UN OFFICER IN FRANCE

Nivelle Who Made
Stand at French
Press Was a Hero.

CTED BY MEN

ment Also Took a
Part in Battle of
Marne—Was Made
Legion Honor.

March 22.—General Rob-
Nivelle, who commanded
troops at Verdun during
the war, was dead.
Robert George Nivelle,
the notice of the world
of Verdun, was re-
spected as a good artillery officer
of the war. There were
many artillery officers that
were as good as he when the
war began.

General of Brigade and then
Division in the fall of
1916, he proved his capacity
for the most important com-
mand in the Western front by his
campaigning, and was the
chief of the general staff
of the army when the
work began in Gen-
eral Verdun when the
war began to a higher com-
mand.

On October 15, 1916,
his family of soldiers,
his grandfather went
on campaign of the first
war as a Lieutenant
Colonel, while his father
was in the regular army
and of the National Guard.

He went through the Poly-
technic, the Fontainebleau
School, and the Superior
School. He then followed the
French soldier, with
Africa and China, later
the general staff of the
army. In July, 1914,
the rank of Colonel, he
led the Fifth Regiment of
a division, at the head of
distinguished himself in
stages of the war and won
honors.

He took a brilliant part
in the Marne, where
he was made a Grand
Officer in the Legion of Honor,

MACHINERY SHIPPED FOR SUTHERLIN MILL

A message was received here Tues-
day conveying the information that
the machinery of the A. M. Meyers
sawmill on the Lee Mohr ranch on
the southeast side of town, was being
loaded for shipment, and should reach
Sutherlin within a few days, says
the Sutherlin Sun.

Mr. Meyers has entered into a con-
tract with the city of Sutherlin for
the purchase of the 25 horse-power
gasoline engine formerly used by the
city in pumping from the large well
on the northwest side of town. The
engine was moved to the sawmill site
Tuesday, and if the horse power is
found sufficient to handle the work,
the city is to receive between four
and five hundred dollars for the out-
fit. The engine was purchased short-
ly after Sutherlin was incorporated,
and at a time when the town was
not so well provided with electricity
as at present. It originally cost about
\$1600, and was only used for a short
time. The city has been endeavoring
to dispose of it for several years.

Trees and underbrush are being
cleared away for the mill site and
foundations for the machinery are
being made ready. Mr. Meyers is
pushing the work as fast as possible,
and hopes to have everything in
shape for operation by the middle of
April.

The small mill on the Martin Lloyd
place on the south side of town, re-
cently installed by Walter Baker,
began cutting plank and ties this
week.

The E. Joslyn mill southeast of
town, which is being enlarged and
new machinery added, will probably
not be in shape for operation until
about the middle of April. Aside
from enlarging the mill, Mr. Joslyn is
putting in two or three small bridges
and making extensive repairs on
roads.

FUNERAL OF MRS. BURNETT HELD TODAY

EVACUATE MEXICAN CITY

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
MEXICO CITY, March 22.—Dis-
patches from Puebla say that Oax-
aca City was evacuated three days
ago by the rebels under Enrique
Brenna and Fortuna Maycotte.

The dispatch adds that the rebel
chieftains Salvador Vega Bernal,
surrendered at Puebla.

Tampico advices report a victory
for the federals at Hacienda, San
Miguel near Villa Aldama. The
rebels lost fifteen dead and 25
wounded.

Denial was made today by rumors
that Alberto J. Paul, finance min-
ister, might be appointed ambassa-
dor to the United States. It is said
he will resume his post of minister
to France after the present econ-
omic crisis is passed.

General Plutarco Elias Calles has
withdrawn from the activities for
the purpose of resuming his presi-
dential campaign.

The fleeing of the rebel leaders
indicates the complete collapse of
the revolution it was said. The
Mexican government made no effort
to apprehend Dr. La Huerta, but
welcomed his departure to foreign
soil. It was further understood that
Dr. La Huerta, after landing at
Galveston will come by rail to New
Orleans to join his wife and family
who reached here several days ago.

PRUNE GROWERS TO MEET APRIL 4

Bankers to Call Meeting to
Consider Reorganization
of Association.

PLANS ARE PRESENTED

Officials of Oregon Growers
Concern Present Plans for
Creation of Organiza-
tion to Handle Crop.

