WINN FROM CUSTOMS COLLECTOR HEAVYWEIGHT MAY BE IMPEACHED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, March 25.—The resolution looking to impeachment in the house of C. C. Chase, customs collector at El Paso, Texas, and son-in-law of A. R. Fall, was adopted today by the senate.

The resolution grew out of the refusal of Chase to answer questions before the committee and from the testimony of Price McKinney of Cleveland that Chase had sought to have him say he loaned Albert B. Fall \$100,000.

The vote on the resolution was unanimous, 70 senators casting their ballots. Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico, one of those who had objected to immediate consideration of the resolution was absent when the roll was called.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Honduran revolutionists are in complete possession of the entire country with the exception of Tegucigalpa, the capital. American minister Morales reported today to the state department.

General Ferrera and Carras, revolutionary commanders, were said to have agreed to throw their united strength against Tegucigalpa in a final attack, the success of which was predicted in dispatches to the navy department.

The revolutionary leaders have promised to respect the neutral zone in which the foreign and non-combatant residents have taken refuge.

CHANGE ARMY SHIPS FOR SEA FLIGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, March 25.—After the four United States army around the world air cruises, now being changed from airplanes to sea planes at Sand Point aviation field, prior to their next hop-off to Prince Rupert B. C. are swung onto pontoons tomorrow they will be moored to buoys in Lake Washington.

University of Washington students will guard the machines at night with powerful searchlights.

An aerial exhibition will be given Saturday at the University of Washington stadium in honor of the American flyers. Features of the entertainment will be an aerial race, a land attack demonstration by the one hundred and forty sixth field artillery, mounted fencing, a mule polo match, a mounted tug of war with horses matched against mules, a mounted pushball contest, an aerial bombing demonstration and several comedy acts by mechanics of a local airplane company and university students.

Of the other three planes in the squadron, that flown by Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith has been called after Chicago, that flown by Lieutenant Leigh Wade after Boston, and that flown by Lieutenant Erik H. Nelson after New Orleans.

Major Frederick L. Martin, commanding the expedition is flying the Seattle.

The four planes were christened today.

MAN WANTED ON BOOZE CHARGE SURRENDERS

Ike Crawford, of the Hancock mountain vicinity, surrendered to Deputy Sheriffs Ed Sterling and C. H. Daugherty yesterday evening. Crawford has been sought by the officers on a charge of possession of moonshine, since they uncovered a 5-gallon keg of liquor buried in the garden near his cabin. Crawford and Will Mahaffey, came to Roseburg several days ago, and in the car the officers found a gallon jug of liquor. Mahaffey was arrested but Crawford eluded the authorities. A raid was made on his place and a large keg of moonshine uncovered. Yesterday he notified Deputy Sheriff Sterling that he would meet him at the Hancock bridge. He surrendered himself there and was brought to Roseburg. He appeared before Justice of the Peace George Jones yesterday evening and entered a plea of not guilty. Being unable to furnish bail which was fixed in the sum of \$400, he is being held in the county jail.

DAWES COMMITTEE IS HARD AT WORK

PARIS, March 25.—The Dawes committee of reparations experts returned to work today with great energy after the first week end recess the members had enjoyed since their meetings began more than two months ago.

The banking sub-committee sat throughout the morning while the railway and budget sub-committees met in the afternoon to iron out the details upon which divergencies of opinion have arisen over the manner in which some of the transaction experts had presented to the drafting committee.

In an effort to have the report ready at the beginning of next week, the plenary session of the committee set for three o'clock this afternoon was cancelled to give the sub-committees a free hand to devote the entire day to the questions under discussion.

REPUBLIC FAVORED BY GREEK ASSEMBLY

ATHENS, March 25.—The National assembly today passed a resolution in favor of the overthrow of the Glucksburg dynasty and the establishment of a Greek republic.

A resolution introduced by the premier proclaimed abolition of the Glucksburg dynasty, banishment of the members of the royal family compulsory sale of their property and establishment of a republic, provided the last named proposal is confirmed at the forthcoming plebiscite.

It is intended that the regent, Admiral Coundouriotis shall continue to act as governor of Greece until the framing of a republican constitution.

AID FOR GERMANS WILL BE PROVIDED

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The senate received today the Fish resolution as adopted by the house, to appropriate \$10,000,000 for the purchase of food supplies for destitute women and children of Germany. The house last night approved the bill 240 to 97.

GOVERNOR MUST DEFEND HIS ASSERTION

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The house irrigation committee voted today to request Governor Hunt of Arizona to testify in regard to charges by him that Secretary Work is "utilizing his position" to favor Colorado in the proposed Boulder canyon dam development on the Colorado river.

COSTS OF BONUS SHOW DISCREPANCY

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The revenue bill was laid aside temporarily today by the senate finance committee while H. P. Brown, veteran's bureau actuary, who figured the cost of the paid-up insurance bonus plan adopted by the house would amount to a little over \$2,000,000,000, and Joseph McCoy, government actuary, who figured it would cost almost \$5,000,000,000, explained how they arrived at their estimates.

Proceeding with unexpected speed in its consideration of the bill last night, the committee launched into the income section and by a vote of eight to seven, substituted the income tax rates proposed by Secretary Mellon for the Longworth bill adopted by the house.

