This is the first time that Chief Mickle has visited Roseburg in person since the creamery plant has been remodeled and he expressed his gratification for the splendid improvement and also for the management of the local creamery. He stated that he had no idea that such a thoroughly equipped institution was to be found in Roseburg, and went on to say that the people of the city and county might well be proud of so modern an institution, and one that is maintained in such a sanitary manner. Samples of butter that had just come from the churns were taken, and it was the expression of both Mr. Mickle and Deputy Ziemer that the quality was perfect. Both these experts were unqualified in their praise for the well kept plant and the wholesome product turned out for public use.

money besides Senator Penrose?" "Yes sir. Daugherty \$25,000; W. Hays 25,000 and a man there a man named Manning from Ohio, well some one in Ohio he gave \$25,000. There was a fourth person."

"Anybody else?" "No one I can remember. Money was used indiscriminately with the Oklahoma delegation. He said it had cost him like hell to get the New York delegation."

"Did he say how much it cost?" "No sir."

"I wish you would tell us in a connected way as well as your memory will serve you, about what was said, concerning the acquisition of public lands or the expectation of the same," said Senator Walsh.

"Mr. Hamon had at two or three times before I got mixed up into this wanted me to go back to Ardmore and asked me to go in with him in an oil deal," replied Jennings.

"I don't like to say it myself but the people rather had confidence in me in Oklahoma and more than one oil company had tried to use my name in the exploitation of companies in selling stock and Jake had repeatedly asked me to come in and form a new company and we could finance it with his money. The company would be perfectly legitimate."

"In talking about being secretary of the interior, it was just a general conversation and I want to be perfectly frank with you. I did not believe in Jake's methods. I had no faith in those methods. There was one reason I liked him and adhered to his friendship. That was because he was the only lawyer in Lawton who had extended his hand to me when I came out of prison. I would have hesitated a long time about making the statement I have today. I do not believe about talking about anybody. I am always reluctant in giving evidence even against a criminal. But I believe our country is really in need of all the help it can get at this time."

After Jennings had concluded his story, Senators Walsh and Spencer had a row over a statement credited to Senator Spencer in a dispatch from New York last night. The Missouri senator was quoted as having said the oil inquiry was accomplishing very little; that the people were weary of it; and that things just as bad had happened under Interior Secretary Lane's administration.

Senator Walsh said he would pass over the "impropriety" of a number of the committee commenting on its work in that way and would ask Senator Spencer on what information he based the statement about Secretary Lane's administration so the committee could investigate it. Senator Spencer replied he would produce his facts in "good time" after he had made further investigation.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Al Jennings, former train robber, told the oil committee today Jake Hamon had told him at Chicago in 1920 that Warren Harding was to be nominated as president and that it had cost Hamon \$100,000.

Of this sum \$20,000 went to the late Senator Penrose of Penna., Jennings said he was told by Hamon who then was republican national committee man for Oklahoma.

"Hamon said he gave \$25,000 to Harry M. Daugherty," Jennings added.

Hamon was quoted as having said that he was to be secretary of the interior and was to share in public lands.

Daugherty at first was for Albert B. Fall for interior secretary. Jennings said Hamon told him, but Hamon won out finally and would have been appointed had he not been killed soon after the election.

Jennings also quoted Hamon as having said that with the money he would make he eventually would become president of the United States. Hamon carried Oklahoma for Harding, the witness said, adding that the committeeman told him it had cost him a half a million dollars.

"Wasn't Hamon for Wood at the start?" asked Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico.

"He never liked Wood," Jennings replied. "He said Wood was too much impregnated with the damned fool honesty of Theodore Roosevelt."

While Al Jennings was waiting to tell his story about an oil deal at the 1920 republican national convention, the committee called to the stand LeRoy W. Baldwin, president of the Empire Trust company, New York City, who told of loans to the republican national committee by that company aggregating \$266,620 and of their repayment with interest over a period of from two to three years.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The story told by Al Jennings today to the oil committee was branded as "false and preposterous" in a statement by Leighton C. Taylor, former secretary to the late Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania.

Declaring he had been in constant attendance upon the senator while he was ill in Philadelphia before and during the Chicago convention, Taylor said Hamon had never seen or communicated with Penrose, nor had the latter ever mentioned Hamon's name to his secretary.

"I haven't the slightest recollection of ever having seen or met Jake Hamon myself any time during the month preceding the Chicago convention," said Taylor, and "close as I was to Penrose, I don't see how Hamon could have seen him without my knowing it."