The Douglas County Bankers' as-
sociation met last night in a banquet
at the Umpqua Hotel, and after thor-
oughly investigating and discussing
the plans for the reorganization of
the Oregon Growers Cooperative As-
sociation into a prune marketing con-
cern, found the plan containing suffi-
cient merit to warrant placing before
the prune growers of the county, and
it was decided to call a public meet-
ing for Friday, April 4, at which time
the growers will be asked to express
themselves regarding the proposal.

Kenneth Miller, president of the
Oregon Growers, and M. J. Newhouse,
general manager, were present at the
meeting and presented to the bank-
ers the plans for the reorganization
of the association. These plans call
for the creation of a concern dealing
exclusively with prunes. There is a
great mass of detail included in the
plan, as it will be necessary to form
local units, which must be properly
financed, and many other matters tak-
ing care of in arranging the affairs of
the new organization.

The bankers although appearing to
be generally in favor of the plan as
offered, did not desire to definitely
commit their organization to the
scheme until it has been placed be-
fore the growers and their desires
considered. The banks will be re-
quired to participate in the financing,
it is expected, and consequently are
being consulted regarding the plans.
The Douglas county bankers, how-
ever, desire to consider the wishes of
the growers before taking any de-
finite action, and consequently will
ask all prune growers to meet in
Roseburg on April 4, at which time
the officials from the association will
be present, and complete considera-
tion will be given to the proposed ar-
rangements.

The meeting last night was well at-
tended, every bank in a prune grow-
ing section being represented. Mark
Tisdale, of Sutherlin, president of the
association, presided, and the busi-
ness was confined strictly to the con-
sideration of the prune situation. The
banquet which preceded the busi-
ness session was a very enjoyable
affair and the bankers were well
pleased.

ed up; his bank books cleared; he
told me to burn his papers."
"Do you mean he was afraid of an
expose?" asked Senator Ashurst.

"Yes."
"Did he (Smith) fear Mr. Daugh-
erty?" asked Senator Jones.

"On the last Friday before his
death Mr. Daugherty was with Jess
at the shack," Miss Stinson went on.
"Daugherty had been asleep, but
Jess aroused him and he blew up
and swore at him. Jess called for
his car and left, came right into
town and bought his gun—he had
made his decision. He told the
hardware store clerk he was buying
the gun for the attorney-general."

"Did Mal Daugherty tell you any-
thing about wounds on the body?"
"When Mal Daugherty came back
from Washington," she said, "he
was made."

She went on to tell of Mal Daugh-
erty, as executor, opening Smith's
safe deposit box without witnesses.
"Now about these scars," Senator
Wheeler asked, referring to
marks on Smith's body.

"Mal Daugherty told me the
wound from the appendicitis opera-

Haynes or Mr. Blair in connection
with these liquor permits?" asked
Senator Moses, republican, New
Hampshire.

"I remember hearing their
names."
"I hate to abuse confidence," said
Miss Stinson. "I am doing it to
show you that Jess Smith was en-
meshed and entangled."

"Enmeshed and entangled by
whom?"
"By the man to whom he held his
great loyalty," Miss Stinson went on.
"The man who is using his great
power to terrorize and intimidate
witnesses."

"Who is that man?" Senator Ash-
urst put in.

"Harry Daugherty," she said.
Miss Stinson said she was told
that a man named Ellis had made
an affidavit that \$150,000 would be
paid, divided between her, Fink and
Ellis. If she would promise silence.

Fink told her, she said, "they
were holding Ellis," and that she
was in danger. He called up Sam-
uel Underleider, broker, she said,
and told him "I can't make this wo-
man understand the seriousness of
things."

Underleider came up to her room,
she said and told her he "didn't
understand much about it, but it
seems there is a conspiracy against
Harry Daugherty."

"Underleider told me I would be
behind bars," she added. "I told
him to take me, that this was a
frame-up, pure and simple."

Underleider said she recounted,
that Fink and Ellis "were being
held under \$50,000 bond," and
pointing to Fink said "he is so
scared he will testify to anything."

"I asked Underleider why Mal
Daugherty or Harry Daugherty, or
whoever was engineering the con-
spiracy, didn't come over them-
selves," she went on.

"Underleider said they want your
promise not to talk about Harry
Daugherty."

