20.—As stated about the report from Michigan City, Ind., that he was one of the financial backers of the proposed Gibbons-Carpentier match next July 4, Jack Dempsey today said: "I have nothing to say."

Dempsey will leave here this afternoon for Los Angeles. He has been spending several days here with his mother and father.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 20.—Fireside songs, solos, and soft shoe dancing, together with snappy encores, will be part of the program of the concert given in the Armory next Tuesday evening by the University of Oregon men's glee club.