Democrats on the committee who have been working on a substitute for the Longworth rates, were not ready to offer a counter-proposal and voted solidly against the Mellon rates.

FIRE IN SCHOONER IS BEING COMBATTED

ASTORIA, March 25.—Longshoremen have been working since 3 o'clock this morning, removing 40,000 feet of lumber from the docks of the Canadian steam schooner E. D. Kingsley so that the hatches can be opened and a fire combatted in hold number 2. The extent of the fire could not be determined early today.

The hold contains lime and shingles and started smoking about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon while the vessel was 55 miles over the mouth of the Columbia, bound for San Francisco from Vancouver B. C.

L. P. Davis, master of the vessel, immediately headed for the mouth of the Columbia. He was unable to fight the flames while at sea for fear of the effect of water on lime, stored in the smoldering hold.

RADIO LOCATES CAT LOST BY COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The radio, often used to locate missing persons and stolen automobiles, was proved to be equally effective in finding missing cats.

Stations WCAP Washington and WEAF of New York last night "at the request of White House officials" broadcast a notice that Tiger, President Coolidge's pet cat had been missing since last week. Soon after the president reached his office this morning, a navy building guard appeared with the missing feline.

ONE MAN KILLED IN IRISH FIGHTING

DUBLIN, March 25.—County Leitrim was excited today by news of an engagement in which one man was killed, between national army troops and irregulars in the mountainous district of Keshigan. The engagement ensued when a party of suspects were assembled in a roundhouse. Shots were exchanged and the leader of the free state troops, Lieutenant Kane was shot and killed. One arrest was made.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF MAN IS PROBED

PORTLAND, March 25.—Mystery surrounds the death of C. F. Rothlisberger, employee of the local postoffice, whose body was found this morning by a watchman at the Admiral Line dock.

The body shows the result of a heavy blow on the forehead, according to the coroner's office.

If death was due to accident it was probably caused by a fifteen-foot fall from a runway, which happened in such a manner that the man's head struck a wooden girder.

If it was due to murder, no reason has been suggested to police. A gold watch and \$6.75 found in his pockets, set aside the robbery theory.

MANSFIELD SLURS BAKER; APOLOGIZES

PORTLAND, March 25.—Members of the Portland Women's Research club staged an enthusiastic demonstration to derogatory personal comments made about Mr. Baker by George A. Mansfield, candidate for the democratic senatorial nomination. The incident occurred at the club's luncheon at the Multnomah hotel, with candidates for the United States senate as speakers.

Mr. Mansfield was the second speaker on the program. Mayor Baker came first, stating the principles of his campaign. When in his talk Mr. Mansfield left the planks of his platform and ventured upon personalities, unfavorable feeling was manifested in hisses and general excitement among the women, of whom there were about 200 present.

"What has the mayor ever done for Portland?" Mansfield demanded. Before he could go on he was interrupted by hisses and cries of "None of that!" from the women at nearby tables.

During the brief excitement that followed, silencing the speaker, the mayor got to his feet and was greeted with applause, cheering and waving of handkerchiefs.

Mr. Mansfield apologized, withdrawing his remarks.

"In my zeal I have gone beyond the bounds of propriety," he admitted. He was greeted with murmurs of "I should say he has," as he continued his talk.

"This is strictly a presentation of platforms," Mrs. C. F. Norris, chairman of the day, admonished the gathering, before the next talk.

ANTI-SALOONER TO START PRISON TERM

NEW YORK, March 25.—William H. Anderson, former superintendent of the anti-saloon league of New York today begins serving his term of from one to two years in Sing Sing prison.

Anderson was convicted last January of third degree forgery in ordering a falsification of the league's books so as to conceal his receipt of a \$4,400 split on commissions of one of the organization's fund solicitors. The end of the dry leader's long fight for acquittal came with a decision by Supreme Court Justice Wagner denying motion for a certificate of reasonable doubt.

Anderson will probably be put to work with a pick and shovel. Warden Lewis E. Lawes said. After a short period of hard manual labor, he will be assigned to clerical work.

NEW YORK, March 25.—William H. Anderson, former state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of New York, convicted of third degree forgery surrendered today to Sheriff Dooling and will start for Sing Sing prison at two p. m. to begin his term of from one to two years.

Anderson walked briskly into the sheriff's office, with head up, lips tightly closed and his eyes flashing. Anderson gave out a statement in which he said in part:

"A soldier who volunteers to enter the opposition lines and blow up the enemies fortifications runs supreme risk."

"I blew up the liquor fortifications of all America by getting enough New York votes in congress to send the Eighteenth Amendment to the states for their ratification and by bringing about ratification by New York."

"To do it, I took risks, that, judged by safety first standards in the light of hindsight were errors of judgement or blunders on my part, even though the anti-saloon league received all the benefits of every aspect of all transactions and the dry cause was in fact tremendously benefited."

MEASURING TAPE STRIKES WIRES

County Roadmaster Frear had a narrow escape from electrocution yesterday while measuring the steel bridge at Winchester. Three wires carrying 2200 volts pass under the bridge and as the surveyors were measuring one of the spans the steel tape slipped from the grasp of one of the men and fell across the wires. As the tape dropped Mr. Frear let go of his end, or he possibly would have been either killed or injured. The tape struck the wires, the current burning the steel ribbon in two. The fuses were blown out at the power house by the short circuit, and insulation burned off the wires.