She told Underleider "they could
not strong-arm her," and that "there
is not going to be a convenient bul-
let through my brain," and that she
would testify in Washington.

After the Cleveland affair, Miss
Stinson said, she met Mal Daugh-
erty and accused him and he denied
being a party to an alleged frame-
up.

Miss Stinson testified that one
Lyle Johnson who reported himself
as coming from the Columbus Citiz-
en and Associated Press, offered her
\$1,000 for a lead on how to get
information about Teapot Dome.

(Lyle Johnson is not employed by
the Associated Press and the Col-
umbus Citizen, for which he is
courthouse reporter in Columbus,
Ohio, is not a member of the As-
sociated Press.)

Continuing her testimony about
the hotel affair, the witness pro-
ceeded:

"This was on the 21st of February
this year. On February 22, I went
to see Mal Daugherty. I was boil-
ing," Mal Daugherty wouldn't see
her and she went to her attorney
to tell him about this frame-up.

"Was it your idea that the frame-
up included registering you as some
man's wife?" Senator Ashurst asked.

"I'm clear as to that," Miss Stin-
son replied.

Sensor Jones asked where notes
which she read came from.

"They were a typewritten copy of
originals made on February 23, af-
ter the alleged frame up."

The originals in pencil, she said,
she had "torn up."

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Rox-
ie Stinson, divorced wife of Jess W.
Smith, "bomber and friend" of At-
torney-General Daugherty, resumed
the witness stand today before the
Daugherty investigating committee
and brought her letters to support
her story of last week.

Before Miss Stinson began, Sen-
ator Wheeler, declared Mr. Daugh-
erty had done a "dirty, cowardly
trick" in making charges of black-
mail against her in his statement.

Chairman Brookhart read last
night's statement by Attorney-Gen-
eral Daugherty and emphasized his
comment on the committee leaving

unnoticed the department's record
on liquor prosecutions.

"I got the record from the de-
partment last night after the state-
ment was issued," Chairman Brook-
hart said.

"Has Mr. Daugherty seen fit to
explain what official position Jess
W. Smith had in the department of
justice?" asked Senator Ashurst,
democrat, Arizona.

"He has not," Chairman Brook-
hart responded.

"We ought to let that be explain-
ed by the attorney-general, who has
not yet come to the stand," Senator
Jones, republican, Washington said.

Former Senator Chamberlain for
Daugherty, complained that counsel
had not been allowed to cross-ex-
amine witnesses, particularly Roxie
Stinson and Gaston R. Means.

"Miss Stinson is here; you'll have
your opportunity today," said Sen-
ator Wheeler. "She has been ill—
and the reason is that the attorney-
general has stooped to the unmanly
and indecent thing of attacking her
character."

Senator Chamberlain protested
that the attorney-general was being
placed in an unfair position.

"We have the whole power of the
department of justice directed
against us and this hearing," Sen-
ator Wheeler asserted, "with its
agencies intimidating our witnesses
by threats of prosecution if they ap-
pear. I criticize the president of the
United States for keeping this man
in his place of power while this
proceeding goes on. The least the
president could do would be to sus-
pend him."

Miss Stinson began by taking up
Mr. Daugherty's charge in detail.
First she denied that she was a
"disappointed woman," and declar-
ed Smith had never led her to be-
lieve that she was to be his sole
heir.

"Just utterly false," she said of
the attorney-general's charge that
she had attempted to "capitalize
her silence."

Miss Stinson said Jake Hamon
told her of a "deal" at the Chicago
convention. Both Smith and Ham-
on told her, she said, Hamon was
to have a cabinet position.

Daugherty got word, Miss Stin-
son said Smith told her that
they were "double-crossing
him" and he (Daugherty) went to
the Chicago Hotel conference at 2
a. m. which agreed on Harding as
the nominee and "by strong arm"
method arranged to have Harding
backed for the nomination.

Smith told her, Miss Stinson said,
he feared Mr. Daugherty himself.
She told of an incident at "the
shack" in Ohio when Mr. Daugh-
erty "swore at and abused shame-
fully" Jess Smith. Smith went to
a hardware store and bought a gun,
she said, and decided to kill himself.

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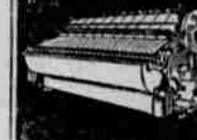
