### TUNING UP PLANES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, March 21.—Under a cloudless sky and with the temperature 50 degrees above zero and gentle breezes moving, Major Frederick L. Martin and seven men who are to go with him from here April 1, were busy today fitting four airplanes of the United States army to rest on the ocean whenever they leave land on a flight around the world they have barely begun.

At Sand Point aviation field north of the city, where the four machines landed yesterday after the initial hop off Monday at Los Angeles, the giant Douglas cruisers were taxied down to a dock on Lake Washington.

There a boom of the United States engineer department was to lift and hold them while the landing wheels are replaced by large pontoons, which it is hoped will prevent loss of life if the machines must come to water on the lonely Alaskan coast or on a sheer jump of 878 miles between the Aleutian Islands of the United States and the Kurile Islands of Japan.

### TWELVE BRITISH KILLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, Mar. 21.—A detachment of British troops, landing here on leave today, was fired on by a machine gun in a motor car reported to be operated by four Free State soldiers. There were twelve casualties in killed or wounded among the British soldiers.

The Eastern Star lodge has definitely decided to take over and beautify the triangular park in North Roseburg, just north of the Deer Creek bridge, and is preparing plans for the lodge design which is to be worked out in the center of the tract. Shrubs and flowers are being ordered and within a short time the park will be one of the beauty spots of the city.

### DEFENSE RESTS CASE

PORTLAND, March 21.—The defense in the trial of Albert and Joel H. Coe, charged with arson in connection with the burning of their cofeteria here last November, rested its case today after Walter Critchlow, one of the Coe attorneys had testified briefly.

Critchlow said that Fire Marshal Grenfell had promised, during a conference in Critchlow's office, that if Albert Coe confessed the confession would be given no publicity.

Late yesterday, Judge Rossman denied a motion of the defense for a directed verdict.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, March 21.—Arthur B. Howard, accused of larceny of \$12,000 from the Apex Petroleum company of Whitman county, Washington, in 1922, was arrested in a local hotel by Sheriff Oscar Bower last night and is being held in jail here awaiting the arrival of officers from Colfax, at whose request he was taken into custody.

"They've framed me," was the only comment Howard had to make today.

### ACTION ON BONUS BILL IS DELAYED

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Republican members of the senate finance committee decided today to seek the advice of President Coolidge before putting the bonus bill ahead of tax legislation, a step apparently favored by the committee men.

It is the opinion of the majority members, Chairman Smoot said, that the committee should know what expenditures would have to be met through passage of the bonus bill before determining the revenue, which must be raised, under the next tax rates. He and Senator Curtis of Kansas will confer with the president.

Senator Smoot again threatened night sessions of the committee if greater speed in considering the bill is not made.

If decision is reached to put the bonus ahead it probably will be taken up next week, Mr. Smoot said.

### OAKLAND OIL RIG ATTACHED

An attachment was served today on the Oakland Oil company, closing up the plant between Oakland and Sutherland pending the settlement of labor liens amounting to more than \$1,400. The drilling has been halted there for the past few weeks, and Frank and Fred Langenberg, who have been employed as drillers, have assigned their claims for wages to the Douglas Creditors Association which has brought suit in the circuit court to recover the amounts claimed to be due. There are three claims, one for \$784.75, one for \$328.75, and one for \$162.

The Douglas Creditors Association now has both the Oakland Oil company, and the Roseburg Oil and Gas company outfits under attachment on assigned claims. It is understood that both are heavily mortgaged in addition to claims for labor and accounts.
